Budget Season Is Here: We're Ready to Fight for Fair Pay



It's that time again. Budget talks are heating up, and both the City and County are tightening their belts.

AFSCME 1624 is gearing up for a united push to make sure pay raises are fair and equitable for all. In the past, across-the-board COLAs have been the go-to — but we know a flat percentage doesn't always equal fairness. This year, we're exploring smarter, more progressive raise options that put real money in workers' pockets — especially for those who need it most.

We'll be organizing employee speak outs — June 3 (Travis County) and July 23 & 31 (City of Austin) — along with community meetings in council districts. We're calling on decision-makers to respect our labor, invest in public service, and pay us what we're worth.

We will be heard — and we need you with us.






AFSCME Member Shines at Texas Labor School
