"Fall in Love with Orchids" in Milwaukee, WI, for the Fall MAOC, September 13-15, 2019



The Fall Mid-America Orchid Congress will be held jointly with the Wisconsin Orchid Society Fall Show in Milwaukee, Wisconsin September 13-15, 2019. The Fall Show will be presented in the "Show Dome" of the Mitchell Park Horticultural Conservatory.



The Domes, with their unique conoidal or beehive-like shape, provide excellent lighting

and climate control and are located close to the downtown area as well as Potawatomi Casino. Mid-America lectures and meetings will be located at the nearby Art Deco-style Ambassador Hotel Milwaukee, 2308 West Wisconsin Avenue, which will provide shuttle service to the Domes.

Ms. Wenqing Perner will give an afternoon lecture as well as an evening lecture following the banquet.

Lecture topics are being developed as are additional speakers. Wenqing and her late husband, Holger, developed and operated Hengduan Mountains Biotechnology Nursery and Laboratory in Sichuan, China that featured Cypripediums and Paphiopedilums from the area.

Electronic registration is being prepared but not yet available. An email blast will be sent with the information when it is functional. To make room reservations at the Ambassador Hotel Milwaukee, please contact them at 877-935-2189 or ambassadorhotelmke.com and ask for Wisconsin Orchid Society room rates (\$109 single occupancy and \$129 double occupancy; all are queen-size beds.)

The Domes at Milwaukee's Mitchell Park Horticultural Conservatory feature three different horticultural environments: desert oasis, tropical jungle and floral gardens.

In 2016, the Domes were cited as being among America's "most endangered" historic places by the National Trust for Historic Preservation. The conservatory was deemed an important example of the nation's architectural

and cultural heritage that is at risk of destruction or irreparable damage.

Some general news items from the AOS which you may find of interest:

The Society published its tenth special annual supplement last October on *Cymbidium*, the largest supplement yet – 80 pages. Ron McHatton expects to do one next fall on *Oncidium*. People are welcome to buy extra copies of the *Cymbidium* supplement at \$25.

Members number slightly more than 10,000 and have been consistently above 10,000 since September. The Membership and Marketing Committees have been merged into a single committee and have been very effective in gaining new members.

On April 10, 2021, the Society will celebrate its 100-year anniversary. Bob Fuchs is already hard at work putting together a celebration at the Biltmore Hotel in Coral Gables.

The Society has created a "Master Orchidist" program, similar to the very successful Master Gardener Program. Look for that to be rolled out later this year.

There are three new annual awards given for the first time for the year 2017, the Walter Off Award, recognizing the most outstanding Show Trophy exhibit of the prior year. The Paul and Mary Storm Award will be given to the grower of the orchid plant regarded as the most outstanding example of a hybrid with at least one valid *Myrmecopilia* species and/or the

former *Schomburgkia* species now classified in the genus *Laelia* (or any related species or natural hybrids later described) in its background. The third new award, the Martin Motes Orchid Breeder's Award, goes to the grower and hybridizer of the orchid plant regarded as the most outstanding Award of Quality (AQ) or Award of Distinction (AD).

The spring AOS Members' Meeting will be in San Diego, March 22-24, 2019, and I plan to attend."

Motion to approve passed.

Audit Committee: On behalf of the MAOC Audit Committee, Alexa Noel reported that she had completed an audit of the financial records of the Mid-America Orchid Congress for 2018 and found that the records were complete and in order. All documents, receipts and bank records are organized. All duties of the Treasurer were completed accurately.

Budget: The Budget Committee reports at the Fall Meeting.

Communications: In the absence of a Committee Chair, there was no report.

Conservation:

Chair Bill Morrison reported that the Committee



met in East Lansing on February 22nd at 7 pm. Present were Jack Shumaker, Russ Vernon, Brian Spitler, Doug Martin, and Bill Morrison. Michele Little sat in as a prospective member. They

considered two grant applications.

They first considered the application from Marjorie McNeely Conservatory. This year, due to staff availability they decided to apply in the spring. The grant was thin on the details of what they wanted to add to their collection.

The Committee conditionally approved the grant based on getting more details on what they want to purchase.

The second grant considered the grant application from NOPES (Native Orchid Preservation & Education Society) for the continued restoration effort in the Cranberry Bog Nature Preserve. Jeanne Rhinehart attended to explain the project and what had been done to date. The grant application was also thin on details. We decided to fund the grant for \$400, although there was no total requested.

The two grants were approved by the Committee. Motion to approve passed.

Constitution and By-Laws: Chair Charles Wilson has been emailing with Russ on several possible Constitution changes – nothing at this time.

Education and Research: Although the Committee did not report, the Congress moved that they give \$500 to the NAOCC (North

American Orchid Conservation Center). Motion passed.

Historical: There was no report.

Nominating: In the absence of the Committee Chair, Doris Asher reported that the Nominating Committee is making good progress in preparing its slate for election at the Fall Meeting.

Orchidist of the Year: The Committee reports at the Fall Meeting.

Show Schedule: As Lois Cinert was unable to attend due to illness, Russ read the Committee's Report: "The Show Schedule Committee is alive and well, and still working to make the show schedule a user-friendly document for every society to make their show registration as easy as possible."

