AUTHOR SPOTLIGHT: JANNESY DELEON

1. What prompted you to write about disability?

My two children, Gabriella and Nicholas, inspired me to write stories about disability. As a mom and caregiver, I've seen firsthand how often kids like mine are left out of books and media. I wanted to create stories where children with disabilities are front and center, celebrated for who they are.

2. What is your experience with disability and how has it shaped you as an author?

I've been a full-time caregiver for over twenty years. Both of my children are non-verbal and have complex medical needs. Living this life has taught me patience, resilience, and how to advocate fiercely. As an author, it's given me a purpose: to make sure families like mine feel seen and valued.

3. What are you hoping your readers will take away/learn from your story?

I hope readers—kids and adults—see that inclusion isn't just an idea, it's an action. My stories show that everyone has value and deserves to be part of the community. I also want to show that disabilities don't define the whole person; they are simply part of a beautiful, full life.

4. Have you or do you plan to write other books with a disability focus?

Yes! My books *Tag! You're It* and *Not A Shot!* are both about inclusion and disability. I'm currently working on *Here Comes Sam*, a story about Gabby and Nicky adopting a rescue dog and learning responsibility. We're in the middle of illustrations now, and I'm hoping to have it out before the end of the year. I've also already written my fourth book. This series will always center my main character Gabby with multiple disabilities, because representation like this is so important for children and families.

5. What other books about disability would you recommend to your readers?

I recommend We Move Together by Kelly Fritsch and Anne McGuire—it's a wonderful book about disability justice and building community. All the Way to the Top by Annette Bay Pimentel is an inspiring story about a young girl fighting for her right to be included in school. I also love Dogfish and the Gift of Inclusion by Rita Reed. It's written with a rhythm that flows like a song and beautifully shows how everyone belongs. This story touched my heart and perfectly captures the joy of celebrating our differences.




