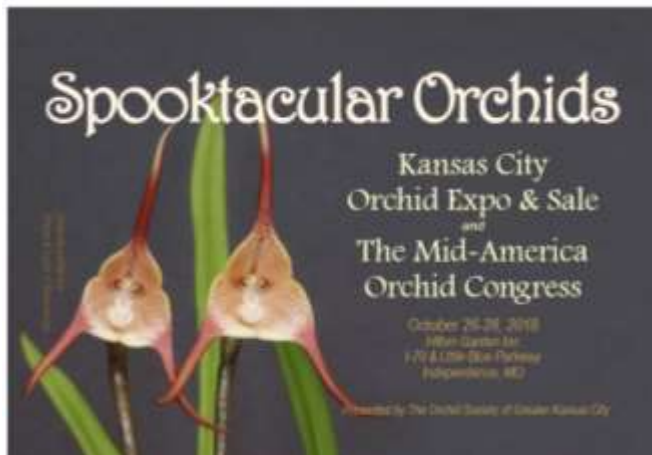

If you weren't in Strongsville (Cleveland) Ohio for the Spring, 2018 MAOC meeting, you missed a great opportunity to see a huge show of orchid displays, plants for sale from vendors, a lively and fun auction, and three excellent speakers. Orchid conservation, in institutions, in our collections and in habitat

were major themes of several of the talks. The West Shore Orchid Society of Northern Ohio put on a quality event. The planning and work of their members and assistance from The Greater Akron Society and the Greater Cleveland Orchid Society was most evident! Congratulations on an event superbly done. The next meeting of the Congress will be in Kansas City, on October 26-28, 2018, hosted by the Greater Kansas City Orchid Society. You can look forward to a great event as I have attended at least two MAOC meetings there. The steak is always good, the company friendly, auction and speakers to be remembered for some time, and, underground orchids to be seen without getting yourself dirty (or going to Australia)! We're going to have a GREAT time, don't miss it.

Speaking of auctions: The West Shore Orchid Society received over \$1,600 as their half of the auction. Societies that host MAOC meeting receive half of the auction receipts. West Shore also received \$750 to defray the cost of having a speaker present a talk on orchid conservation. They have agreed to provide MAOC an analysis of their costs and income to share with you. The purpose is to show hosting a MAOC event, if well planned, can actually be a financial benefit to your society.

Your executive committee is discussing ways to encourage members of societies that haven't attended our events, to come and enjoy the fun, learn more about orchids and make new orchid friends. Financially, with MAOC being a 501 (C) 3 charitable institution, up to four

society members that attend and sign in at the members' meeting on Sunday, can declare all their expenses for attending, as tax deductible. Now seriously, how can you do better than that? The fun of the meeting, show, auction, speakers, plants to purchase, orchid friends, stories to tell when you go to the next society meeting, AND declare it as a tax write off, need I say more?

One last item: I am curious about how you feel concerning all the taxonomic confusion over name (genus) changes and the show schedule. With 50 years of orchid experience under my belt, I've been through a lot of this change stuff. In my "beginning", all Paphs, and Phrags were called Cyps (Cypripediums). Oh my, when that change came about, such an uproar! And that was only two minor changes (and justified). Its looking like the Show Schedule committee is heading toward "Traditionally Known As" in areas of major controversy. MOAC also has a listing of accepted, current genus names, including intergeneric names, but it is a real challenge to keep it current. Add to that, some vendors update names on tags and others don't. Let us know what you feel about all this and any suggestions you may have.

Approval of Minutes: President Vernon asked .or any corrections to the draft minutes of the fall Meeting in Cincinnati. There being none, the minutes were approved. The minutes will be posted on the website.

Treasurer Report: Treasurer Michelle Little read the report (Addendum A/B) showing \$16,088.62 in



the checking account, with our net worth at \$83,325.72. Restricted funds are \$28,776.65, and Unrestricted funds are \$4,549.07. She noted that the auction had netted \$2682.00 which will be split with the Westshore Orchid

Society and auction 2 had netted \$255 so far but that the final amount will be announced at the end of the meeting after last minute checks are received. Motion to approve passed.

