Basin Villages Forum

A Shoalhaven City Council Community Consultative Body

SANCTUARY POINT LIBRARY The June meeting featured a guest speaker from Sanctuary Point Community Pride (SPCP) who spoke on the Sanctuary Point Library at the invitation of the Forum. The long and protracted history of the Library was explained and the unsatisfactory nature for the community of the most recent decisions detailed by Gwen Price. SPCP have organised a petition for community members to sign calling for the Library Project to be reinstated. Gwen emphasised that this is not intended to be at the expense of other recreational and sporting facilities proposed for Francis Ryan Reserve area and that these deserve separate consideration in the interest of both community facilities. It is the intention that the petition will go via Local Member Liza Butler to State Parliament. The petition is being collected in person hard copy at various venues. The Basin Villages Forum is recommending your support.

BVF MEETINGS AND AGENDA After a two month break due to use of the Community Hall for a Polling Place and an electrical system upgrade the Forum resumed in June and some of the items dealt with at the June meeting are covered in this edition. Most items involved a report on the latest news and progress in topics of interest to the Forum and members

BHERWERRE WETLAND An application was made to Council to rezone all of the Bherwerre Wetland property to Conservation 2. At the moment it is covered by three zonings: Conservation 2, Rural 2 and Recreational. BVF had a Council response which indicated the wetland property will be included in the Review of the Local Environment Plan as had been requested.

NEW DEVELOPMENT PROPOSAL FOR ANSON STREET The Forum was made aware of a probable new development proposal for land on either side of Anson Street linked to the proponent of the Anson Street high rise development of seven years ago which remains. The Forum sought advice from Council and was promptly provided with detailed information, which will be presented at the July meeting.

This and another Basin CBD area development proposal are accessing an approach in which the proponent seeks to have the proposal dealt with as a 'State Significant' project, based on the value of the development but which then takes it out of the hands of Shoalhaven Council, who as the community can then make submissions.

LOCAL CHARACTER PLANNING PROPOSAL

The Forum made a submission in support of this proposal in 2024 and considered it as a major business item in March 2025, airing our concerns. The Mayor and three Councilors were present to join an excellent discussion.

Recent Council agenda and debate has led to the Proposal being rejected for inclusion the Local Environment Plan, which provides the various provisions for Zoning, Local Character examination remains a major and very serious exercise in dealing with proposals for development in the Basin, both villages and towns. Local Character concerns have continued to arise for the community and the Forum over many years now with particular developments, e.g. Anson Street, and decisions are not always made in favour of the community wishes, which have been provided as submissions, written and verbal presentations to, for example, The Land and Environment Court. It will, no doubt, remain a contentious subject in consideration of our future in the Basin and its towns and villages.

SAHSSI30 is a walk along the beautiful Jervis Bay coastline to raise funds for domestic violence survivors in the Shoalhaven and local women at our crisis accommodation sites. It is a grassroots community-driven event that has grown out of a desire to make positive change for women and children in the Shoalhaven. The event is organised by local volunteers and is a collaboration between Bay and Basin Amnesty, Heartcentre and Jervis Bay CWA.

This annual walk with hundreds of participants has raised nearly \$100,000 for SAHSSI Nowra Women's Refuge and keeps the focus on the issue of gender-based violence and homelessness in the local area.

The funds raised by SAHSSI30 have provided families who are living on or below the poverty line with access to activities and experiences that would not otherwise be available to them.

SAHSSI30 has funded a coach full of children to Mogo Zoo, purchased school holiday activities for children staying in the refuge, funded Christmas experiences, contributed to the refuge sanctuary garden, provided internet access in the refuge and helped with the construction of a children's playground. All money donated to SAHSSI is spent directly on the clients we support. You can walk as an individual or as a group and you can

walk ANY distance that suits you or simply donate to a great event and cause.

SAHSSI30 is a choose your own adventure starting at Whitesands Park in Huskisson with a stop off at Plantation Point at the 7km mark through to the finishing or turning around at beautiful Hyams Beach at 10- 12kms. A fabulous morning tea is provided for participants both at Plantation Point and Hyams Beach.

Accessibility path – The path from White Sands Park to Plantation Point is accessible, which means whether you are using a wheelchair, walking, running or pushing a pram, everyone can all get moving together for one cause.

