"...They shall not appear before the Lord empty-handed. All shall give as they are able, according to the blessing of the Lord your God that he has given you." (Deut. 16:16b-17).

Nobody likes talking about money, especially in church. Why? It's profoundly personal, awkward, and a touchy subject for some of us. Believe me, I'm not a big fan of the conversation either; however, as the pastor, hard conversations come with the territory. I am writing about money because it affects the future of Windsor, your church home. The Finance Committee, the church council members, and I are concerned about Windsor's financial health. Finance The Committee met on January 16, 2025. There was much examination and discussion about the 2025 Windsor church budget, and the committee voted to recommend the 2025 budget to the church council. On January 29, 2025, the Church Council reviewed, discussed, and voted to approve the 2025 budget of \$202,000.00, with a projected deficit of \$49,800.00 for the year. The 2025 budget is cut to the bare bone. There's not one ounce of fat, padding or wiggle room.

Therefore, friends, I must report that Windsor is facing a rough financial patch. After reviewing the monthly balance sheets, the Finance Committee found that \$21,000.00 is required to pay the staff salaries (Pastor, Julie, Katrina, and Rodney), bills and building operations. That \$21,000.00 figure is what it costs for Windsor to remain open and functioning each month; that figure does not include paying ANY money toward our apportionment responsibility to the conference.

Please understand that the Church Council and I are not raising a cry of alarm or hitting the panic

button yet. I do not intend to fearmonger or scare you; however, I feel obligated to inform you that Windsor is facing a serious monthly shortfall. For January 2025, the deficit was \$4,219.31. Rest assured; we are actively pursuing other avenues to generate more income for the church.

As a congregation member and individual, you are very generous and give with your heart. I want to acknowledge that I see your open-handed giving, and I am very privileged to shepherd a congregation willing to return the blessings to God, who has so richly blessed you. Windsor does give monetary donations for flood buckets, back-to-school supplies, backpacks, candy for the Fall Festival, and diapers for Epworth, to name a few. On more than one occasion, I've been told that Windsor church members will dive deep into their wallets and purses when circumstances pull on their heartstrings.

I cannot think of anything that ought to pull on your heartstrings more than giving to your church. Windsor is your church; the local congregation makes and keeps the church alive and thriving. God instructs Israel in Deuteronomy 16:16b-17 that each person was to give according to the blessing God had given them. "... They were to offer to Him what was possible without it being a burden." Brothers and sisters, the Church Council and I are not asking that you give until it hurts, or you go without. We ask that each of you pray, asking God for His guidance on increasing your giving. I realize it takes a massive leap of faith, and I understand that in the current economic climate we might be more hesitant and cautious in giving, yet we have the sure

confidence that God always makes a way where there seems to be no way. God is trustworthy and dependable. I am wholly persuaded that the best days are yet to come for Windsor!

A Musical Note Just for You



Shrove Tuesday/Fat Tuesday – March 4

Come enjoy food, fun and fellowship on Shrove Tuesday/Fat Tuesday, March 4 at 6 p.m. The UMM will prepare pancakes and sausage to celebrate Fat Tuesday. What is the significance of Shrove Tuesday? Pancake Day, or Shrove Tuesday (Fat Tuesday) is the traditional feast day before the start of Lent on Ash Wednesday. Lent, the 40 days leading up to Easter, is traditionally a time of fasting, and on Shrove Tuesday, Anglo-Saxon Christians went to confession and were "shriven" (absolved from their sins).



Ash Wednesday Service, Wednesday, March 5, at 6 p.m.

Ash Wednesday: In Western Christianity, Ash Wednesday marks the first day, or the start of the season of Lent, which begins 40 days prior to Easter (Sundays are not included in the count). Lent is a time when many Christians prepare for Easter by observing a period of fasting, repentance, moderation and spiritual discipline. During Ash Wednesday services, the minister will lightly rub the sign of the cross with ashes onto the foreheads of worshipers.

The Bible does not mention Ash Wednesday or the custom of Lent; however, the practice of repentance and mourning in ashes is found in 2 Samuel 13:19, Esther 4:1, Job 2:8, Daniel 9:3 and Matthew 11:21.

