\$50.2 MILLION RETURNED BY COMMUNITY BANKS IN FY25

A Shoalhaven City Council Consultative Body

The Shoalhaven Heritage Study 2025-2028

The Council has exhibited a new Shoalhaven Heritage Study 2025-2028 Draft intended to replace the 2018-2022 Heritage Study. Submissions closed on October 24. The BVF CCB discussed this at the October meeting and has made a submission, which has been shared on our email network of members and with other CCBs.

The exhibited Draft Study consisted of only 2 pages, which is a remarkably limited Policy statement.

The Shoalhaven Local Environment Plan 2014 [SLEP] has a Schedule 5 section devoted to Environmental Heritage which covers Heritage Items, Heritage Conservation Areas and Archaeological Sites. The SLEP also has a 'Heritage' Layer identified in the Zoning Mapping.

The 'Old Wool Road' is identified in that map layer but curiously not in the Schedule 5 Heritage list. BVF was involved with Council in 2023 in attempting to resolve heritage management issues with the historic road remnant but the agreed solutions have never advanced.

The Property at 110 The Wool Road is also identified in the SLEP Heritage Mapping. This is the Coastal Water Retirement Village, which contains the site of the original 'Erowal Farm', one of the original Land Grants in the Basin area. 'Erowal Farm' is listed in the Schedule 5 Heritage Items at Worring Heights.

There are two basic issues for our community:

- a.** Do these sites represent all of our heritage? and **b.** will the revised Shoalhaven Heritage Study provide an adequate guide, support and management for both Basin and Shoalhaven Heritage?

Perhaps you have comments or suggestions for other inclusions and for how these should be recognised.

There are no other Heritage Items listed for our CCB area including Sanctuary Point and the villages. Likewise there are no Heritage Conservation Areas or Archaeological Sites in the SLEP in any of our towns or villages.

CREMATORIUM DEVELOPMENT APPLICATION

The second Development Application for a crematorium at a Chessel Road adjacent to the Wool Road Bypass was formally 'REJECTED' by Council on September 4th.

The application was lodged on September 11th 2023 and was a long and involved road for the nearby residents community who have been steadfast in their opposition with support from the Forum.

The property involved has been listed for sale for some time now.



The 2026 Community Bank Sanctuary Point Bachelor Degree Scholarship Program aims to assist academically motivated students from the **Bay & Basin or Sussex Inlet** area of NSW, who have been offered a place at an Australian University to study for the first time at **Bachelor's degree level in 2026** and are experiencing challenging circumstances.

The Scholarship program supports the following study related expenses – **accommodation costs, course costs, study-related materials/equipment, textbooks, tutoring and /or education related travel (within Australia).**

Key general qualification criteria:

- You are an Australian citizen or permanent resident.
- Students must reside in or attend school in Bay & Basin or Sussex Inlet area
- You can demonstrate leadership both within, and outside, your school community.
- You can demonstrate the challenging circumstances (financial &/or social) hindering your ability to undertake further study.
- You are a motivated student who can demonstrate community involvement

For study at undergraduate bachelor's degree level

Qualification criteria:

- You will be a first-time tertiary student at first year undergraduate bachelor's degree level in 2026.
- You have been offered a full-time place to study on campus for a bachelor's degree in an approved Australian course at an Australian university, TAFE Institute or College Campus.
- You have completed Year 12.
- You must be aged 25 years or younger as at 31 January 2026.
- Students under the age of 18 years will require parental/guardian consent to accept this scholarship

The scholarship award value is up to **\$5,000 per year for 2 years** for each successful recipient. Subject to the criteria set out above and satisfactory academic performance. Scholarships will be awarded on the recommendation of a selection committee and will be based on how an applicant addresses the qualification criteria.

THE NEXT BUSH CARERS

The effects of Global Warming are all around us. Temperatures are rising, more frequent heavy storms are causing permanent erosion of the shoreline of St Georges Basin, old trees are falling and with them the habitats of birds, mammals and insects.

Development also reduces wild places and animals. Nearly gone from St Georges Basin townships are echidnas, different kinds of wallabies, gliding possums, snakes, Gang Gang cockatoos, other kinds of birds and many insects.

The Basin Track Bushcare group meets once a week to clear invasive weeds and reintroduce local indigenous plants. When the native bush reappears, so do native animals. Recently our group has joined with some keen students from Sanctuary Point Public School to work together on Bush Regeneration. Our group, which mostly consists of retirees, is delighted to share our knowledge and experience with members of the younger generation.

