Basin Villages Forum

CCB for StGB Villages / basinvillagesforum.asn.au / PO Box 37, St Georges Basin 2540

Two newly elected Shoalhaven City Councillors attended the BVF October meeting. Councillors presence at Forum meetings is invited and encouraged as it gives local residents the chance to meet their elected representatives and also notify them of problems that are occurring.

It was noted that Mitchell Pakes had resigned after winning election as Councillor causing a count back to find his replacement

Councillor Gillian Boyd has been a regular at Forum meetings during her recent term as a Ward 3 Councillor. Councillor Bob Proudfoot was also in attendance.

Both Councillors spoke to the meeting about SCC finances and advised that a Financial Advisory Committee was being formed that would include 5 community members. Other issues discussed were the 45deg rule and Vincentia Golf Club outcome.

State of local roads also raised and quality of repair. Noting that Disaster Fund from NSW Govt could assist Council.

CCB Executive meeting with Council. Representatives of BVF will attend the Combined Community Consultative Bodies (CCB) Executive meeting with Shoalhaven City Council staff and Councillors. This meeting gives all CCB reps the chance to hear about Council issues and discuss their own with SCC. Outcomes of these meetings are reported to Forum monthly meetings.

Island Pt Jetty. Work has commenced on the almost destroyed jetty at end of Island Point Rd, St Georges Basin after the work being logged in 2021. Unknown if work will be completed by Christmas.

Name change was discussed and highlighted that the only possible change would be for renaming Basin Villages Forum and not for the St Georges Basin waterway.

Noted that a Great white shark had been seen in St Georges Basin waterway.

All residents in northern local villages of St Georges Basin are automatically members of BVF, able to attend meetings and not only have input into issues raised but to raise issues occurring in their local area.

Basin Villages Forum meets every 3rd Monday of each month excepting December and January of each year.

The next meeting of the BVF will be 17th February 2025 at St Georges Basin Community Centre, Meriton St, St Georges Basin. Enquiries – 0411 572 725

INGREDIENTS

- 1kg lamb mince
- 1 small brown onion, chopped
- 2 garlic cloves, crushed
- 1/2 tsp chilli flakes
- 1 tbsp chopped fresh mint leaves
- 1 tbsp chopped fresh flat-leaf parsley leaves

- 2 tsp mild paprika
- 1/2 tsp ground ginger
- 2 tsp ground cumin
- 1 tsp ground coriander
- Skewers

METHOD

- 1. Place all ingredients above into a bowl. Mix to combine.
- 2. Shape 1/4 cup lamb mixture at a time into sixteen 8cm long sausages. Thread 1 sausage onto each skewer. Place on a large baking tray. Cover. Refrigerate for 20 minutes or until firm.
- 3. Heat an oiled barbecued plate on high. Add koftas. Reduce heat to low. Cook, turning occasionally, for 10 minutes or until cooked through.
- 4. Transfer to a large baking tray. Cover with foil. Rest for 5 minutes. Serve.

Local Youth Leader Makes History in Shoalhaven

Old Erowal Bay's Harriet Percy has made history as the first young person in the Shoalhaven to complete the Youth Insearch Foundation's esteemed Year Long Leadership Program. Harriet graduated in October 2024, joining 14 other youths from across NSW, Queensland, and Victoria in an intensive journey of training and personal growth. Over the past year, she has served as a trainee leader at four Youth Insearch camps, including one in Victoria, with plans to become a fully accredited leader by March 2025.

The Youth Insearch Program, active in Shoalhaven since 2022, began offering its transformative weekend workshops for local youth in early 2023. These two-night, peer-facilitated workshops create a safe and supportive environment for young people aged 14-20 to address trauma and life challenges using open dialogue and traumainformed practices. Led by trained Youth Insearch leaders and supported by social workers and other dedicated staff, the workshops help participants openly explore critical themes such as trust, selfesteem, grief, drugs and alcohol, communication, sexual assault, and family relationships. Firefly Bay and Basin has been a steadfast supporter of Youth Insearch since its establishment in the Shoalhaven, working actively to promote these life-changing workshops.

