### OUR 4 PRIORITIES

“Arise, shine, for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord has risen upon you.” Isaiah 60:1

Happy New Year, Friends! 2025 is here, and each new year arrives with a blank slate, a fresh start. During the Advent season, we anticipated and awaited the birth of the light of the world, Jesus Christ, the incarnation of God with us, our Emmanuel. We will continue celebrating Him with joy in our hearts for the precious gift God so generously gave us.

I am excited about 2025 at Windsor, and I am excited about the South Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church as we, the local church, work alongside the annual conference and Bishop Fairley to cultivate their “Our 4 Priorities” at Windsor. On several occasions, I’ve talked about the importance of connectionalism, a basic tenet of our theology. Connectionalism emphasizes that the church’s nature is primarily rooted among local congregations, not within local churches themselves, and it points to partnerships for collaboration in ministry, mission, and mutual accountability. Connectionalism gives us hope, healing, healthy churches, and effective leaders.

By developing leaders, we can collaborate with other local congregations to widen our reach in communities and work together for the common good of those in them. It’s like the author of Ecclesiastes 4:9-10 wrote, “Two are better than one, because they have a good return for their labor: If either of them falls down, one can help the other up.” I recently read an article about a young, new minister who was sent to plant a church. She didn’t know anything about the area, the neighborhood, or the surrounding communities. This young minister decided to think outside the box, “outside the box of the church building,” I might add. She had a crazy notion. She’d go where the people were! On a Saturday morning, she set up an old, beat-up card table on the sidewalk outside a laundromat. She served communion, prayed and, most of all, listened. She listened to their needs. Before she knew it, her

sidewalk laundromat ministry grew to a congregation of one hundred twenty. It’s because she listened, that’s what Jesus did. He listened and met the needs of the people who came to him. That’s what we must do. Listen to the needs of the community. When we listen, we can build connections with people; then, we will be astonished at what God can do and think how much we can accomplish when we join forces to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.

This year, the church council and I will collaborate to measure and evaluate the current realities and missional possibilities as we examine what Windsor can do, how we can do it, and what specific action we can take to accomplish the work. Healthy churches can be phenomenal—next-level churches, which is what I envision for Windsor in 2025. Friends, please be in earnest and constant prayer not only for Windsor but also for the South Carolina Conference, Bishop Fairley, the Cabinet, and all of the local churches across the state, the country, and the world. May God’s grace and mercy be with us all. *Pastor Claire*

## Join Us for Our Next SC Thrive Distribution of Free, Fresh Produce Items! Wednesday, January 15


Sweet potatoes, kale, collards, peppers, rice and grits were provided for approximately 55 families at our SC Thrive distribution on November 6. In December, Windsor distributed kale, collards and sweet potatoes to 50 families.

Windsor UMC is among several churches partnering with SC Thrive as a monthly food distribution point to strengthen the nutrition and food supply for residents in the Northeast Columbia area (zip code 29223), which is considered a “food desert.” The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP) is a federal program that helps supplement the diets of residents living in these “food deserts” by providing foods like fruits, vegetables and whole grains at no cost.



Windsor volunteers provide the hands and feet for the distribution. They pick up the food at the warehouse, package the boxed produce into family-sized portions and set the food out for families.

This food is available to ALL of us, free of charge, and changes during our local growing season. Everyone in our congregation and the local community is invited to come to pick it up. Our next distributions are scheduled for **Wednesdays, January 15 and February 5**. An email will be sent out closer to that time, reminding folks of the date and giving the times of the distribution. If you would like to volunteer to pick-up, package or distribute the food, please contact Kathy Hart or Becky Leonard.

## WINDSOR SOUP KITCHEN AT WASHINGTON STREET UMC

Windsor UMC continues helping with the noon-time meal servings at Washington Street UMC Soup Cellar on the first Monday of the month. Prior to Covid, the meal serving was a sit-down affair with enough tables to seat 60 folks at a time. However, at the beginning of Covid and with social distancing in effect, a bagged meal format was instituted in order to be able to continue providing a meal to those in need in downtown Columbia. The Soup Cellar has retained this bagged meal format for more than four years and plans to continue it in the foreseeable future.

On Windsor's November 4 serving day, 125 guests came through and received a meal. That morning's offering included: a cup of vegetable and beef stew soup, a tuna fish or peanut butter and jelly sandwich, an orange, a donut, bottle of water or raspberry tea and Halloween candy! Michelle Nicholson, Debbo Lackore, Patty Fowler, Tremaine Sails-Dunbar and Becky Leonard were the serving crew that morning.

The following month, Windsor served 119 guests. The December 2 noon meal was very similar to November's and included a cup of vegetable soup, an egg salad or peanut butter and jelly sandwich, an orange, donut and bottle of water. Debbo Lackore and her daughter, Caralee Workman, Michelle Nicholson and Patty Fowler served that morning.

Windsor's next serving days will be January 6 and February 3. 