Committee Reports:

Audit Committee: Jan Yates read the Audit Report



for Alexa Noel, stating that the records were in good order and that all documentation was correct and there were no problems. Motion to approve passed.

Affiliated Societies: Chair Mary Beth Mansour reported the committee met on April 27 in

Strongsville. The topic of the breakfast meeting was “Challenges in Hosting an Orchid Show.” All societies are paid for 2017. The last newsletter was sent to 151 members, and she stressed in importance of representatives



forwarding it to their society members. The topic for the next meeting’s Affiliated Society breakfast in Kansas City will be the “Role of the Beginner Group” on October 28, 2018. AOS Liaison Report: Doris Asher read the AOS



Liaison report from two meetings, Redland and Santa Barbara. The 2017 Awards featured three from the Chicago Judging Center. There are three new awards, The Sheehan Award, Motes award for breeding and the Storm award for the best

Schomburkia. The first Thomas J. Sheehan Award for the most outstanding volunteer went to our own Aileen Garrison, which had resounding applause. The next meeting is in Apopka, FL, Oct 30-Nov 4, 2018. Since this is detailed, Attachment C is attached. Motion to approve passed.

Annual Meeting: Beth Martin, Chair, discussed Spooktacular Orchids at the Hilton Garden Inn in Kansas City on the weekend of October 27. Speakers include Roy Tokunaga, on flower and nutrition, Gary Meyer, PhD, on *Dracuphilla*, and Gods and Monsters. Larry



Zettler PhD, will be talking on the Ghost Orchid. There will be a tour available to Bird's Botanicals, orchids in a cave, always a hit. Doug Martin mentioned that they have other societies in the area helping. They are looking for host societies for future meetings. Motion to accept passed.

Awards: Jan Yates asked for help on the Awards committee. Anna Morrison volunteered to help. She reported on all the trophies and awards at this meeting. (Editors' note: Special Thanks are due to Janice Yates for providing the show photos.)

Budget Committee: no report in the spring

Communications: Because we have no chair for this committee, there is no report at this time.

Conservation: Chair Bill Morrison reported that he, Russ Vernon, and Doug Martin met and discussed a request from the Minnesota Landscape Arboretum, requesting \$800 or a portion to help fund repairs to the screen house that they will use for propagation of native orchids, pending a receipt of certain requested information. Motion approved to fund provided information is received and correct.

Constitution and By-Laws: No report at this time.

Education and Research: Chair Cheryl Erins



reported that the meeting occurred Friday night with Doug Hartong and Lois Cinert, where a proposal from the NAOCC requesting

a donation help close the \$5000 gap in funding of a *Platanthera* project was discussed. This project includes research into the types of fungi needed to propagate this native orchid. Motion to approve a \$500.00 grant passed.

Historical: Chair, Lois Holmes read a story from the Kansas City Orchid MAOC Show in 1994. Record attendance and auction proceeds despite multiple sports and other activities. There will be an Essay contest that will be announced in the Mid-American. Societies will be requested to write or have people to write. She asked that we ratify the motion proposed last meeting to contribute \$1500 to the AOS specifically for the move of the Archives to Coral Gables. Motion passed. Cheryl Erins will get Michelle the details of how to write the check so that it gets to where it belongs.



Nominating Committee: no report at this time.

Orchidist of the Year: no report

Show Schedule: Lois Cinert reported on the changes in the Rules section of the Show Schedule. Many comments had been received and it is recommended that the number of ribbons in a class be taken out allowing for societies to present multiple ribbons in a class. Clarification on miniatures will be made as well as elimination of the limit of three plants per exhibiter in a class. She will send all changes to Brian for updating the website, as well as every society just as she sees the shows being entered. There was a discussion as to verbiage on exhibits vs displays. She will make all the terms the same to avoid confusion. Cheryl suggested that Aileen Garrison's instructions for doing show tags be included in the Mid-American and posted on the web site. She still wants societies to report totals by class and the entries of classes 98 and 99. Hermann Pigors stated he had Show tags if anyone needed.