A Firefly staff member attends the weekend workshops as an Adult Support Worker and has referred more than ten of their clients to the program, witnessing firsthand the remarkable transformations these young people undergo.

Youth Insearch's reach in Shoalhaven includes outreach at Vincentia High School, Nowra High School and Bomaderry High School, connecting with a growing number of students. The Leadership Program itself takes on a select group each year, guiding them through a 12 month course that emphasises self-development, communication skills and leadership.

Looking ahead, Youth Insearch hopes that more young people who have participated in the weekend workshops will step up and join the 2025 Leadership Program, expanding a network of empowered young leaders. Currently, there are 11 applicants from our region.

With her inspiring journey, Harriet stands as a powerful role model, demonstrating that Shoalhaven youth can lead the way in personal growth, resilience, and community service.

WHAT LIES BEYOND UAE - UNITED ARAB EMIRATES

Simply put, seven states or Emirates, each with its own Emir as head, make up the country known as the United Arab Emirates or UAE for short. Each of these emirates is ruled by its own separate royal family with the emir of Abu Dhabi being the UAE's president and head of state while the emir of Dubai serves as the nation's prime minister.

The UAE (all seven states/Emirates) is classed as a country, with Abu Dhabi being the capital.

Perhaps the most known city within the Emirates is Dubai, being the hub of air traffic coming in from all directions making it a leading tourist destination and the playground for the rich and famous.

Whilst being close to other Arab countries such as Saudi Arabia, Oman and Yemen which in comparison seem 'closed' to westerners, the UAE and in particular Dubai, is one of the most multicultural countries in the world with only 15% of its population being native Emiratis while the remaining 85% are expatriates working and living there.

Opulence is everywhere and definitely on show. Dubai boasts the tallest building in the world - the Burj Khalifa. There is a 12 hectare artificial lake near the Dubai mall, at the centre of the Dubai development adjacent to the Burj Khalifa which has a light show every night from 6pm to 11pm, each half hour lasting about 5 minutes as well as a daytime show where the jets of the fountain sway in time to a range of melodies from 1pm to 1,30pm.

The other famous building is the 5 star hotel - the Burj Al Arab which is sometimes known as the world's only seven stars, when in fact officially the highest world rating for a hotel is 5 stars.

This hotel which sits on its own man-made island, is designed to resemble the graceful sail of an Arabian dhow (sailing boat). If you have a spare \$2,000+ you too could enjoy ONE night at this famous hotel.

Another show of opulence is the Palm Jumeirah which is an archipelago of artificial islands which from the air, resembles a palm tree. This structure added 56 kms to Dubai's coastline. Posh apartment towers, upmarket global restaurants, glitzy hotels, nightclubs and beach clubs dominate the landscape.

Yet another man-made feature is The World Islands - an archipelago of small artificial islands constructed in the shape of a world map, again best seen from the air.

Throughout the Emirates, although most of the wealth was/is attained through oil and gas reserves, Dubai is not the largest exporter. But, through its strategic location and leadership, exploitation of tourism, trade and real estate, has made Dubai the most well-known and visited.



What Identification do JPs require? The Justice of the Peace may require identification from you on a variety of forms you may want them to sign, so I have shown a list from the Justice of the Peace Handbook put together by the Department of Community and Justice for some guidance.

Any one of these approved identification documents is acceptable, provided that it has not expired (except for an Australian passport, which is acceptable if it expired no more than two years ago). You must not accept any identification document that has been cancelled.