Our first project has been to get our hands dirty (well our gloves) and identify and remove weeds from the school's Bush Tucker garden. The teachers and the Aboriginal teachers' aid, Aunty Mally, who supervises the kids, must be doing a good job because not only were the kids keen, respectful and hard-working but they already know about problems facing the environment. Our group looks forward to doing more work with the school and is happy that in the future there will be adults keen to work to protect the environment. And hopefully undo some of the damage already done. ■

Another happy fellowship evening was enjoyed early in the month with the members bringing their BBQ food and something to share with the group. It is always a good time to chat with one another and partners, while sharing all the news and catching up on travels and families. These evenings are always beautifully organised with food managed by the members so there is a presence of 'just enough' salads and desserts to delight us all. This friendly togetherness is evident as we work in the garden as well, with just a pinch of competition evident at the fundraiser.

This fundraiser, as you all know, is on 3rd Saturday of each month, this one for November being the best one to stock up on goodies for the children's school break-up and Christmas gift giving. There are always goodies already wrapped in present form, to assist you with decisions. These make very popular gifts for the teachers or friends as they are a treat to spark-up the holiday lunch sandwich or to take to the BBQ. Please remember we are '*cash only*' at this fundraising event.

The Open Morning will be on Saturday 15th November, early in the month as there are 5 Saturdays in November, Hooray!! The flags will fly, and the sign will be on the roundabout and there will be lots of fun in the garden on the day.

The garden is looking very good with the new crops thriving in the sun. The netting cover has been rolled back from covering the orchard and the fruit trees are showing the benefit of being in the full sun. Companion planting has been increased in the orchard area to assist with fruit production. The companions either attract helpful insects, like pollinators, or attract insects that feast on pests or it is their young that are the predator. We have a lot to learn as we join with plants and nature in this venture.

As well as several specific tomato plants thriving there are zucchini, lettuce, beetroot, peas and beans, strawberries and chillies, cucumbers, squash, carrots and spinach. As well as these annual crops the perennial vegetables are being carefully fertilized and nourished.

Lots of recipe challenges were enjoyed when we grew tomatillos for the first time and there is now a purple variety available so we will try that this summer. We also have loofah sponge gourd to grow, just for fun!

Plans are developing for micro greens to be trialled. These are being used extensively as garnish, to add crunch and minerals to many meals, as they are high in nutrients and take little space and little time to grow.

Both of the passionfruit vines and the tamarillo tree have been rejuvenated and are developing into productive plants again. We need those passionfruit for the butter at open day!

Herbs like Basil and Parsley also add to the garden beds, keeping pests at bay but also improving the flavour of the produce. Once again we look forward to a productive summer.

Come one, come all to our Open Morning on Saturday 15th November and enjoy the fun.



When 20-year-old Bailey van den Hooven invites friends into his new home, there's one feature that instantly steals the spotlight – his very own bar. Made from a striking piece of recycled blackbutt, it wouldn't look out of place in a cool nightclub.

What makes it truly special is that Bailey designed and built it himself, piece by piece, with creativity, skill and determination. The bar stands as a symbol of how far Bailey has come since a serious road accident changed his life in an instant at just 15 years old.

The years that followed brought hospitals, rehabilitation, learning new ways to communicate and adjusting to independence. It's been incredibly tough but through it all Bailey has held on to his passions and found a way to express them.

"I've always loved working with wood," Bailey communicated. *"I remember being about five years old, helping my stepdad build a deck. That's one of my earliest memories, and I've loved it ever since."*

That love for woodwork came to life at the BCR Communities Activities Hub, where Bailey worked alongside his NDIS Support Worker, Michael Hague. *"When I first asked Bailey what he wanted to build, I thought he*



might say a cheese board or a small box to get started,” Michael recalled. “But from day one, it was clear he wanted to build a bar. Week after week he turned up with ideas and the determination to make them real. What he’s achieved is more than just a piece of furniture. It’s a reflection of his resilience, creativity and focus. He’s amazed all of us.”

Now proudly installed in its own dedicated room, Bailey’s bar continues to evolve. His love of surfing is woven into the design, there is an impressive stereo for his 500 song playlist, and regular trips to Bunnings have helped him add details ranging from disco lights to décor to create the perfect party atmosphere.

“He thought of everything,” Michael said. “The lighting, the layout, the vibe – he wanted it to feel like the real deal, and that’s exactly what he’s created. It’s a space that reflects who he is.”