ALBURY BANNER & WODONGA EXPRESS

100 YEARS AGO IN TOMERONG Cold winter days are perfect for spending hours indoors scrolling through Trove, not necessarily looking for family history stories.

These extracts came from a search for "Tomerong" when life was so much harder but joy was found in the simple things.

Albury Banner and Wodonga Express (NSW:1860-1927; 1929-1931;1933 1938) Fri 16 Jan 1925, p 12

LETTER-BOX.

Honor Letter. Tomerong. via Nowra. South Coast. Dear Uncle Jeff, This is my first letter to the 'Banner'. 'I have intended writing several times, for I do enjoy reading the Children's Page, and would like to become one of your nieces. I am ten years old, and have two sisters younger than myself, including twins. We live about four miles from Jervis Bay, but have a splendid view of the ocean, as our home is on a very high hill. We went to see the British Fleet when it visited the Naval College, and went aboard the Hood. The day was very wet, and we were not permitted to remain long on board. We have just returned from camping. We went to a spot called Wreck Bay, where I am told, several vessels have been wrecked, and we found many pieces of wreckage from the unfortunate ships. There was a nice beach for bathing, also some treacherous looking rocks and cliffs where one could scarcely bear to look over. My sister Kathleen (aged eight) and I walk about one and a half miles to school. About 50 children attend. I will write to you again shortly - Your new niece, Eileen M' Kinnon.

Editor: (A nice letter, Eileen. What a beautiful place you live in. You must love the country around your home.)

South Coast Times and Wollongong Argus (NSW: 1900 - 1954), Friday 3 July 1925, page 28. Mr. Ted Glanville, riding a motor cycle,

averaging 25 miles an hour from Bega to Falls Creek. It took him an hour to accomplish the five miles to Nowra, the worst piece of road on 200 miles run.

Shoalhaven News and South Coast Districts Advertiser (NSW: 1891 - 1937), Sat 12 Dec 1925, p 2 Mr. James Watt, of Tomerong, has installed! a wireless set. The installation was made Iby Mr. P. May, of Nowra.

Shoalhaven Telegraph (NSW: 1881 - 1937), Wednesday 23 December 1925, page 9 Amongst the visitors to Nowra yesterday was Mr. G. P. Smith, one-time of Tomerong, and who since the South African war, in which he was engaged, has been employed in the Prisons Department, rising steadily in the service until he was superintendent of the Shaftsbury Reformatory and acting Governor of Parramatta gaol. Mr. Smith is now Governor of Bathurst gaol. He looks well, and apparently deserves all the success that has come to him.

Australian Worker (Sydney, NSW: 1913 - 1950), Wednesday 28 October 1925, page 13

A DESERTED HOUSE.

There are sign-posts on the main South Coast road of N.S.W. pointing the way to Tomerong, but it is really only a little bunch of houses and a single store, nestling at the gateway to a country of big timber. We' came down the road... and paused finally at an empty house that faced the store. We had been told we could camp here, and a lean bushman who had been asked to keep on eve on the place confirmed this, and allowed us to make a fire and prepare our quarters for the night. It was a big, rambling place, with a broad verandah and half-a-dozen rooms scattered any old way beneath the rusty iron roof. Dust had gathered on the floors, and there was a musty hint of departed life, and a depressing sense of desolation that only the cheery warmth of a good fire could dispel.

Family History

After tea the lean bushman dropped over for a yarn... He told us of the men who had called in here for the luxury of a night under shelter.

There had been a cheerful soul walking to Bega by way of a holiday, the usual stragglers making down the coast in search of work, and another who toured the country on a push bike, with a bundle of oddments for sale. This man had been skilful with the pencil, and the caretaker took us into another room and' showed us a little collection of rough sketches on the wall.

There was a group of racehorses, the portrait of a film star, and a seascape - all done with. a certain amount of crude skill... Presently, however, our friend left us for the night, and we sat on in silence, each busy with his thoughts, and the things to be seen in the red heart of the fire.

I thought of the little procession of men who had sought shelter beneath this roof, and wondered which distant bush tracks had now swallowed them. I thought of the family that had once made these rooms echo to the sound of voices, and the confident tread of footsteps.

And then I went to the open door, and gazed for a space into the shadows of the night, and caught something of the rich essence of life which hangs eternally above these silent places.