- A driver's licence or permit with a photograph of the person in whose name the licence is issued, whether issued in Australia or another country. Please note Digital Licences are acceptable as identification but cannot be certified.
- a NSW photo card issued under the Photo Card Act 2005
- an Australian proof of age card which contains the photograph of the person in whose name the card is issued
- an **Australian passport** (either current or expired less than 2 years ago)
- a passport or similar document with the person's photograph and signature issued by another country or by the United Nations (with an English language translation if not in English)
- a national identity card issued by another country or the United Nations for the purpose of identification with the person's photograph and signature (with an English language translation if not in English)
- an Australian citizenship certificate (not laminated)
- a foreign citizenship certificate (with an English language translation if not in English)
- a birth certificate, whether issued in Australia, another country or by the United Nations (with an English language translation if not in English)

Shoalhaven Justices of the Peace at work for you

IDENTIFICATION

- a birth extract issued by an Australian state or territory
- a pension card issued by Centrelink that entitles the person in whose name the card is issued to financial benefits
- a credit card or passbook from a bank, building society or credit union
- an account or statement of account from a bank, building society or credit union, up to one year old
- a Medicare card, pensioner concession card, Department of Veterans' Affairs entitlement card or other entitlement card issued by the Federal or any State Government
- an electoral enrolment card or other evidence of enrolment as an elector, up to 2 years old
- a student identity card, or a certificate or statement of enrolment up to 2 years old from an educational institution
- in the case of an inmate, an inmate identification card, or other document containing information identifying the inmate, prepared or used by the correctional centre in which the inmate is held in the case of a forensic patient, a residential identity card, or other document containing information identifying the patient, prepared or used by the mental health facility, correctional centre or other place in which the patient is detained
- in the case of a mental health patient other than a forensic patient, a residential identity card, or other document containing information identifying the patient, prepared or used by the mental health facility to which the patient is admitted
- a **police identification card** issued to a police officer by the Commissioner of Police.

A copy of one of the above identification documents is acceptable if the copy has been

certified as a true copy by either Justice of the Peace; Public Notary; Commissioner of the Court for taking affidavits; Australian legal practitioner authorised to take and receive any affidavit; the NSW Registrar-General; a Deputy Registrar-General, or other person by law authorised to administer an oath. However, the person who certified the copy must not be the same person who is witnessing the statutory declaration or affidavit.

You must not accept a certified copy of an identification document if the copy shows that the original has expired (except for an Australian passport, which is acceptable if it expired no more than two years ago) or that the original has been cancelled.

Looking back and Looking forward

As the year draws to a close, the members reflect on the projects that have been completed, or the planning for the next. As like any craft, spinning, weaving and felting with the associated knitting and crocheting becomes somewhat addictive. How can you resist the lure of another colourful, squishy bag of wool!!

I was gifted a merino fleece from my son-in-law's family farm, given with the statement: "We saved you the best fleece!" This was a bit daunting as there was 7.5kg of very dirty but fine merino fleece and being not a super experienced spinner, quite a challenge!

The process is slow as I have to carefully wash small amounts at a time; requiring soaking, several washes and then a number of rinses. Then comes drying, flicking it out with a dog comb and carding it, using what is called a drum carder which further brushes the fibre. Now its ready to spin, ply, skein and wind into balls. What excitement when I began the knitting!

So you know what I am looking forward to in 2025..... further washing, carding, spinning and knitting for two jumpers, because like most spinners and weavers, I have, dare I say it, bags of such beautiful wools that I am itching to spin.

So if you want to spend some time with others, revive or start a new craft, come and join us in 2025. You are always welcome to join us. It doesn't matter if you know little or anything about spinning or weaving, the ladies are always delighted to set you off on a discovery involving fibres: wool, alpaca, silk or cotton to name a few. We do have fun!!

Don't forget we are having our Biennial exhibition in the Tomerong Hall over the June long weekend in 2025. You never know there might be a finished jumper on exhibition!!!



NOWRA C.W.A.

During 2024, the Nowra Branch of the Country Women's Association has celebrated 100 years of existence. As part of these celebrations, a display cabinet full of the group's memorabilia was set up in the archives of the Nowra Library. On the four levels of the cabinet were a variety of items and information which reflects the origins and development of NOWRA C.W.A.