Motion approved pending the correction of all terms for exhibit correction.

Technology: no report.

Ways and Means: Chair Roberta Ginavan thanked



everyone for their participation in the auction, especially Lowell Jacks for his brownies. She thanked Russ Vernon and Barry Jones for helping with the auction, and Dorothy and Hermann Pigors for the many

signed treasures. The proceeds the night before were \$2,682.00 and this will be split with the West Shore Orchid Society. The item for Auction 2, was an Alexa with a smart plug and light bulb. This auction raised \$265 and was won by Beth Martin.

New Business

President Russ Vernon asked people to think about how to encourage societies to attend a MAOC event. Doris Asher suggested that we seriously think of going to one face-to-face meeting a year, with the lack of attendance and ever-increasing expenses.

Doug Martin asked that we think about Charles Hess generous offer to match donations for an Orchidgami orchid printed by the NAOCC, in which case he would match our donation, with a match from his former employer Texas Instruments. We get 2000 sheets, costing between \$3 and 4000 for the design/printing. He wants to turn that over to Education and Research so Cheryl Erins will contact Dennis Whigham to ascertain our costs. Motion to approve pending the research of how much it would cost for us to have our own orchidgami, for next meeting.

There being no more business, meeting adjourned at 10:55 am.

Some general news items from the AOS which you
may find of interest:

At the Santa Barbara meeting last month, the auction
brought in more than \$14,000. The orchid show
staged by the Santa Barbara Orchid Society lived up

to its reputation – it was fabulous and huge with
about 54 exhibits – we judges gave 12 flower awards
and three exhibit awards.

We elected new officers in Santa Barbara, and many
of them are Mid-America people: President:
Susan Wedegaertner; Vice Presidents: Robert Fuchs,
Jean Hollebhone; Secretary: Cheryl Erins; Treasurer,
Graham Wood; Assistant Treasurer: Doris Asher;
Trustees: Judy Bailey, Jay Balchan, William Bodei,
Greg Filter, James Heilig, Theresa Kennedy, Phyllis
Prestia, Brandon Tam, David Toyoshima, Sarah
Waddoups, Linda Wilhelm, Charles Wilson.

Our Aileen Garrison received a special honor in
Santa Barbara, when President George Hatfield
presented her with the first Thomas Sheehan Award
for Outstanding Service by an AOS Volunteer. In
presenting this award, the President cited Aileen's
more than 25 years of service to the AOS: "Aileen
Garrison is the outstanding example of what Tom
Sheehan stood for and what this award honoring him
exemplifies."

The Society will publish its tenth special annual
supplement this fall on Cymbidium.

Membership numbers continue to improve –
currently, now in excess of 9,000.

On April 10, 2021, the Society will celebrate its 100-
year anniversary. Bob Fuchs is already hard at work
putting together a celebration at the Biltmore Hotel
in Coral Gables.

Watch for a new AOS t-shirt – Marian Sheehan,
Chair of the Special Funding Committee is planning
to create one.

The AOS has created a "Master Orchidist" program,
similar to the very successful Master Gardener
Program. Look for that to be rolled out this summer.

There are three new annual awards to be given for
the first time for the year 2017, the Walter Off
Award, recognizing the most outstanding Show
Trophy exhibit of the prior year. The Paul and Mary
Storm Award will be given to the grower of the
orchid plant regarded as the most outstanding
example of a hybrid with at least one valid
Myrmecopilia species and/or the former
Schomburgkia species now classified in the genus
Laelia (or any related species or natural hybrids later
described) in its background. The third new award,
the Martin Motes Orchid Breeder's Award, goes to
the grower and hybridizer of the orchid plant

regarded as the most outstanding Award of Quality (AQ) or Award of Distinction (AD).
The fall AOS Members' Meeting will be at the International Slipper Orchid Symposium in Apopka, FL, October 31 – November 4, 2018, and I hope to attend.