I lay that night with my face turned to a square of window which made a patch darkly blue against the blackness, and from this patch of shadow there shone a single star, very bright, very low down in the west, and I knew then that the place had not been deserted, after all. M. H. HOLCROFT.

WHAT LIES BEYOND Bali - Part 2

Following on from last month's issue of the evolving Bali on my visits over a twenty year period, my observations of the last of my ten-time visits there, I cried for what Bali had become.

From innocence, to full-on degradation of culture, lack of respect from tourists to the locals and vice-versa and general attitude of tourists who believe that 'I'm on holiday here to have a good time, no matter what', which has brought Bali to the same level as other Asian destinations which abound in all-day, all-night neon lights (think Times Square in NY), never-ending partying, no lack of alcohol, absolutely no dress code (anything goes), loud, obnoxious and drunk patrons being the types that a nation is being judged at.

The first thing I noticed was that a new female tourist would be asked where she was from, and upon being told Australia – especially as a solo traveller - you were immediately cast as a sexually-easy 'piece of action' as many of those who came to the island did so to 'score' with at least one of the local lads. Very sad indictment on the rest of the Australian, female traveller.

Going to the beach that I used to virtually live on from sunrise to sunset, where have all the trees gone? - all cleared to make way to cater for the swell of tourists.

Male youths hiring out surfboards and bodyboards, with these guys thinking that if you are polite with them, 'that you are asking to be taken' because unfortunately, that's what they have encountered with many female tourists - so, let's tar every female with the same brush!

McDonald's the food chain, has woven its way physically into the fabric of what was once paradise where you could once upon a time, immerse yourself in the flavours and aromas of this once-beautiful island. Where you would eat as a local from the tiny 'restaurant' run by a mum while her kids slept just on the other side of the sheet-curtained doorway.

You would sit yourself on a makeshift, small table and an even smaller wooden stool. At sunset, the street vendors would pedal to the beach to sell roasted peanuts, some type of soup concoction or corn on the cob or some delicacy from their carefully constructed glass display unit sitting proudly on the back of their pushbike.

How simple and pleasurable was it then!. I guess that I never imagined that it would change so much as I was living 'in the moment' where I believed that Bali would never succumb to modernity to the point where she lost her soul and gained a bunch of loud, obnoxious, drunk fools who have really spoilt 'Paradise'.

My last visit in 1996, became the very last to where I thought I had found an escape from the trappings of what is known as 'progress'. ■

Every Tuesday, laughter, music, and the comforting hum of conversation fills BCR Communities Wellness Centre in Sanctuary Point as participants of the dementia-specific 'Respite Social' group gather for a day designed just for them. At the heart of the program is BCR's person-centred philosophy of care, which honours each individual's story, strengths, and choices. "Our goal is to create a space where people living with dementia feel respected, understood, and engaged," explained BCR Lifestyle Activities Coordinator Kim McDonald. "We see the person first, not the diagnosis."

The Tuesday group offers a welcoming environment where participants can enjoy activities tailored to their own unique interests and abilities – from walks, gardening and singalongs to art, games and sensory experiences. "It's so much more than just keeping busy," Kim said. "It's about providing opportunities that focus on what the participants can still do so they can continue to feel a sense of purpose and pride. It is also about fostering those little moments of joy and ensuring everyone feels like they belong."

Once a month, the group heads out into the community for a special outing, like lunch at a local café or club. These trips are carefully planned to help participants feel independent and confident, for example they are encouraged to order and pay for their own meal.

"These outings give people a sense of normalcy and empowerment," Kim said. "They remind our participants - and the community - that people living with dementia can still enjoy meaningful, everyday experiences."

For many local families, the program also provides much needed peace of mind and respite. "Carers tell us they feel relief knowing their loved one is somewhere safe and supportive, so they can have time to themselves to relax, recharge and do the activities that give them joy." Kim said.