On an information piece on one of these levels was recorded details of the first President of the Nowra C.W.A. Branch. Mrs Sarah Emily Morton was born in 1873 as Sarah Fuller. She married a Scottish doctor named Thomas Anderson, and they began their married life at Kiama in 1894. However, four years later, Dr Anderson was to die of consumption, leaving Sarah a widow in her mid-twenties.

Almost two decades later, Sarah married Mark Morton in 1919. He was the then Member for Wollondilly in the N.S.W. Parliament. Mark was the son of Henry and Jane Morton. In fact, he was one of their eight sons, three of whom (including himself) were elected as parliamentarians. In the September **About**...... Monthly Feature this year, Numba House was mentioned as being the family home, with their father Henry Gordon, or H.G. Morton, working as 'the Right Hand Man To Alexander Berry' when the flood plain south of the Shoalhaven River was being developed for farming in the latter half of the 1800s.

In the same information piece on the C.W.A., it stated that "within a year of the branch being established, a block of land in Berry Street was purchased for 400 pounds, and a single room building with a verandah and toilets was built at a cost of 85 pounds". The President continued in her role until she died in 1935. One of the services established at the Nowra C.W.A. rooms was the employment of a baby health clinic nurse the year before this. This service was to continue there for 63 years.

Formed in 1922 aiming to improve the quality of life for women in rural areas, this association has been at the forefront of a wide range of activities ever since. Although long perceived as "the bastion of conservative older women from the bush, who spend their days making scones", the Country Women's Association has been much more than that over its existence. It has always raised funds through members using traditional skills like baking, but its advocacy for women living in rural communities has always been at its heart. Establishing services in these communities such as baby health centres, rest rooms, maternity wards and hostels for girls to attend school are examples of the work that C.W.A. groups have achieved during their existence.

In the case of this year's display in the town library, a substantial number of projects it has supported within and beyond the local district were listed. This includes: C.W.A. disaster funds; education of women in remote areas and Third World countries; our local hospital, including the Linear Accelerator Appeal; Nowra Eisteddfod and local high schools; Overseas Aid and water in to villages in Third World countries; knitting for the needy; the Royal Flying Doctor Service; and scholarships for young Australians. This range of activities are only some of the projects the local branch has undertaken down the years.

Within the display, a centerpiece feature was a hardback book produced in 2022 for the centenary of the organisation across New South Wales, Named THE WOMEN WHO CHANGED COUNTRY AUSTRALIA, this 320 page book is a comprehensive history of the development of the C.W.A. While acknowledging in its earliest chapters that "a national umbrella organisation has existed for much of the past 75 years, each state, and the Northern Territory, operates quite separately. They do not even share the same motto, constitution, policies or priorities". The focus of this book is on the hundreds of branches which have existed across N.S.W. In her introduction. author Liz Harfull states that they "laid the foundations for every C.W.A. in Australia".

By the start of the 1960s, approaching its 40th anniversary, this volunteer organisation had



assets exceeding a million pounds, which would today be worth many multiples of that figure in dollar value. The previous decade had seen C.W.A. membership peak a few hundred over 30,000 in 1953. By 1961, there were 27,000 members spread across 573 branches. Statewide, this represented "250 rest rooms, 175 baby health centres, 70 libraries, 20 playgrounds, and 10 holiday homes and cottages" established by C.W.A. branches. A feature of this period was that "a growing number of young mothers were joining branches, filling the spaces left by the pioneering members who had passed away".

This decade saw one of the most intriguing chapters of NOWRA C.W.A.'s centenary of existence unfold. Its membership gave their assistance to the formation of a Wreck Bay-Worrigee Aboriginal C.W.A. Branch in July 1961. They were "concerned about living conditions at the Wreck Bay Aboriginal Reserve", but particularly the fact that "its isolation and lack of public transport services limited opportunities for residents" living there, at its location 40 kilometres south east of Nowra. Fishing had been one of the few employment opportunities for Aboriginal people at Wreck Bay, with some families actually relocating to the Worrigee area, where a growing number of families had relocated in an attempt to be closer to town. This unofficial settlement was on private land, but the living conditions there were quite poor.