We are continuing to gather numbers of entries for each class, in anticipation of a <u>total</u> <u>renumbering</u>, probably in 2020. This project will include a major change to Dendrobium and a tentative change to Pleurothallid.

We are also gathering genus information for classes 98 and 99, in order to perhaps change which genera are included in those classes and which may need to have a class of their own. As of now, while there are trends showing that some genera are grown and shown by many exhibitors, there is not enough of an indication yet that the classes need to be divided. Please keep sending a detailed breakdown of those two classes so we can make an informed determination.

The Committee sent the revised rules and current show schedule to all MAOC societies listed with shows in *Orchids*. This information was sent to the contact listed in the magazine. This covered shows through April, 2019. Subsequently listed shows will also be sent the information in time for them to incorporate the changes in their shows. If a society has a different contact person who should receive this, please let me know.

We continue to attempt to make the show schedule a guideline for orchid society shows. If you have any suggestions or comments, please contact any committee member, or all of us! We love to hear from you." Motion to approve passed.

Technology: In the absence of a Committee Chair, there was no report.

Ways and Means: In the absence of Chair Roberta Ginavan, there was no report. Russ thanked the folks who helped with the auction Saturday night.

Old Business:

Proposal to encourage attendance: Russ announced that he and Jack Shumaker would be working on details of a plan to increase attendance at MAOC meetings by offering about \$250 per person for five societies — cover registration, the banquet and \$100 travel. This new task force will present the plan at the fall meeting in Milwaukee.

New Business:

- 1. As the Congress voted to abandon its Essay Contest at the Fall 2018 meeting in Independence, MO, meeting, there was a motion to transfer the money designated for the Contest (\$1,111) into a "contingency" fund. Motion passed.
- 2. Jeanne Rhinehart, Jack Shumaker, and Russ will be developing a Mid-America PowerPoint program they solicited Mid-America photos. Please send the photos both to Jeanne and also to Russ.
- 3. Russ announced our new webmaster, Cheryl Erins, who will begin work on the new MAOC website later this spring when some of her judging and AOS responsibilities slow down. Russ thanked Brian Spitler for his years of service in that role.

There being no additional business to come before the Congress, Russ adjourned the meeting at 10:28 a.m.

MAOC Breakfast Meeting Spring 2019 in Lansing, MI

Chair Donna Lipowicz opened the Breakfast meeting at 8am with the topic "How to deal with difficult members of your society". Donna started by giving an example of a member in her society that would 'zero in' on new members at a meeting and talk negatively about the President of the society (which was untrue). The society wrote a letter to that member that stated that they were not welcome in the society any longer and sent the dues check back to them.

She also gave an example of a member that came between the society and a judge/speaker that embarrassed the judge in front of his friends and society members. That member was politely asked not to return.

One MAOC member spoke about a professional grower that placed 3 plants in a pot and showed it as one plant. The award was pulled, and they were asked not to return as a vendor at their show.

Another MAOC member told about how one small group of people broke their society into 2 clubs which caused a lot of animosity. They are now back as one club.

An MAOC member told about how, during a beginners' class that he started for his society, another member of the society overheard him speak and corrected a mispronunciation of an orchid name. Another society member came to his aid and told him that person can't grow orchids- can only pronounce them! "If the pronunciation is close enough that they know what you mean, it is close enough!"

Another MAOC member told about how a member of her society asked to volunteer at the annual show (wearing a society shirt) but was not a current member. They said they "hadn't rejoined". They were told that the show "wasn't open to the public yet"!

Another MAOC member told of a member of their society that is very 'caustic' to members and is known for a hostile personality. They move plants in the exhibit at their show, ruining plants as they do it. They complain about members who bake for their meetings and

shows due to dietary restrictions that THEY have but no one has the guts to write a letter to ask that they stop coming.

Another example is the society member that has grown orchids for a long time and believes that their way is "the only way"! "And you have to do it this way!" This member volunteered to do the beginner's group at their society and scared people away. The eventual solution was this person passed away, the society didn't do anything to stop it. Could another parallel group be started to guide new people?

One MAOC member told of a member in his local society that would just start talking about whatever he wanted, regardless of the topic being discussed. Someone told him to "shut up", that they had no regard for the society.

Another example was a member at a local society meeting that would constantly interrupt a speaker by asking question after question and not letting the speaker talk. They were told to stop asking questions until the very end. This same member would go through the member swap table and take lots of plants and then put them in her car. She was told privately to bring the plants back in. She never came back.

Another MAOC member told of when a long-time member of their club passed away and the society was selling that member's collection. Another member bought plants but had switched the price tags to a lesser price. They were told that the "prices must have been a mistake" so that it was known what they did. Another MAOC member told someone else about confidential information discussed at a board meeting which then caused hard feelings with a vendor. Board members were told to not disclose this information.

Bottom line in all of this: try to quietly put a stop to this before it becomes a big problem, as difficult as it may be. Can say "I will take it under advisement" if people want you to do something which you feel is wrong. Or "we will take it up at a board meeting."

The next Mid America Orchid Congress meeting will be held in Milwaukee, WI, September 13-15, 2019. The Affiliated Societies Breakfast topic on September 15 will

be: "What does the MAOC do for your Society?" We hope you will attend to learn how the Mid-America Orchid Congress strives to assist its member societies.