Bailey has already hosted two smaller gatherings, with friends and family toasting his achievement. But he’s not done yet – his next party will feature a hired bartender, and Bailey is ready to raise a glass to his hard work and determination.

However, Adele was not as fleet of foot or of eye contact as others were and so here is Adele, a very long term member of 50 years!

When Adele supported her husband as the leader of a Scouts’ Camp, she had to take some equipment back for another couple. When she saw that her friend had a spinning wheel, a discussion ensued and the consequence was that Adele joined The Wool Road Spinners and Weavers.

Adele enjoys the group, (maybe not after this interview!) especially the social catch up with people, recognising the importance this has on our wellbeing.

She knits all sorts of toy animals such as Shawn the Sheep, dogs, cats and then beanies, jumpers, scarves and bed socks. As you could guess Adele thinks that she will need to live until at least a hundred to use up all her stash of wool to spin and knit.

She loves the idea of encouraging children to make things, developing and using their creativity and imagination.

The project she has enjoyed making was a beanie out of beige Poll Leicester wool which she dyed orange, spun it, then knitted it with the reverse side of stocking stitch as the right side.

Through the group she has done a variety of methods of dyeing: indigo, natural and cold dyeing. Adele has a love of using colour, an important part of the use of yarn in a project.

MOORHOUSE ACHIEVEMENT

In March 2022, the **About.....** Monthly Feature MOORHOUSE PARK was devoted to how this small piece of green space next to the Nowra Bridge was established. With construction of a third bridge crossing the Shoalhaven River within that precinct, this park has disappeared; hopefully not forever.

On July 9 this year, Rotary Nowra celebrated the important milestone of 90 years of existence. For all nine of these decades, the name MOORHOUSE has been synonymous with the Rotary movement in the Shoalhaven. The story of how Frank Moorhouse and William Lackersteen were two of the founding fathers of Nowra Rotary Club was outlined in the MOORHOUSE PARK **About.....** Monthly Feature.

Rotary Nowra's 90th occasion in July of this year was held at Bomaderry Bowling Club. A 40 year stalwart of the club in Graeme Cord interviewed Frank's son Arthur during the function, before a crowd of around 100 people. *"It's father and son, the way it's been done since the old days"* certainly applies to Frank and Arthur, as they have had a continuous membership in the local Rotary Club since its foundation. Back in 1935, father Frank had convinced the founder of Rotary International, a New Yorker named Paul Harris, to visit Nowra's fledgling club in its first year of existence. Amazingly, father Frank was to attend 3,000 Rotary meetings in various parts of the world during the rest of his life. Arthur followed in these footsteps, retelling to Graeme and the audience some of his own Rotary travels overseas.

As their membership overlapped for a number of decades, Frank and Arthur's century plus service record is quite a unique achievement within any community based club. Father Frank was often heard to use the phrase *"That is a feat of human endurance"* when referring to other people's milestones like 50th wedding anniversaries. In this case, their achievement most certainly fits this bill as well.

In the MOORHOUSE PARK article, it was also noted that in 1964, Frank Moorhouse Snr. headed a committee to celebrate the 30th year of Nowra Rotary Club. As District Governor during his term covering the 1963/64 year, he brought the annual district conference with close to 1,000 delegates to Nowra. With delegates attending from an area covering as far south as the Victorian border, as north as the outskirts of southern Sydney, and west across to Canberra, the achievement of this local service club in hosting an event of this size was no mean feat.

During the conference in February 1964, Shoalhaven Shire President Bruce McIntosh announced that a piece of land between the Riverhaven Motel and the Nowra Bridge was to be named after *"one of Nowra's outstanding leaders in community affairs"*. This is how the *Shoalhaven News* newspaper reported on the Shire President's announcement, made at the official opening of the conference. MOORHOUSE PARK came in to being as a 200 by 400 feet parcel of land which fronted the Princes Highway/Bridge Road northern entrance to the town.

As a dairyman himself, Councillor McIntosh knew full well how important Frank Moorhouse's contribution to the Shoalhaven had been since his arrival in the district in the 1920s. At close to 21 years of age, Frank had arrived in Australia from his birthplace of New Zealand. At 13 years of age, he had begun attending Wanganui Technical College as a night school student one evening a week. This involved riding his horse eight miles in to town from the family farm. Before graduating as an electrical engineer, Frank studied through a correspondence course, doing so under candlelit conditions.