During the following year, a conference was held at the end of March in Nowra, at which a South Coast Aborigines Advancement League was formed. This conference was addressed by the C.W.A. State President Mrs Thelma Bate. This Aboriginal C.W.A. Branch was part of a series of such branches formed during this decade across N.S.W. Boggabilla (1956), Kempsey (1960), Taree (1960), Grafton (1962) and Griffith (1962) were all other regional centres around which similar branches were formed.

Each of these branches were allocated an entire chapter in a 2015 book written by La Trobe University (Melbourne) Indigenous Studies lecturer Dr Jennifer Jones. Her book COUNTRY WOMEN AND THE COLOUR BAR was subtitled 'Grassroots Activism and the Country Women's Association'. In a period of the mid 20th century when Australia was gearing up towards the 1967 referendum on Aboriginal people being

given voting rights, the C.W.A. as a volunteer organisation was doing far more than 'raising funds with scones when providing afternoon teas'. In this case, it actively sought to attempt to culturally assimilate Aboriginal women in these branches formed across the state. These instances of Aboriginal and white women working together met with varying degrees of success.

In the case of NOWRA C.W.A. assisting the Aboriginal women form the Wreck Bay—Worrigee C.W.A. branch, a key relationship was one that existed between Belle McLeod and Purth Moorhouse. Purth was first elected as President of NOWRA C.W.A. in 1954. She was re-elected President for another two years in 1961, and again for another year in 1964.

Belle was born in 1927 as the daughter of Bob and Vera Brown. They were prominent members of the local Aboriginal community. Belle attended Bomaderry Public School, from which she graduated as Dux of the school. The Nowra High School principal encouraged her to continue her education at a secondary level, upon which Belle became the first Aboriginal child enrolled to attend high school in Nowra.

After leaving high school several years later, Belle would work for Mrs Moorhouse as a house maid. This was during wartime. As the wife of a prominent businessman in the local dairy industry who had in the 1930s been Nowra Rotary Club's founding father (About* Monthly Feature March 2022), as well as being the mother of three young boys, Purth "redecorated a room in pink for her new Aboriginal maid". This kind hearted treatment led to a friendship between the teenager and the married mother which over a decade later would through their bond of trust help in this community attempt to challenge 'the colour bar', as it was relevant within the Shoalhaven.


While the Wreck Bay-Worrigee C.W.A. branch did not survive beyond the 1960s, it did lead to other opportunities for local Aboriginal women, such as becoming enrolled in courses at Nowra Technical College (today the T.A.F.E. College) in subjects such as sewing, dressmaking, cooking and other handicrafts. As Belle told Jennifer Jones for her 2015 book, "the C.W.A. branch was the first thing that ever happened that was good for our Aboriginal people. We had no services, no organisations, and no nothing".





Did The Punishment Fit The Crime?

For all those readers who have ancestors in the Shoalhaven, and who are researching their family history without assistance; using suspect facts, hints and tips from subscription websites, you are missing out on such a great deal of local information which you will not find on line. For instance, if your family attended the old Pyree School in the early 1900's, you can prove by reading our extract from the Pyree School Punishment book that any stories of harsh treatment from schoolmasters, was actually, very sadly, true.

On 29th January 1900, Linda Armstrong and Mary Barron both aged 7 each received one slap of the cane for "looking about", and the following day Linda earned 2 slaps of the cane for "neglect of work".

Wasting water was punishable with 2 strokes of the cane, while "adding a word to a note from his guardian" earned William Fryer 6 strokes.

In 1903 Rupert Lessill age 13½ was in trouble quite often and amongst his offences he was given 6 strokes for "bringing burrs into school and throwing them into girls hair".

