Challenge Paintings

The theme was a backlit subject. Four paintings were shared digitally, and one painting was brought to the meeting. All were beautiful.

Tara Will was our demo artist.

- She paints the shadows first.
- Works on Sennelier la carte paper, using a full sheet. Dry medium only. If it does get wet, don't touch it. Let it dry, and that may save the painting.
- Sketches using a wax pencil or China marker. This keeps the colors clean as she paints.
- She barely touches the paper with the wax pencil
- She used a contour drawing technique, where she didn't lift the pencil.
- She doesn't spend a lot of time sketching because she finds that she is more likely to correct the drawing when she doesn't spend a lot of time on it. She said just because you spent a long time making a mistake doesn't mean you shouldn't correct it.
- Get the essentials drawn.
- Shadows first
- Darkest darks
- The darkness of the shadow is proportional to how dark the object is. For example, a red tomato will have a darker shadow than a white egg.
- Make marks in the direction you want the viewer to look.
- She looks for reflected light and puts those lights in.
- If you have difficulty with value, then a neat box of pastels arranged by hue and value would help.
- Keep your eye out for erroneous shapes, and patterns. For example, a face or a pattern that isn't there.
- Be careful to limit rubbing the pastels because rubbing destroys the reflective quality of pastels.
- She doesn't believe in focal points. "A focal point is a place for the viewer's eye to die."
- Make your marks to lead the viewer throughout the painting.

Directions of marks have meaning.

- Horizontal marks are restful
- Vertical are attention getting
- Diagonal are movement
- Use the direction of the marks to move the viewer's eyes around the painting.
- In a painting you can ask the viewer to dance or rest. As the artist you make that decision with your design and marks.
- She usually completes paintings in 2 hours, one sitting.
- She does offer classes. Check out her website for details. Her classes are 3 hours and each class will focus on a skill. You will post your completed assignment, and she will critique it!
