"Give thanks with a grateful heart Give thanks to the Holy One Give thanks because He's given Jesus Christ, His Son"

Friends: Did you know the phrase "give thanks" is found seventy-three times in the Bible, while "thanksgiving" is found twenty-eight times? Of course, there are many synonyms: gratitude, grateful, appreciation. In the last few days, I've found myself humming the song "Give Thanks." It was written in 1986 by Henry Smith when he was struggling with finding a job. According to Hymnary.org "Smith saw his life this way: God is the 'all' of existence, so that I am called to 'give thanks."

The Thanksgiving holiday is four weeks away, and what most people consider the official start of the "holiday" season. Traditionally, we were taught in school that in 1621, the Plymouth colonists, the Puritans, England from and the **Native** American Wampanoag people shared an autumn harvest feast that is acknowledged as one of the first Thanksgiving celebrations in the colonies.³ There are numerous stories about the first thanksgiving in America; however, I prefer to look no further than the Old Testament to find stories of thanksgiving celebrations. There are three pilgrimage festivals God commanded that the Israelites observe.


"Three times a year shall all your men appear before the Lord your God in the place that God will choose [referring presumably to the Temple in Jerusalem], on the festivals of Pesah (Passover), Shavuot (the Feast of Weeks), and Sukkot (the Festival of Booths). They shall not appear empty handed. Each shall bring his own gift, appropriate to the blessing which the Lord your God has given you" (Deuteronomy 16:16). We're probably most familiar with Passover, but there are two others: Shavuot sometimes better known as (festival of weeks) held in the spring and Sukkot or Feast of (Tabernacles, booths, or tents) held in the fall. All three coincide with important harvest times in the Land of Israel: Passover with the barley harvest, Shavuot with the harvesting of the wheat, and the celebration of Sukkot marks the conclusion of the fruit harvest and the last harvest festival before the onset of the winter rains in the land of Israel.

Sukkot also celebrates the wandering of the Israelites in the desert for forty years, when they had to rely only upon God for food and protection. Flimsy sukkot (tents, tabernacles) are built that represent the huts the Israelites dwelt in during their time in the desert after escaping from slavery in Egypt. The imagery and ritual of the Sukkot revolves around rejoicing and thanking God for the completed harvest. Sukkot is a joyful holiday and justifiably referred to as *zeman simchateynu*, the "season of our joy." We can see this festival referred to in the New Testament. After Jesus revealed His glory to Peter, James, and John on the top of a mountain, Peter asked to build three temporary dwellings (sukkot), one each for Jesus, Moses, and Elijah (Matthew 17:1-13).

This Thanksgiving as we gather around the table with family and friends, let us "Give thanks with a grateful heart, give thanks to the Holy One, give thanks because He's given Jesus Christ, His Son." Amen. Pastor Claire.

Join Us for Our Next SC Thrive Distribution of Free, Fresh Produce Items! Wednesday, November 6, 11 a.m. - 1 p.m.

Windsor UMC is among several churches partnering with SC Thrive as a monthly food distribution point to strengthen the nutrition and food supply for residents in the Northeast Columbia area (zip code 29223), which is considered a "food desert." The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP) is a federal program that helps supplement the diets of residents living in "food deserts" by providing foods like fruits, vegetables and whole grains at no cost.

Grape tomatoes, okra, green peppers, green beans, and 20 watermelons were provided for approximately 109 families at our SC Thrive distribution on September 4. In October, Windsor distributed tomatoes, sweet potatoes, butternut squash, okra, zucchini, and peppers to 75 families.

Windsor volunteers provide the hands and feet of the distribution. They pick up the food at the warehouse, package the boxed produce into family-sized portions and set the food out for families.

This food is available to ALL of us, free of charge, and changes during our local growing season. Everyone in our congregation and the local community is invited to come to pick it up. Our next distributions are scheduled for **Wednesdays**, **November 6 and December 4**. An email will be sent out closer to that time, reminding folks of the date and giving the times of the distribution and, hopefully, the food items we will be handing out. If you would like to volunteer to pick-up, package or distribute the food, please contact Kathy Hart or Becky Leonard.

The boxes will be delivered to a local collection site.

Windsor Families Helping Families



WINDSOR SOUP KITCHEN AT WASHINGTON STREET UMC





Windsor UMC continues helping with the noon-time meal servings at Washington Street UMC Soup Cellar on the first Monday of the month. Prior to Covid, the meal serving was a sit-down affair with enough tables to seat 60 folks at a time. However, at the beginning of Covid and with social distancing in effect, a bagged meal format was instituted in order to be able to continue providing a meal to those in

need in downtown Columbia. The Soup Cellar has retained this bagged meal format for more than four years and plans to continue it in the foreseeable future.

The Soup Cellar was closed for Windsor's September serving day as it fell on Labor Day. During holidays, other groups provide meals for those in need.

Windsor's next serving day was October 7. The bagged meal contained a ham or peanut butter and jelly sandwich, orange, a large pastry and a large soda. Terrence Chisholm, the Soup Cellar Manager, had prepared beef and vegetable soup to add to the meal. Our crew of Noreen Doughty, Patty Fowler, Michelle Nicholson, and her daughter Irene Nicholson served 125 guests that morning.

15 Buckets, So Far! Windsor Responds to Flood Bucket Need

We've seen the pictures of the horrific flooding experienced by western North Carolina from Hurricane Helene in late September. Only two weeks later Hurricane Milton made its way across Florida. The SC UMC Conference Office put out a call for flood buckets.



Windsor responded to the request by filling 15 flood buckets. Each

bucket contained 14 UMCOR designated items, including dishwashing gloves, laundry detergent, concentrated household cleaner, dish soap, a scrub brush, scouring pads, a clothesline and

clothespins, 33-45-gallon heavy-duty trash bags, work gloves, insect repellant, air freshener, handiwipes, and N95 dust masks—plus the 5-gallon bucket and lid. Pastor Claire added a little Jesus to each bucket.

Thank you to everyone who supplied cleaning items and financial donations needed to fill this first donation of 15 blue flood buckets. The buckets were blessed during Windsor's October 27 Worship Service and we plan to deliver them to Trinity UMC in Blythewood on Saturday, November 2.



Recovery for those in western North Carolina will be a lengthy process and with the tremendous support that this campaign is receiving, Windsor plans to provide additional flood buckets in the not-too-distant future.