A MID-CENTURY DECADE

In the main Central Business District of Nowra, the town grid outlaid in the mid-decades of the 19th century extended from North Street, East Street (now the 1980s realigned Princes Highway thoroughfare), to West Street (adjacent to where the Showground is today), then south for half a dozen blocks. A 1937 Shoalhaven Historical Society photo shows the extent of this grid very clearly. It also shows a concentration at that time of the majority of the shopping precinct buildings in Junction Street between the north/south running Kinghorne and Berry Streets. Large spaces in this original town grid south beyond Junction Street existed then. Many homes constructed of weatherboard walls and corrugated iron rooves existed in parts of this remainder of the grid. Occasionally clusters of them are visible in some of the streets

In the June About* Monthly Feature last year, the influence of the Irish born and educated barrister John Hubert Plunkett was examined. He helped establish many institutions in the colony after his arrival and appointment as N.S.W. Solicitor-General in 1832. Details were also outlined as to how Plunkett Street in Nowra became a hub for the main legal, educational and religious precinct, as the town developed in to one of a number of government towns established in regional districts across the colony. Plunkett Street is the fourth street which runs parallel and to the south of North Street in the original town grid.

Returning to the historical society's aerial photo, the proximity of Junction Street to Nowra Bridge is a possible major reason why it had grown in to the main cluster of shops for the town by 1937. Bridge Road fed existing highway and local traffic from the north directly off the southern end of the river crossing and in to the town CBD. With the railway station at Bomaderry also contributing to the passage of goods, services and people from this direction into this concentration of shops, this central focus of buildings along Junction Street between Berry and Kinghorne Streets was a main

meeting place for townsfolk. This continued to be so for quite a few decades to come.

Census figures of the time allow for an estimate of around 3,000 as the population of Nowra when this aerial photo was taken. Some of the major buildings visible in the main street are at the junction of Kinghorne and Junction Streets. A multi-storey Prince of Wales Hotel building dominates the NW corner of this intersection, while opposite on the SW corner is the Hotel Nowra. On the SE corner was the traditional Commercial Banking Company of Sydney building, with another building for stables out the back, while the NE corner was the original home of the Commonwealth Bank in Nowra

At the other end of this central block of Junction Street on its southern side is the distinctive Post Office building, today a licensed premises known as the Postman's Tavern. Behind it is the Woodhills Emporium building, which has in recent years been re-purposed as apartments and offices, and is now named The Iconic. On the opposite side of Berry Street closest to its SW corner with Junction Street is the Methodist Church. Adjacent to it on the southern side is Dr Francis Ryan's surgery building. Most distinctive in the centre of the Junction Street block is Walsh's Building, which was to be owned and operated by that family up until the end of last century.

It was in to this town that Brian Noble Forrester was born, and would become one of its better known businessmen by the end of the 20th century. In May this year, the Shoalhaven Historical Society members became much the poorer when they learnt of Brian's passing at 89 years of age. He died as the 11th Life Member of S.H.S., only a week after doing his turn on the roster at the society's museum on the corner of Kinghorne and Plunkett Streets. Brian had enthusiastically cared for the grounds and lawns surrounding the museum's building over the past few decades. His enthusiasm spread to attempting to keep the museum open to the public for lengthier periods,



which saw him consistently take a duty to do so on Sunday afternoons.

In 2008, in his third year on the committee of the Nowra based historical society, Brian Forrester used his extensive and sharp memory of his earliest decades living and working in Central Nowra to write a book he called A DECADE IN TIME. He sub-titled this publication "Nowra's Central Business District during the mid 1940's to the mid 1950's". Brian's history of his hometown was not by any means a definitive one. Rather, as he philosophises at the very end of his POST SCRIPT that rounds off the written sections of his book: "We are reminded of what we've always known - that the really interesting aspect of History is the people rather than events or 'things' ". At the outset of his book he had written a short APOLOGIES section because, as he says of his text, "the many names quoted are from memory – wherever the spelling of any, whether Christian name or surname is incorrect, please excuse".

Prefacing his history in such a tone, on the same page where Brian Forrester does an ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS section, he begins by thanking all of the members of the society who encouraged him to do more than just jog his memory, but to record it. This he did in an inimitable style — his own. He produces more of a yarn about the characters that conducted businesses in the Nowra CBD in this mid 20th century decade. He, as the **About*** Monthly Feature has often done, recognises for their assistance the two most experienced and widely published historians within the society, Alan Clark AM and Robyn Florance OAM.

Of Peter Walsh, Bill Sturgiss and Dr Bill Ryan OAM, three people who were prominent figures working in Central Nowra during his time, Brian rated them as 'particularly helpful' to his efforts to record that decade during the middle of the 20th century. Peter Walsh was the proprietor of the business that occupied Walsh's Building in Junction Street (mentioned in a previous paragraph) for much of his and Brian's working life. Bill Sturgiss purchased the newsagency in the middle of Junction Street in the latter decades of last century. His son still operates this business, at which Brian has kept its shelf of historical

society publications stocked up for the public for many years.

