


Congratulations, Tremaine! – 2023 Fowler Scholarship Recipient

Each spring, prospective Windsor UMC students pursuing an education in a field involving service to mankind may submit a scholarship application. These applications are reviewed by the Outreach Team and a recipient(s) selected. The funds are awarded from interest earned on the Fowler Scholarship Capital Fund and are available in July. This year's recipient is Tremaine Dunbar! Please join us in congratulating him.





Tremaine's ultimate goal is to reduce mental health disparities among African American men through empowering churches and faith-based organizations to become more involved in public health practice. He brings African American men into closer proximity to public mental health research by utilizing churches and faith-based organizations as formulators of data and as locations where interventions can take place. African American men

experience the worst mental health outcomes of all racial/gender groups. Religious institutions have historically stood as trusted bastions of support in African American communities and can help improve the mental health of African American men. Through employing research methods that examine how religious institutions, religiosity, and spirituality regulate mental health, Tremaine hopes to influence policy and help African American men improve their health and wellness, live a self-directed life, and develop the tools to achieve their full potential.

With our bodies saying, "You can't roof a house anymore. Your knees will not take kindly to climbing a ladder," we knew it was time to pass the torch to a younger generation. With a combined number of 62 years of Salkehatchie Summer Service experience, could we lay down our hammers? Well, not exactly.

Salkehatchie Summer Service is a work mission project started 45 years ago by Rev. John Culp to help families in poverty and to give youth a meaningful spiritual experience. Youth and adults repair homes for families who cannot do the work themselves. Salkehatchie is building back from the Covid Pandemic hiatus. This summer, thirty-two camps were held in the state with 920 campers, working on eighty homes.

Each camper pays \$250.00 which is used to buy building supplies like lumber and shingles. Local churches prepare meals and, in some cases, provide lodging facilities. Some camps lodge in schools.

We were approached about opening a new camp in Rock Hill—and God had a plan all along, because he planted the perfect person to be the Camp Director there. Eryn Price Wilson is someone we've known since she was age 15, attending the Harvest

Salkehatchie camp in Dillon 15 years ago. She followed us to Hemingway in 2018 and 2019 and served as the Assistant Director. She is now married and a third grade teacher in Rock Hill. When asked if she would be interested, she said yes. We said we would come to help. Like proud psuedo parents, we watched Eryn and the younger generation take Salkehatchie into the future.

We didn't get on a roof, but we worked onsite in the heat. Ivey wore his good ole' measuring -tape suspenders and it felt like the old days, except in the old days we didn't have blowers to quickly dry wet paint. Success is when you see a happy homeowner descending his back porch steps for the first time in many years. See pictures.