He was apprenticed to an Australian named Charles Davis, whose company was described as being *'Electrical and Mechanical Engineers and Dairy Experts'*. Around this time, Davis sold his patented milking machine and company to a Sydney firm named Diabolo. He moved back *'home'* to work for this company. In 1925, Frank

Moorhouse followed Davis to Australia, but it took him a year and a half before he secured some lasting employment. A Swedish company named Alfa Laval, the inventors of a cream separating machine in 1878, bought the business off Diabolo. When Alfa Laval employed Frank Moorhouse in 1927, he became their sales representative along the NSW South Coast. While visiting his former boss Charles Davis that same year, in the Sydney suburb of Mosman, Frank was approached while waiting for a ferry by two Girl Guides. They wanted to sell him tickets to a local dance. As he had no one to take along, they arranged for him to accompany their guides captain. Her name was Purthanry Cutts.

On January 14th the following year, Purth and Frank were married. On Christmas Eve, 1928, their first child Owen was born. By that stage, the young married couple had moved to a small house in East Street, Nowra. With her husband travelling up and down the South Coast for work, it suited them when Purth's parents, having only been retired a short time, moved down from Sydney to help with her newly born son.

Owen would be followed by Arthur in 1932, and Frank Jnr in 1938. That decade saw the Moorhouses both enter in to local community service groups. Frank's initiative in joining WILLIAM LACKERSTEEN (*About* Monthly Feature November 2021) to form the only Rotary Club south of Wollongong in 1934 was paralleled by his wife Purth's re-entry in to the guiding movement. She also joined NOWRA C.W.A. (*About* Monthly Feature December 2024), becoming a leading figure in that organisation as well, in the decades to come.

The railway station at Bomaderry, and subsequent location nearby of the dairy co-operative had reduced transportation time of dairy products to the Sydney markets from days to hours. Despite this, the quality of these perishable products had long been questioned, and sometimes rejected, because of high bacterial content. When driving one day on a long road trip from Nowra to Eden and return, Frank Moorhouse came up with an idea that would change the processing of milk in the dairy industry.

He solved the issue of sterilisation of milking equipment by inventing a boiler which farmers could use close by to their point of production.

After experimenting at his home, Frank created a small boiler they could use in their dairies. At the base of the boiling machine, it took up just a square foot of floor space in a dairy, and could be fuelled by accessible items like corn cobs, bark and woodchips. This boiler took just ten minutes to heat ten gallons of water.

Frank began manufacturing his own copper boilers from his workshop, which after the mid 1930s was located at a new home and premises purchased for their growing family on the corner of Worrigee and Kinghorne Streets. This was only a block away from their previous home. The beauty of The Moorhouse Boilers that Frank produced were their simplicity. This helped his product's reputation to grow healthily. He was able to sell these boilers to dairy farmers up and down the coast at the same time as he was supplying them with new milking equipment like cream separators.

While 1939 brought the return of another world war, Frank took an initiative that would define his and his two older sons' futures for the remainder of the 20th century. He was able to leave his engagement with the Alfa Laval company as an employee, and negotiate an arrangement whereby he stayed as an agent for the company's products along the South Coast, while concentrating on making and selling his Moorhouse Boilers. He would not be requested to enlist for military duty, with dairying being considered a protected industry.

In the early days of his manufacturing enterprise in Central Nowra, a farmer mailed an envelope with just 'Moorhouse The Machinery Man' as an address. Frank had thereby been gifted a slogan for his business which lasted the test of time. While older sons Owen and Arthur followed their father into the family business, youngest son Frank would carve out a niche as one of Australia's most well known writers of short stories, a reputation later enhanced with the publication of his set of EDITH TRILOGY historical novels; featured in last month's *About*

After son Frank was made a member of the Order of Australia in 1985, father Frank received an Order of Australia Medal in 1988, and mother Purth an OAM too in 1990. Few, if any, other Shoalhaven families can match this outstanding record of achievement. ■



WHAT LIES BEYOND NEVERS – FRANCE

Following on from last month's issue of the story of Saint Bernadette whose story began in the town of Pau in the Pyrenees in the south of France. I finished the narrative where I had to basically gloss over of my experiences, of which I could have written a whole book about. I touched on, once leaving Pau, Bernadette entered the convent at Nevers in the heart of France to commence her studies to becoming the nun that she wanted to be.

The city of Nevers is seven hundred plus kilometres north of Bernadette's birthplace of Pau and close to two hundred and fifty kilometres south of Paris.

Nevers has a cathedral, but that is not where you will find Bernadette. Her incorrupt body lies in state in a glass-encased coffin within the small Chapel of the Saint Gildard convent on the grounds of the Sisters of Charity complex. On the grounds of this church, the convent also affords visitors reasonably priced accommodation should you require as well as providing meals, also reasonably priced.

