LOVE AND SACRIFICE

This year, Ash Wednesday occurred on Valentine's Day; this was an immediate way of getting my attention. With all the sadness we have heard and, in some cases, experienced, the concept of Valentine's Day on Ash Wednesday was a great distraction. We needed something extra to add to our typical Lenten Journey to inspire us even more.

I was curious about what others were thinking about this exciting collaboration of events. So, I took to the UMC Discipleship webpage. One commenter said, "There is so much potential to connect with a hurting world. Folks need to know what real love looks like." Another said, "I recognize, for many, it is important to celebrate the idea of love. So what would it look like to take the idea of love and show the reality of what love is?"

I am glad this information validates my feelings and thoughts. History says Valentine's Day originated from a ban on love. Some stories include accounts of the martyrdom of a priest named Valentinus or Valentine. Roman emperor Claudius II had nullified engagements and banned new marriages to increase the size of his army. Valentine defied the ban and continued marrying couples until he was discovered and killed on February 14, 270 A.D.

Another account tells of a priest, also named Valentine, who also was martyred on February 14, in a different year, for helping imprisoned Christians. In some traditions, he may have healed his jailer's daughter before being martyred. In others, he and the jailer's daughter fell in love—before being executed. All stories speak of love and sacrifice.

To ignore the secular would seem out of touch; besides, why not redeem it? The story of St. Valentine (whether accurate or not) is one of sacrifice, witnessing and a changed life. Sounds pretty Lenten to me.

So, to look at both days, love is one connection between them. Valentine's Day revolves around romantic love. And Ash Wednesday is a solemn reminder of Christ's sacrificial love for us. I am not saying the two are equal, but that they have the same sentiments.

During Ash Wednesday, many Christians start a time of intentional fasting and reflection. Abstaining from meals or favorite foods, or giving up some particular pleasure during the 40 days of Lent, has long served to remind people to prepare for a transformed life.

Easter Sunday is April Fool's Eve. If we are intentional during the Lenten season, our witness could change someone's life besides our transformation. Let love guide you on your journey, this year and always, into a deeper relationship with Christ and a more meaningful relationship with each other. So, I say to each of us, blessings for the Lenten journey. May your hearts be enthralled with the love of Christ and for each other.



Windsor is helping to strengthen the nutrition and food supply for residents in the Columbia Northeast area (zip code 29223) through SC Thrive by being a distribution point. The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP) is a federal program that helps supplement the diets of residents living in "food deserts" by providing foods like fruits, vegetables and whole grains at no cost. Windsor's effort requires the hands and feet of many volunteers—some with strong muscles. Some with pick-up trucks. Some to help display, stack and bag. Food distribution happens once a month on a Wednesday. A notice will be sent by email regarding the March Wednesday. Everyone in our congregation is invited to come to pick up vegetables. This followed a delicious Lenten lunch of soups, sandwiches and homemade desserts. Many thanks to the cooks. Familiar faces, some who we haven't seen in a while, were among the 17 people present. No worries, we still have a seat at the table for you. Come on Wednesdays through Lent at 11 a.m. for lunch and 12 p.m. for a Lenten message.

For the February 20 Lenten lunch, Linda Friar made her Wild Rice and Chicken Soup which was a fan favorite. Because of the many requests for the recipe, we are including it here.

Wild Rice and Chicken Soup

Ingredients:

8 cups of water

1 box of Uncle Ben's Long Grain and Wild Rice mix

1 envelope of Lipton Noodle soup mix.

1 celery stalk, finely chopped

1 large carrot, finely chopped

½ cup chopped onion (optional)

2 cans of Cream of Chicken soup (undiluted)

2-3 cups of cubed cooked chicken breasts

1 chicken bouillon cube

A lot of love.

Place chicken breasts (1½ pounds of chicken) in pot. Cover with water. Add bouillon cube. Bring to boil. Simmer for 45–60 minutes. Cool and cut into cubes.

In large pot, combine water, rice and its full packet of seasoning, dry Lipton Noodle Soup mix. Bring to boil. Cover and simmer for 10 minutes. Stir in celery, carrots and onions. Cover and simmer 20–30 minutes or until carrots are tender. Stir in 2 cans of Cream of Chicken soup and cubed chicken. Cook until vegetables are tender.

For a heartier soup, use 3–4 stalks of celery and 4–5 medium carrots. For a quicker cooking time, substitute a rotisserie chicken for the chicken breasts.
