<u>LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE REPORT</u> <u>WEEK 3</u>

Legislative Update

January 27, 2022

South Dakota has a 38-day legislative session, which will conclude March 28. All bills need to be introduced by Feb. 3 and must pass out of both houses by March 7.

Any bill deferred to the 41st Legislative day means it was killed since there are only 38 legislative days.

If you see the words "declare an emergency" on a bill, it means it would require 2/3rds of both chambers to pass.

- HB 1015 Require a moment of silence in schools to begin the school day. Failed in House committee.
- SD 46 Protect fairness in women's sports. Passed in Senate and House Committee. Needs House floor vote to pass.
- HB 1012 Protect students from critical race theory. Pending in House Education Committee
- HJR 5001 and HJR1 To apply for a convention of states under Article V of the Constitution of the United States, to impose fiscal restraints on the federal government, to limit the power and jurisdiction of the federal government, and to limit the terms of office for federal officials and members of Congress. Failed in Senate Committee HJR1 andPassed in House Committee HJR 5001. Goes to the House for a floor vote.
- SB 20 Revise the medical purpose defense related to the medical use of cannabis. Pending in Senate Health and Human Services Committee
- HB 1058 Revise the available forms of medical cannabis products. It would ban dispensaries from selling Cannabis-infused edibles such as candies, cookies and brownies. Passed House State Affairs Committee.
- HB 1113 prohibit threats made with the intent to coerce an abortion and to provide a penalty therefor. Referred to House State Affairs.

We should see more pro-life bills, such as a heartbeat bill, drop soon.

Medical Cannabis is a hot topic in the legislature. Legislators are working diligently to ensure asafe and effective program. To get more information on what our state government is doing goto:

Being organized for campaigns certainly helps the Republican cause.


Have you considered being a precinct committeewomen? Your county auditor and Republican Central Committee will help if you don't know the process.

History Tid Bits on President's

- Theodore Roosevelt was the first president to call his residence in Washington, D.C. the "White House." Prior to his term, it had been called the Executive Mansion or the President's House.
- When Millard Fillmore moved into the White House, it didn't have a Bible. He and his wife, Abigail, installed the first library.
- Franklin Pierce was the first president to have a Christmas tree in the White House.
- John F. Kennedy was the first president to hold a press conference on television.
- The Presidential Election of 1800 between John Adams and Thomas Jefferson was one of only two elections that resulted in the House of Representatives deciding who would be President of the United States. It was also the only time where there was a tie for President in the Electoral College. Although it wasn't a tie, the House of Representatives also had to decide the President in the election of 1824, between Adams son John Quincy Adams, and Andrew Jackson, when no candidate reached the required majority of electoral votes.
- The term "O.K." is credited to Martin Van Buren who was raised in Kinderhook, New York. After he went into politics, Van Buren became known as "Old Kinderhook." Soon people were using the term O.K. referring to Van Buren and the word "okay" was derived.
- William Henry Harrison served the shortest presidency, dying just 32 days after he was elected.
- Ulysses S. Grant established Yellowstone as the nation's first national park on March 1, 1872.
- George Washington was the only president who did not represent a political party.
- Harry S. Truman's mother, a Confederate sympathizer, refused to sleep in Lincoln's bed during a White House visit.
- Thomas Jefferson was the first president to shake hands with guests. Previously people bowed to Presidents. Jefferson's library of 6,000 books was purchased for \$ 23.950 and formed the basis of the Library of Congress.
- Ulysses S. Grant was the first president to run against a woman candidate, Virginia Woodhull the nominee of the "Equal Rights Party" in 1872.
- Gerald Ford once worked as a fashion model for Cosmopolitan and Look magazines in the 1940's. He was on this Cosmopolitan cover with Phyllis Brown in April 1942. Illustrator Bradshaw Crandall.

By-Laws Committee Report

Please refer below to the copy and pasted sections from our SDFRW By-Laws (September 2020). Thanks for all you do, as we work together to get Republicans elected up and down the ticket in November! Section 11. Candidacy for Public Office

A. Guidelines

1. <u>It is a State Federation policy that SDFRW as an organization shall not take sides in a</u> <u>Republican contest for public office, whether the position is at the local, county,</u> <u>legislative, state or federal level, prior to the Primary Election or State Republican</u> <u>Convention.</u>

2. Should a member in a leadership position, whether in a local club or SDFRW, choose to run for office at a local, county, legislative, state or federal level, said member shall be relieved of her duties as an officer of SDFRW or the local club until the Primary Election or State Republican Convention has been completed.
a. The purpose is to maintain a position of objectivity and non-bias.
b. The member may return to her position of leadership at the completion of the Primary Election or the State Republican Convention.

3. Should a member in leadership position, whether in a local club or SDFRW, choose to run for office as an independent or a candidate of another party at the local, county, legislative, state or federal level, said member shall step down from her position. This applies to the Primary Election, State Republican Convention and General Election.

Section 12. Endorsement Policy

A. Guidelines

1. The President and Campaign Chair shall not publicly endorse any candidate for public office in any primary, runoff, special or non-partisan race where two or more known Republicans are in the race.

2. <u>No endorsement or evidence of support by any member shall be issued</u> <u>using the SDFRW affiliation, logo, or stationary</u>

3. An officer of the organization who is a candidate or whose spouse or family member is a candidate shall be exempt from this rule, however, they may not do so in the name of the organization by utilizing the logo or stationary of the state federation or local club.