In acknowledging the publisher of his book, Brian links another couple of local Nowra businesses. Dave Hill Marine is today a visible and popular business on the corner of Berry and North Streets. Brian described himself as a "technologically challenged oldie", so his "production processes" for his book were gratefully assisted by Cheryl Hill of Nowra Copy Centre. Cheryl he refers to as "a member of the Dave Hill Marine extended family". This Copy Centre business she was working for in the 2000's was located opposite the Roxy Cinema along Berry Street.

That side of Berry Street between Junction and Worrigee Streets was a special area of Central Nowra to Brian. He stated that at "some time between September 1934 and September 1936", he'd been born in a weatherboard cottage at the extremities of the town grid in St Ann's Street. This location he described as his "sacred site". In the next decade, when he attended school at Nowra Primary and Nowra Intermediate High in the 1940s (both then situated on the same site in Plunkett Street), Brian Forrester lived at two addresses along this block of Berry Street.

"Initially the family occupied a weatherboard cottage adjacent to a small mixed business on the corner of Berry and Worrigee Streets where the Happy Inn Chinese Restaurant is currently.... This was the corner shop, where the writer learned how to make penny ice blocks and sell fourapenny lollies during the Roxy Cinema intervals".

Afterwards, from the late 40s in to the next decade, the Forrester family moved to a flat above another shop closer to Junction Street. This was the next business that Brian's father Ken Forrester operated. Next door to the landmark Woodhills building mentioned earlier, now called THE ICONIC, this flat had an aerial view across the road of the Methodist Church and the surgery and residence of the December 2023

This was the Nowra that Brian Forrester was to recall from memory in A DECADE IN TIME, over half a century later.



The beautiful sunny days of early winter, which we all enjoyed have encouraged good growth on winter crops and the cabbages, cauliflowers, broad beans and broccoli have grown well. Several varieties of potatoes have been planted in the specially prepared beds, and winter lettuce is being picked. Dry weather in early winter also helped and there has been good control of water to the crops. There have been fewer pest problems, for a while at least.

Chilli Chocolate Is there anyone in the world who actually likes chilli flavoured chocolate? When I used to sell food at the gourmet market, the guy next to me was selling home-made chilli chocolate on his stand and he couldn't even give it away. There were free samples for everyone and even I tried it. People politely said "Oh, that's.... different" and kept walking. Let's be clear: chilli and chocolate are two different things. Like garlic and ice cream, they should be kept far apart from each other.

There are better uses for chillies and I will happily tell you what they are. For example, did you suffer from cold feet this winter? Next time, sprinkle a little ground cayenne pepper into your socks before you go trudging off into the snow. It makes a whole world of difference. Your feet will sparkle. Of course, it does turn your feet a sort of red colour but that's a small price to pay – no one is going to look at your feet. While you're at it, sprinkle a little bit into your mittens as well. For cold fingers it works wonders. A word of caution: if you are a nose picker (and who amongst us is truly innocent?), make sure you wash your hands first – and preferably afterwards as well. Believe me, chilli up the nose is not a good feeling.

Another great use for chillies is for chilli eating

contests. These are wonderful things. A cultural phenomenon! Mankind has really come a long way. Perhaps you have seen this on TV, got excited and wondered if there were any chilli eating contests in your local area that you could join. Have you seen the looks on their faces? The happiest person in the chilli room is the contest winner, having just consumed a million "Scoville Units" of chillies in 20 minutes. He or she is really having a good time and enjoying a nice gallon of milk as a treat. Sometimes the winner gets to go to hospital afterwards.

If for some reason these activities do not interest you, don't rule chilli out of your life. It has some real world benefits. You may be aware it is an ingredient in arthritis creams (capsaicin). It relieves pain by increasing blood flow to the area – but here's another reason why it works: because the cream is hot on the skin, the brain gets confused and can't make up its mind whether it is feeling arthritis pain or just heat – so the pain becomes diffused. It's a clever trick!