On entering the not so big church to visit Bernadette, I was taken back at how beautiful, but tiny she was as she lay in the glass coffin. She is no taller than five feet and is dressed in her nun's habit with her hands intertwined holding a set of rosary beads upon her chest. Her head rests gently on a

pillow and turned slightly towards her left shoulder. If you did not know, you would think that she was just asleep. Bernadette was a very sickly woman suffering from chronic asthma and tuberculosis, hence her short life. Her body was not embalmed, refrigerated nor oxygenated but slightly decayed on her fingers (from memory) caused by hasty washing with lye soap before being placed where she lies. They applied a thin coating of wax on the decay.

Bernadette was initially buried in a crypt within the Chapel of St. Joseph which was located within the grounds of the Convent of Saint Gildard where she had been placed upon her death in 1879. She was initially exhumed in 1909 thirty years later, followed in 1919 and finally in 1925.

The reason for her exhumations was the miracles that people attributed to her when they had been close to death and had prayed to Bernadette and were healed. The process of declaring her a saint had started.

On all three occasions, Bernadette's body was found to be totally incorrupt. I was totally awed that a person of her so small stature, could perform so many huge miracles - ongoing. A place where once again, if you are a believer, you must visit at least once in your lifetime. ■

Question Everything

Chatting to a colleague recently, she told me she was doing the hard yards trying to fix her friend's research, because "it doesn't make any sense and I can't do it!".

It very quickly became apparent that the friend had taken all her information from birth and death indexes, so while each person's parents names were correct, they were from many different families, and was proving to be very frustrating. Once this was discovered, it was a case of documenting each family from the starting person again and discarding the interlopers.

I also almost fell foul of this problem myself soon after this chat, when I was building a family tree for a client, who had given me some basic information to begin with.

She had told me that Catherine Ferguson (nee Annan) had died in Capertee NSW in November 1922. Next step was NSW BDM indexes where I found a death registration for Catherine M Ferguson in 1922 in Capertee, but her parents were not Alexander & Jessie, they were William & Helen.

The Lithgow Mercury had published an obituary for Catherine which documented her life, but it was no help with the registration record I needed. Having the cemetery named, I then opened up Findagrave, and found the following headstone inscription:

*In Loving Memory of Catherine Margaret,
infant daughter of W & L Ferguson,*

Died Sep 14 1922 Aged 3 Days.

*Also Our Beloved Mother, Catherine Ferguson,
Died Nov 24 1922, aged 69 years.*

So this solved one mystery, Catherine M was her granddaughter who died aged just 3 days, ten days before her grandmother. I then decided to put Catherine on hold for a while and research her children. Her son James Alexander enlisted in the AIF, and I was able to view his military record on the National Archives Australia

website. Here I found the answer: he gave his next of kin as 'mother, Mrs Dutch, c/- Capertee Post Office NSW'..... this threw me a curveball. I knew his father had died in 1909, but Catherine remarrying aged 56?

A check of the BDM index again found Catherine Dutch, died 1922/14816, and I found a marriage of Catherine to Arthur Dutch in 1910. Arthur was a widower, his wife died in 1909, and there was a report of their quiet wedding on 10th August 1910.

Catherine became stepmother to Arthur's son Arthur (jnr), who proved to be a rather unpleasant character. After continuously beating and wounding his wife, with police & court records documenting his cruel actions, they were divorced. The fact that Catherine was buried as Ferguson could hark back to Scottish custom, but it could possibly be a result of her family's disapproval of the name. This is something I will never know, but my client will now have the tools to contact previously unknown family members and they may have some stories for her.

The moral of the story is to not take any information at face value, think outside of the square and maybe go sideways to find the information on your focus person, and as always, treat any submitted facts you find online with extreme care.