It appears that most of the disruption and bad behaviour was from the older pupils, as many of them feature regularly, with the record showing a pattern of certain individuals displaying rather disturbing behaviour traits.

Another punishment record is from the Berry Estate Papers, taken from microfilm reel 2172 held in the Family History Society library at Pyree

On 5th January 1829, a convict named Mooring per the ship Blenheim was sentenced to receive 25 lashes from The Flogger for giving the women in the kitchen a bottle of rum.

On August 26th 1837 William Jones per ship Susan was given "20 lashes for having been found behind the slaughter house with 2 others who ran away – he is a very lazy idle man, & has been much trouble of late". For neglecting his work on February 24th 1838 he was given another 50 lashes followed by another 50 lashes on February 23rd 1839 for neglect of work at Humes Farm. "he has been ever a surly lazy fellow". "Past redemption"

These examples are a tiny sample of records held locally which you would never find unless you spent weeks in Sydney in the Mitchell library, or days in NSW State records at Kingswood, and are certainly not available at home online.

SFHS Research Centre is The Shoalhaven Family History Society in the Old Pyree School, 888 Greenwell Point Road Pyree. We are open for research every Sunday & the 1st & 2nd Thursday of each month, all days from 10am to 2pm. Take a look at the website *shoalhavenfamilyhistory. org.au* for more information.

Members can use the facilities free of charge and a small fee of \$10 allows visitors to research for the day.

Our member's meetings are held on the 1st Saturday of the month (excluding January) at 1.30pm, with afternoon tea to enjoy - a chat and catch up for everyone. Come along one day to see what we do and how we can help you.

Tomerong School Centenary

The annual examination of the Tomerong pupils was held on 11 December 1869, at which good results were achieved by several of the students. 'At the examination, owing probably to the exigencies of the harvest season, more of the parents were absent than was desirable, but to make amends, the Rev. Mr Hughes the Wesleyan clergyman from Milton afforded his valuable presidency. English grammar, to the diligent study of which, William Cobbett, perhaps the purest writer and speaker of genuine English in modern times, attributed his wonderful facility of tongue and pen, is the branch of learning to which Mr Matthew Craig, the teacher, has directed special attention of his pupils, and their proficiency showed that his assiduity had not been thrown away. Arithmetic, mental and manual.

appeared to have been placed on an equal grade with grammar in the scale of study. The solutions by the scholars of questions in mental Arithmetic were for promptitude and accuracy creditable to the teacher and the taught. Reading, writing from diction, and geography came in for a share in the exercises, and were evidently not excluded from the routine of instruction. Without disparagement to the deserts of other scholars, Miss Marian Mathie, Miss Catherine Bryce, Master Alexander Bryce, Master Patrick Daley, and Master James Watt, distinguished themselves by the readiness and correctness of their replies to the questions propounded. At the close of the examination, the Rev. Mr Hughes addressed to the children some judicious remarks expressive of his gratification with the result.' On the following day the pupils were treated to a picnic at the Erowal Estate, the home of Mr and Mrs Alexander Bryce.

Matthew Craig obtained permission from the Council of Education to propose a subscription list to local residents to raise funds to erect a teacher's residence at the school. A public meeting was held to discuss the matter and it was agreed that public funds would be collected for the dwelling. It is unclear how much was actually raised, but it was reported by Matthew Craig that he was the largest subscriber and erected and maintained the dwelling at a cost of £20. The dwelling was obviously not substantial, as the 1871 Inspector's Report stated the need for a new residence for the teacher, and also showed that pupil numbers were low. The low enrollment resulted in a reduction of Matthew Craig's salary to £60 per annum from January 1872.

An unknown correspondent reported in the 'Kiama Independent' in September 1871, that at that time the school showed an attendance of 30 pupils and that '.....their attainment's in the rudiments of education would bear favourable



comparison with those of more densely populated places, where the children being less useful at home get a longer and less interrupted schooling. This is a disadvantage experienced at all small country schools'.