If you are suffering from cold or flu, chillies are for you – for increasing blood flow and stimulating your poor sick body. They won't "cure" you – but for sure will help to take your mind off the discomfort. Add it to your chicken soup and your baked vegetables and put paprika in your hot pot or even on your chips. For the small amount that you use, dried chilli flakes, cayenne powder or the milder paprika are convenient and just as good as the fresh. But don't ignore capsicums. These "bell peppers" are chillies too and just because they're not hot doesn't mean they have no benefit. All colours are high in vitamins A, B & C to knit your sinews and repair the eyes (eat them, don't apply them).

How to Eat Chillies Safely: If you are wondering how hot that mystery chilli in your possession is, try it on a friend first. If you don't have any friends, arm yourself with a glass of full cream milk. The fat in the milk will absorb the heat – enough so that you can still call emergency services later if you have to.

LIBRARY CAMPAIGN CONTINUES

A petition for the building of a new Bay and Basin Library on the corner of Kerry Street and Paradise Beach Road is gaining more and more signatures and we thank those hundreds of people for their support.

The current site of our little library is owned by the NSW Education Department and we have learned of their plans for co-locating a preschool with Sanctuary Point Public School.

Public libraries are regulated to ensure they meet requirements under the Libraries Act and are eligible for government funding.

In summary, the site must be on a main street or shopping area location; highly visible with street frontage and on a ground floor; fully accessible; close to local schools; walking distance from public transport; access to convenient and safe car parking. The Kerry Street corner site meets those requirements.

However, Council is now examining a site on Clifton Street that does not meet the regulations. This is not what our community wants.

We urge the Council to continue with the site at the corner of Kerry Street and Paradise Beach Road. Council owns the site, has the architectural design, and the funding. Now hundreds of ratepayers are calling on it to be built.

Sanctuary Point Community Pride Inc will continue to campaign for a new fit for purpose library. Our aims are to gain better infrastructure for our community.

You might think that play is just something a child does to

pass time but it's actually much more than that – play is how children learn and practice new skills on their journey of child development.

The really amazing part of this process is that the skills go much deeper than being able to stack up a pile of blocks, push a toy car along or brush a doll's hair. For children, play actually teaches children all kinds of things about life, including:

- Social and emotional skills like sharing, respect, cooperation, patience, resilience and teamwork
- Cognitive skills like counting, recognising patterns and shapes
- Speech and language skills
- Gross and fine motor skills that improve a child's physical capacity to carry out all kinds of daily tasks

As new skills emerge, children continue to practise these skills in the play setting, taking risks, experimenting and testing boundaries to learn more about the world.

Noah's Inclusion Services takes a playbased approach to child development. One of our favourite ways to encourage and facilitate play is through our weekly playgroups. We currently host 13 playgroups across the South Coast, with three of these in Sanctuary Point, including:

Chicken, Mushroom and Spinach Risotto

INGREDIENTS

- 300g white cup mushrooms, sliced
- 1 brown onion, finely chopped
- 2 cloves garlic, finely chopped
- 250g Imperial Grain arborio rice
- 1 litre liquid chicken stock, heated
- 200ml white wine
- 100g baby spinach
- 2 tbsp olive oil, plus extra to serve
- 120g cooked chicken meat, shredded
- 50g unsalted butter, cold and cubed



- 50g-60g grated parmesan cheese
- Fresh parsley leaves, finely chopped, to serve
- Salt and cracked black pepper, to season

METHOD

- Place half of the olive oil into a large, heavy-based frying pan set over a medium-high heat. Add the mushrooms and cook for 4-5 minutes or until nicely browned. Season and set aside on a plate.
- 2. Add stock to small saucepan and heat to a simmer, you'll need to keep this hot throughout the process.
- 3. Place the frying pan on a medium-low heat and add the remaining oil. Add the onion and garlic and cook for 5 minutes or until softened but not coloured. Stir in the rice and cook for a minute until slightly transluscent.
- 4. Turn the heat up to medium-high and add the wine, stirring until it evaporates. Add the stock, a ladleful at a time, until almost all the liquid is absorbed. You can also use boiling water to add, if you need additional liquid. This should take around 20 minutes for the rice to cook and maintain a wet consistency.
- 5. Stir in the mushrooms, spinach, cooked chicken and cracked pepper. Stir through until the spinach wilts and the chicken is piping hot. Take off the heat and stir in the butter and most of the parmesan, reserving a little for garnish. Season to taste with salt and pepper.
- 6. To serve, transfer to warmed plates and top with chopped parsley, the remaining cheese and a drizzle of olive oil.