One Pan Chicken and Garlic Rice



INGREDIENTS

- 1 tsp sea salt flakes
- 1 tsp onion powder
- 1 tsp garlic powder
- 1 tsp sweet paprika
- 1 tsp dried thyme
- ½ tsp cracked black pepper
- ¼ cup extra-virgin olive oil
- 5 boneless chicken thighs (skin on or off)
- ¼ cup water
- 1 onion, finely diced
- 1 tsp freshly minced garlic
- 1 cup jasmine rice
- 1 ½ cups chicken stock
- Fresh thyme sprigs, to garnish (optional)

METHOD

1. Combine the sea salt flakes, onion powder, garlic powder, paprika, thyme, pepper and olive oil in a shallow bowl. Add the chicken and use tongs or your hands to ensure it is evenly coated in the marinade.
2. Heat a large, deep, heavy based pan over medium high heat. Cook the chicken for 6–8 minutes, turning once halfway through, until golden.
3. Remove the chicken from the pan and set aside on a plate. Spoon out any excess fat from the pan (especially if you used skin-on chicken), if desired – although this is not essential, as the fat = extra flavour!
4. Add the water to deglaze the pan and use a spoon to scrape up any bits stuck to the bottom of the pan.
5. To the same pan, add the onion and garlic. Cook, stirring, for 1–2 minutes until fragrant.
6. Add the rice and stock to the pan, stir and bring to a simmer. Once simmering, reduce the heat to low and return the chicken to the pan (skin-side up if using skin-on chicken thighs).
7. Cover and cook for 15 minutes.
8. Once the chicken and rice are cooked, remove the pan from the heat and allow it to stand for 10 minutes, covered.
9. Serve sprinkled with fresh thyme, if using, and a side of mixed leaf salad.

NSW Justices

Over the past few issues we have covered: Certified Copies; Statutory Declarations; Affidavits and Annexures; Wills, DNA, Superannuation, Hardship, Infringement Notices and NSW Probate.

To remind you of **what we cannot sign** before we go further:

- Guardianship
- Power of Attorney
- Enduring Power of Attorney
- Proof of Life Documents. (generally concerning pensions from overseas and can be only signed by Centrelink).
- Overseas Documents
- Copies of a document without the original being presented
- Pre-signed Documentation
- Laminated Australian Citizenship Certificates
- Letters
- Pictures.

Now what are the things you need to know prior to meeting with a Justice of the Peace?

1. We cannot give you legal advice
2. Read your paperwork thoroughly
3. Ensure you bring ALL necessary paperwork with you
4. Ensure you bring the appropriate Identification with you
5. Do not pre-sign anywhere the JP is to witness your signature. This must be done in front of the JP.

What you need to know prior to seeing a Justice of the Peace

6. Please give all the paperwork to the JP, not the signing page only.
7. Ensure you bring your **original** with your copies so they are able to be certified.

Legal wording that you have to respond to on Statutory Declarations and Affidavits:

- *"It is a serious criminal offence to make a false declaration and the penalty includes imprisonment".* Similar words are used for an Affidavit.
- You may be asked to explain what that means so you have a clear understanding of any outcome. I have had a client and I found they could not understand English, so I could not sign the document unless they engaged an official interpreter.
- You will also be asked *"Do you solemnly and sincerely declare that the contents of this Declaration to be true and correct to the best of your knowledge and belief"*. To this you must answer Yes or No.
- Affidavits have something similar, but you can choose whether you make an OATH or AFFIRMATION.

The JP's who are members of The NSW Justices Association Shoalhaven Support Group are trained regularly and up to date.

How Huskisson Public School Uses "Transforming Schools" to Help Students Share Their Voice

Huskisson Public School is working in a special way called **"Transforming Schools"** to help students speak up and take charge of their learning. This approach uses something called 4CTL professional learning, which helps teachers and school leaders get better at teaching and leading. This learning encourages everyone in the school – teachers, leaders, and students – to grow and improve together.

What makes Huskisson's program special is its focus on four important skills:

- **Creativity:** Finding and trying out new ideas
- **Critical Reflection:** Thinking carefully about what we believe and why
- **Communication:** Sharing ideas and making sure everyone's voice is heard
- **Collaboration:** Working together and building connections

These skills, known as the 4Cs, are taught through hands-on activities that help students and teachers learn and practice them every day.

Huskisson uses a tool called the Learning Disposition Wheel. This wheel helps students, teachers, and parents understand the kinds of qualities that make learning deeper and more meaningful. Instead of just learning facts (like maths or history), the wheel shows how to think deeply and connect different things we learn.

Using the Learning Disposition Wheel, Huskisson's students actively take part in activities that help them improve their ability to speak up and be confident in their learning. The school also encourages students to work on projects that they care about, giving them a chance to lead and make decisions.

In short, Huskisson Public School brings together great teaching, strong leadership, and special learning tools like the Learning Disposition Wheel to make sure every student has a voice. This way, students not only learn facts but also become confident and creative learners who work well with others. This **"Transforming Schools"** approach is helping Huskisson create a happy and successful place for students to grow and share their ideas.






