Seasons - Ecclesiastes 3:1

I can hardly believe it is November of 2021 already. It seems like it was just Christmas a few weeks ago, and now it is almost Christmas again. The solar calendar says we are approaching the end of the year; however, the Christian Calendar reflects the beginning of a new Christian year.

As we approach the Thanksgiving season, we first observe All Saints Day. All Saints Day is the first day of November immediately following the solar calendar's observation of Halloween. All Saints Day is a Christian celebration in honor of all the saints from Christian history. Western Christianity is observed on November 1 by the Roman Catholic Church, the Methodist Church, Lutheran Church and other denominations. The Christian festival of All Saints Day comes from a conviction that there is a spiritual connection between those in Heaven and on Earth.

All Saints Sunday is a day of remembrance for all the Christian people who died during the past year. This past year, many of us have lost a loved one or dear friend; so here at Windsor, we invite you to pin a bell on the All Saints banner in their memory. The All Saints banner will be at the narthex entrance until we present it in the sanctuary.

As we move into November, we observe Thanksgiving, a time when family and friends come

together, usually with a meal, to give thanks for each other and God's blessings upon us all year long.

Then, we end with Christ the King Sunday. Christ the King Sunday is celebrated on the last Sunday of the Christian calendar—this year, November 21—before the beginning of Advent that starts the new Church Year. We begin our new Christian year with the Advent season. Advent can be summed up with this prayer, "God of hope, I look to you with an open heart and yearning spirit. During this Advent season, I will keep alert and awake, listening for your word and keeping to your precepts. My hope is in you." -Matthew Kelly

For many Christians unfamiliar with the liturgical year, there may be some confusion surrounding the meaning of the Advent season. Some people may know that the Advent season focuses on expectation and think that it serves as an anticipation of Christ's birth in the season leading up to Christmas. This is part of the story, but there's more to Advent. Scholars believe Advent was a season of preparation for the baptism of new Christians at the January feast of Epiphany, the celebration of God's incarnation represented by the visit of the Magi to the baby Jesus (Matthew 2:1), His baptism in the Jordan River by John the Baptist (John 1:29), and His first miracle at Cana (John 2:1). During this season of preparation, Christians would spend 40 days in penance, prayer and fasting to prepare for the Resurrection celebration. This is known as Easter. Now, we can know the whole story, and His story is indeed our story, and all this happens in the seasons of the year.

This year, as we start, let it be a new beginning for all of us in many ways. But, most especially in our walk with Christ, let us walk in the newness of Christ for all the world to see His light shining in our lives.

20 Flood Buckets Filled!

September's daily TV news showed heart-wrenching images of the aftermath of Category 4 Hurricane Ida and the resulting flash floods across the southern and eastern US. Additional flooding was occurring across other parts of the country. Families lost everything and were thankful to God to be alive. For those whose homes were not destroyed, they were faced with the overwhelming task of cleaning up.

Requests for UMCOR (United Methodist Committee on Relief) flood buckets came in. Windsor responded to this call by filling 20 buckets! Each

bucket contained 14 UMCOR designated items, including dish gloves, laundry detergent,

concentrated household cleaner, dish soap, a scrub brush, scouring pads, a clothesline and clothespins, 33–45 -gallon heavy-duty trash bags, work gloves, insect repellant, air freshener, handiwipes, and N95 dust masks (we all know what these are as a result of Covid!)—plus the 5-gallon bucket and lid.

Becky McMillion, Anita Schmidt, Kathy Hart and Becky Leonard gathered on October 1 to sort the supplies and fill each bucket with the designated items. Blessings were bestowed upon the buckets and those who would receive them by Pastor Brown during Windsor's October 3 worship service. The following day, the blue flood buckets were delivered to the UMC Conference Office, and will be sent, along with additional donated buckets, to locations in need.

WINDSOR RETURNS FOR A SECOND SOUP KITCHEN SERVING SINCE THE COVID PANDEMIC BEGAN

Four Windsorites returned downtown to help on October 4 with the Soup Cellar Ministry at Washington Street UMC. This was the second time that Windsor volunteers have helped since the Covid pandemic began (Windsor's July and September 2021 servings fell on holidays for the church and the Soup Cellar was closed). For more than 14 months, from April 2020 until June 14, 2021, a small group of dedicated Washington Street UMC staff and members continued the weekday noon meal service, thereby keeping the Soup Cellar ministry going. Volunteers, on a limited basis, were invited to return mid-June 2021.

Since the beginning of Covid, the noon meal has consisted of a take-out bagged lunch service. Each day's volunteers are limited in number and need to wear a mask and observe pandemic protocols. Volunteers make sandwiches, pack items included in the bagged meal and hand the meal out. Masked guests come to the serving counter one at a time to receive their bagged meal and depart so that the next guest may pick up their meal. For added protection, servers stand behind a plexiglass screen and pass the meal to the guests.



Our October 4 bagged meal included a ham sandwich, soup with vegetables and diced pork patties, a clementine orange, homemade brownies and bottle of water. We thank members of Windsor's Generations Sunday School class (Dianne Dixon, Mitzi Shipman, and Kathy Robinson and her granddaughter) who baked more than seven dozen brownies for

the Soup Kitchen guests.

Over the past two months, the number of guests arriving to receive a meal has begun to climb. For the October serving, Windsor's crew of Ferrie Ward, Debbo Lackore, Kathy Hart and Becky Leonard served 73 men and women. In August, the number of guests were in the 60s while in mid-September, a few of the servings fed more than 90 guests.

Windsor's next serving dates will be Mondays, November 1 and December 6 — time still to be determined. If you are interested in helping

Commonly thought to be a children's type of theatrical entertainment, shadow plays probably originated in China during the Han dynasty two thousand

years ago. An original form of animation, flat images are manipulated by the puppeteers between a bright light and a translucent screen, on the other side of which is the audience. We are so blessed to have such a talented and giving musical director. Thank you, Daloni.

Also, a big thank you to our entrance and exit traffic managers: Wayne Nanney, Rock Schmidt, and Dave Christiansen. It was a big job because the line of cars went around the corner.

It wouldn't be October 31 without candy and Windsor members emptied the local store shelves. Thank you for all your candy contributions.