The Council of Education's 1872 annual report on the condition of Public Schools showed that the Tomerong School had enrollments of 32 boys and 12 girls. 'The grounds are fenced and the buildings are in fair repair, but a lavatory, additional hat pegs and a residence are needed. The stock of furniture, apparatus and books is

sufficient, but the records are incomplete. The pupils are clean and orderly, but not sufficiently punctual. Singing and drawing is not taught, but the proficiency in the other branches is tolerable.'

The School Inspector visited in August 1873 and reported that 'This is a substantial and well-built schoolroom of sawn slabs with shingled roof, but the teacher's residence is a mere hut. A good playground is enclosed and cleared. The building is frequently used for religious purposes and a disarrangement of the furniture etc. left for the teacher to make good is a common consequence. Attainment's... on an average between indifferent and moderate... the teacher clings to the old forms with a tenacity that greatly mars his usefulness.'

The 1874 School Inspector's annual report showed an enrollment of 30 children: 22 boys and 8 girls. 'No alteration in these premises. The records are in a very backward and defective state. There are no programmes of lessons. The pupils include nearly all the children of the locality, but are irregular and unpunctual in attendance. The government is very feeble and the general discipline and the moral tone are consequently unsatisfactory. The classification is informal and necessarily inute. For some time past the school has been conducted with but very little regularity or system - the result mainly of the teachers ill health. The attainment of the pupils are of very limited range. Their proficiency averages only moderate. Singing is not taught' ... (extract from Tomerong Local History)

(The School celebrated its 150th anniversary in 2012 in the same location as the original building constructed in 1862).

Our final copy of the year, the year has flown by; we have enjoyed another year of "toil in the soil in the sun!" We are aware of the sun being hotter on us in the garden, especially around the herb garden which has buildings on two sides. Hats and long sleeved garments are a must to prevent burning.

The strawberries have thrived with hot and dry and the harvest has been exciting for our members with good picks twice a week. Silverbeet and lettuce have been available to the members throughout the full year, Spinach Pie the 'go to' recipe each week, for many of us. Keeps the vim and vigour in the working members!

In sorting previous About magazines, I happened to pick up the one from Jan/Feb 2017. Mention was made of Brad, his love of geometry, and the need for a design for the Heritage Herb Garden. He called it a Vesical Pisces, and this design was duly adopted. The Vesical Pisces in Latin literally means "bladder of a fish", reflecting the shape's resemblance to the conjoined dual air bladder/swim bladder found in most fish. In Latin the shape's name is mandorla (almond). A similar shape in three dimensions is the lemon. How clever, thank you Brad for the meaningful design and with pathways made of handmade bricks, it is a treasure for the Community Garden and has looked fabulous this spring.

Our fundraising morning, the third Saturday of the month, and with flags flying, we will welcome people to visit us from 10am till 12 noon on Saturday 21st December. Still time to purchase gifts of preserves, chutneys and pickles for the Christmas and holiday season and there will be baskets prepared especially. These make a delicious addition to any barbeque, picnic or feast and are always appreciated as a gift.

Fresh seasonal vegetables and various potted plants, excess donated from the members' gardens, will be available for sale.

This is our main source of income and used to cover running cost in the garden. We always welcome the support of our regular customers and new visitors are generally surprised at the array of delights on offer and with reasonable prices.

Perhaps the strange weather we have experienced over the previous months has caused problems with our tomato crop. Dr. Google has many theories as to the development of large leathery leaves on some of the toms that have been in the ground for 6 weeks or so. It is sort of 'take your pick' if you dare!! Is it a virus, too much fertilizer, not enough water? Or too hot to soon, then cold!! Is the Dr. taking climate change into account? Were the plants healthy, is the compost perfect?

Decision – remove and replace because we do so need a tomato harvest, it is important for the girls to make the pickles and chutney for the open day. Fingers crossed..... the hazards of gardening – nature can be fickle..... yes! It seems trial and error prevails! Again!

