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7th Annual Car Show Opens August 4

The Royal Oak Historical Society Museum will host its 7th Annual Car Show fundraiser on Saturday, August 4 with a special preview party planned the evening before on Friday, August 3.

The theme of this year's Car Show is rear engine cars, sports cars, and muscle cars. Included with the art work will be a display of Tucker car memorabilia, pedal cars, Batmobile

models, and will also include an Isetta car parked inside the museum. Also inside the museum will be the "Woodward Memories Exhibit" and the "Automotive Concept Art Exhibit"

This year's Automotive Concept Art Exhibit will honor the memory of Robert Edwards, whose passion was automotive design art, where he amassed one of the most comprehensive collections of automobile art in the country and became one of the leading experts in the field. At the time of his death, Robert was working on a film honoring the auto designers of the mid-20th century.

"The automobile is the most significant industrial object of the 20th century," Robert was quoted as saying. "The artwork that was created by these talented, but often unappreciated men and women, in the closed studios of the automotive companies is rarely seen (by the public); only around 5 percent of it still exists. As for the public viewing, many generations will have the opportunity to see this great display of creativity and to appreciate the art and science of automotive styling."

Robert's dream for far-reaching automotive art will be realized next year with an exhibit planned at the Detroit Institute of Arts.

The premier opening is from 7-9 p.m. Friday, August 3. Meet the designers and clay modelers while you "cruise" down Woodward Avenue as it appeared in the 1900s to present day.

The car show is from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Saturday, August 4. Registration is \$15. Dash plaques goodie bags will be given out to the first 75 entries. Enjoy the music by Jaime Burean and Chris Wietzke and also enter for a chance to win \$100.

The Camus House 520 Kayser Street

Adaptive Reuse of Store to Home Built in 1925

One of the most charming and convenient features of life in the early part of the 1920s was having a "corner store" in the neighborhood. In 1925, Emile Camus and his wife's nephew's Stewart Lynn, built this one-story frame structure on the northwest corner of Kayser and Sixth streets. The front portion facing east was called Camus Grocery Store and sold groceries and candy. This would have been appealing to the children attending Ulysses S. Grant Elementary School across the street.

Living quarters for Emile F. and his wife, Myrtle, were attached behind the store and consisted of a kitchen, large dining room, three bedrooms, and a bathroom.


Since it was partially a commercial

sidewalk with a two-step concrete slab leading up to the recessed entry of the store.

On either side of the entry there were plate glass display windows and above was a typical flat false front. Access to the living quarters was through the store as well as through an outside entry on the south side.

Beneath the sharply angled roof-line there was an attic space which was the playroom for young Emile Jr., who climbed a ladder in one bedroom into the area where he had a train set.

The Camus daughter, Marguerite, married Alfred John Hermann, who worked for his other brother George, at the bakery on South Main Street. They had eight





Royal Oak Then & Now

It seems that the face of our city is changing from day to day. Along with the changes, there are many buildings in Royal Oak which have remained relatively unchanged for as long as many of us have lived here. For this edition of *Royal Oak Then & Now*, we take a look at the corner of 12 Mile and Woodward where the Shrine of the Little Flower church has stood for more than 80 years. The "Then" photo was taken July 31, 1937 just after the opening of the Shrine Super Service station. Looking closer at the photo,

this station, operated by Robert Antwis, was a full service station that featured tire repair, lubrication and car washing. Behind the station, you can see the iconic Shrine crucifix tower rising above the trees. On the east side of the service station, which faces away from the photo, there was a refreshment stand built for the many visitors who would travel to see the Shrine. Although the service station has changed many times over the years and been demolished and rebuilt, the tower remains as it did on this day in the summer of 1937.

What's Going On At The Orson Starr House?

The Orson Starr house had its annual show of historic bridal gowns last Sunday at its Open House with 17 gowns and many visitors to enjoy them.

This latest attraction will be available at the Open House from 1-4 p.m. on Sunday, August 12. The house was built in 1845 for the Starr family, but others have lived there making their own changes. Come see the "new" old kitchen, a part of the restorations that are constantly going on. We love new members to our Orson Starr House Guild. The Orson Starr House is a Michigan farmhouse that was originally constructed about 1845. Located at 3123 N. Main St., one block south of Thirteen Mile Road, the house is owned by the City of Royal Oak and is open to the public from 1-4 p.m. on the second Sunday of each month or by prior arrangement. Additional parking is available two doors to the south at the Salvation Army Citadel.

The house was occupied by the Starr Family for nearly 100 years and was home to one of Royal Oak's pioneering families. Open houses and tours are provided by the members of the Orson Starr House Guild, a volunteer committee that organizes special events at the monthly sessions.

Admission is free, however, donations are always welcome.

Honoring Judge Leenhouts

The Royal Oak Historical Society, with the support of the Leenhouts Family and 44th District Court Chief Judge Derek Meinecke, wish to honor Judge Keith J. Leenhouts, a visionary jurist, Royal Oak Citizen of the Year, and member of the Royal Oak High School Hall of Fame. Judge Leenhouts was elected to the Royal Oak bench in 1959.

Early on, the judge was deeply troubled by a system that appeared unable to break the cycle of crime. In 1960, Leenhouts launched the "Volunteers In Probation" program calling on community-minded volunteers to serve as "sponsors" to meet with probationers for 12 hours per month. As a result of his passion and commitment to



making a difference, Leenhouts enrolled many Royal Oak community leaders in a program that would not only transform Royal Oak's system of justice — it literally transformed the entire country's approach to probation.

The results from Judge Leenhouts program were incredible. The Volunteers In Probation Program was 11.5 times more successful than other traditional court programs. In the late 1960s, Reader's Digest twice covered the efforts of Judge Leenhouts and the impact of his program. In 1967, Look magazine designated Royal Oak as one of seven cities in the United States to be called an "All American City".

In recognition of these efforts, Judge Leenhouts received the National Council on Crime and Delinquency "Excellence in Probation" award, and in his lifetime was honored by five U.S. Presidents for his innovative and effective program.

The Royal Oak Historical Society is looking for your help to memorialize this important figure in our community's history with a permanent display and an official renaming of the 44th District Court Probation Department. We should never forget his work and his message of the power of investing in people.

In 2001, the home was taken over by Dan and Megan Dubensky, and they undertook a complete transformation of the house and yard. The secluded side yard has lovely landscaping featuring a very large, well-pruned silver maple in one corner near the cedar deck. Other plantings include arbor vitae, a weeping cherry, and a Japanese maple.

Inside the house there have been several changes. The wall that formerly separated the store from the living quarters was removed, thus increasing the feeling of spaciousness. The north wall of this room has a window wall looking into the side yard and at one end is a wood burning fireplace. Strategically placed close to the front entry is a small table and chairs with a view across to Grant Park, where the school once stood. The original three bedrooms and bathroom locations remain the same, however, a newly created stairway now leads to a master bedroom with a bathroom that once was the attic.

The owners have taken the best elements of the past and transformed them with appropriate changes into a real treasure.