This year, though, there is also a critical need as a result of January's severe winter weather and the California wildfires reducing needed blood donor collections. According to the Red Cross website, winter storms have led to about 20,000 blood and platelet donations uncollected since the beginning of the year!

Many thanks to this winter's blood drive 'crew.' Kathy Robinson, Linda Friar and Patty Fowler provided homemade treats of chocolate brownies, blonde brownies and pound cake. Not only were these a delicious treat to add to the prepackaged items supplied by the Red Cross, but the ingredients included those much sought after eggs! Kristen Hill, our nurse volunteer, manned the check-in/registration table and monitored the donors after they gave, making sure they drank enough fluids before departing. And Tremaine Sails-Dunbar organized the drive, making the necessary arrangements with the Red Cross, donors and Windsor.

A special thanks to ALL of the committed blood donors who came to donate. Nine folks from our Windsor community participated along with nine more from the public. The Red Cross collected a total of 15 units of blood. Blood donors are vital because there is no substitute for blood. Donors provide the only supply of life-saving blood

for those in need.

WINDSOR SOUP KITCHEN AT WASHINGTON STREET UMC

Windsor UMC continues helping with the noon-time meal servings at Washington Street UMC Soup Cellar on the first Monday of the month. The current bagged meal format arose as a necessity to be able to continue to safely provide a meal to those in need in downtown Columbia during Covid. The Soup Cellar has retained this bagged meal format for nearly five years and plans to continue it in the foreseeable future.

On Windsor's January 6 serving day, 105 guests came through to receive a meal. That rainy morning's offering included a cup of

vegetable and rice with pastrami and brisket soup, a salmon salad, bologna or peanut butter and jelly sandwich, an orange, a package of wafer cookies and a bottle of Mountain Dew. Michelle Nicholson, Debbo Lackore, Patty Fowler, Tremaine Sails-Dunbar and Becky Leonard were the serving crew that morning.

Windsor served 111 guests the following month. The February 3 noon meal was very similar to January's and included a cup of vegetable and rice soup, this time with chicken and potatoes added. A turkey salad, ham or peanut butter and jelly sandwich, an orange, donut and bottle of Gatorade completed the meal. Michelle Nicholson, Debbo Lackore, Candy DePew, Patty Fowler, Tremaine Sails-Dunbar and Becky Leonard served that morning.

The truth is that Salkehatchie Summer Service, LLC is the pioneering in-state mission program for youth and adults who repair the homes of those who are unable to do so. It has existed for 46 years. One-week camps operate in 35 locations during the eight weeks of summer. Go to salkehatchie.org for more information.
- Excuse #2 "My knees are bad, so I can't get on the roof." The truth is that you are not required to get on a ladder or the roof. Most teams tackle several repairing tasks that keep you on the ground. Bring your own folding chair.
- Excuse #3 "I don't have enough vacation time." The truth is that although this is not a vacation, it will take your mind off your job and daily life. By the end of the week, you will feel amazingly satisfied for a job well done and spiritually refreshed.
- Excuse #4 "I can't afford it." The truth is that if you feel called to go, but you don't have the \$250 registration fee, funding is always available. Lodging is in churches. Bring an air-mattress.
- Excuse #5 "I'm too old. I'm too young." The truth is that if you are over 14 years old, you are old enough, and there is no maximum age limit.
- Excuse #6 "I have no tools." The truth is the site leaders will supply the tools needed for the job. You can even learn how to use power tools.
- Excuse #7 "I have no skills." The truth is the majority of people who attend a Salkehatchie camp for the first time have no skills whatsoever. It is on-the-job training. Salkehatchie camps usually leave plumbing and electricity jobs to the professionals.
- Excuse #8 "It is way too hot." The truth is that the work day begins at 7 a.m. when it is cooler. Because it is hot, the site leaders plan lots of breaks. Shade, cool water and snacks are readily available.
- Excuse #9 "I have no work clothes." The truth is that you just need old clothes that you don't care about. This is when thrift stores come in handy.
- Excuse #10 "I'm an adult woman." The truth is that women are required on every site.

Is this the year to forget your excuses and consider attending a Salkehatchie camp? Registration begins on March 1. Go to salkehatchie.org.