There are many varieties of fruit and vegetables growing in the garden for the summer. Pumpkin, cucumbers, zucchini, eggplant, corn and purple tomatillos have joined the staples carrots, silver beet, beetroot and lettuce.

There are two melon varieties planted, including a Santa Claus melon, sometimes known as Christmas melon or Piel de Sapo, originating in Spain with fruit like a Rugby football. It has a thick green striped outer rind and pale green to white inner flesh with a mild melon flavour and sweetness close to honeydew melons. Also growing is the new Sugar Baby watermelon, recently available to the home gardener and promising to be a good alternative to the larger rambling varieties. Both of these will be excellent for the members to share.

Citrus Fruit

Original Citrus – Of all the citrus fruits, I most enjoy the mandarin. It's super sweet, you can peel it with one hand tied behind your back and it doesn't drip on Mums nice clean floor. But here's something you might not know, the mandarin has a special feature – it is one of the 10 Original Citrus Fruits, living and growing unchanged since the Stone Age. Most of the other 870 or so citrus varieties are hybrids. They have been selectively bred over the years by humans. Why? Because man just likes to fiddle with things.

The three most important Original Citrus are the mandarin, the giant pomelo and the bitter citron. These are used to make nearly all the other hybrids. Less used are the sour kumquat, the inedible papeda and micrantha and the mangshanyegan (a Chinese mandarin). Last but not least we have three tiny limes: the desert lime, the little round lime and the finger lime. These little limes are all from the Great Southern Land, hidden in the summer for a million years.....

<u>Hybrid Citrus</u> – Here is a shortlist of the most popular hybrids showing which came from what and when:

The **orange** (all varieties sweet and bitter) is a cross between the mandarin and the pomelo. First bred in Asia in about 350 BC. By an incredible coincidence it is also orange in colour.

The **grapefruit** is a cross between the pomelo and the orange. First bred in Barbados around 1700. It comes in two colours, ruby red and yellow, and one flavour – grapefruit flavour.

The fruit of the poor **lemon** appears to be a natural cross between a bitter orange and a citron. Date of creation unknown. Two varieties deserving some space are the "lemonade lemon" – believed to be a lemon accidentally crossed with a mandarin in

NZ in the 1980's, and the "bush lemon" believed to be a cross between a mandarin and a citron. They were brought into Australia from India about a hundred years ago and left to go feral when "smoother" lemons became available.

The typical supermarket **lime** usually contains bits of everything: pomelo, citron, papeda, micrantha and orange, whereas the three Australian outback limes are not hybrids. They are unique to Australia and are all true originals – as old as the Dreamtime.

The **tangerine** is a mandarin crossed with a little bit of pomelo and/or orange. It was first bred in Tangiers, Morocco circa 1700, hence the name.

The **tangelo** is the orange coloured fruit with a bump on top. It's a cross between the grapefruit (or pomelo) plus the orange (or tangerine). Sweet and sour, easy to peel and very juicy. Born in the USA in 1911.

Hygiene Hint: if your fruit is very juicy, try eating it in the bath. No more drips and you come out clean as a whistle

We still cook Monday. Wednesday and Friday and try to have two shifts although most come at 6am and stay till 1.30/2pm. There are days we are there much later till 4 or even 5pm. And still having to go in on the weekend and do work.

We have 26 dedicated kitchen assistants. and while this sounds like a lot there is always one or two or even three away travelling and enjoying retirement. So the bottom line is we could always do with more kitchen assistants.

We are hoping with the opening of the new kitchen at South Nowra that North Shoalhaven Meals on Wheels have invested in will help with the workload as they will be making some of the meals.

We will soon be preparing for Christmas, so we hope this finds everyone happy and healthy and brings everything you wish for - Sue and the team.

It's a wonderful way for them to stay active, foster friendships, and develop a lifelong love for the outdoors.












