

Life in the Womb Pastor Weinkauf

Since the 4th Century, June 24 is observed to commemorate St. John the Baptist, the one Scripture most notably leaped in the womb before Mary, the mother of our Lord, who has Jesus in her womb. Now 1700 years later, and 100 days since June 24, 2022 when Roe v. Wade is overturned; Roe has proven to be more than an outrage who insist upon such 'rights' as bodily autonomy and choice without consequences or responsibility of life in the womb.

The protection of life is found in natural law, biological science, and morality of human life unable to defend, protect themselves. You don't have to be Christian to save human life. For Christians the protection of life is centered on Christ who sanctifies the womb, our God who brings forth all life created after His own image, with a soul whom He has died to redeem and desires to spend eternity with them. And also the first point: natural law, biological science, and morality centered in truth to honor our God who creates life and all things.

The protection for abortion (and every other aspect of choice, including euthanasia and assisted suicide) was invented in modern times and has transformed morality. Feminism gave birth to abortion and abortion gave birth to sexual liberation and the experimentation of sexual desire which eventually produced the body/gender/sex circumstances of today. Our society and government cannot define a woman except to say that anyone who feels like one must be one. And we cannot impose any moral or natural law on the mother to decide whether or not life in the womb has any value or rights. They are not distinct or separate but all tied together in what will become the undoing of all the protections that life has enjoyed regarding natural law. If it is legal to end the life in the womb, it becomes more and more untenable to justify the protections of law protecting morality and aspects of life to anyone -especially those whose views are unpopular or controversial. Thus our society has deemed some people and their views don't matter. Further is anyone shocked as the most defenseless life is not protected in our society how life is valued when you have communities with much crimes and murder.

'My body, my choice' is hardly a Christian statement. We are not our own. We have been bought with a price. We belong to the Lord. The life we live is not our own but Christ living in us and through us. We are given marriage and family as a gift -not as a puzzle to design to fit our preferences. Marriage and family are not merely options available to us by choice but the essential order reflected in our creation by God and renewed in His redemption. A child is not a choice. A child is a gift of God, a sacred duty and responsibility. To discard what is God's gift is freedom to choose what is right in his or her own eyes. But that is defined as the arrogance of sin -everyone does what was right in their own eyes. Don't believe the lie that freedom means choice. Jesus tells us that there is a value higher than freedom -the surrender of godly right for loving purpose in His own life as one who came not to be served but to serve and give His light as a ransom for many.

The pro-life movement stands on the most challenged and unpopular truth in modern-day but it is the cornerstone of many truths that have provided a structure and an anchor for the cause of morality and virtue. The undoing of this truth ultimately strips rights from every life and leave us subject to the whims of society, the will of the majority, and the intrusive role of government. The Church is not simply heralding the protection of life but calling our world to repentance lest the decline and deterioration of our world, sin aid and destroy all that would rob us of our rights endowed by God and our humanity.

Janis Joplin once said of touring, "I love being onstage and everything else is just waiting." Tom Petty ran with the lyrics in 1981 and wrote the song, "The Waiting" which became an instant hit. Petty sings: "The waiting is the hardest part; Every day you see one more card; You take it on faith, you take it to the heart; The waiting is the hardest part"

Now that you have the song in your head, think of all the things you wait for. Perhaps it's a formal diagnosis for that new pain you've been having. Perhaps it's the holidays to come around so you can see your beloveds again. The remedy to waiting is patience. And patience relies on faith. But this isn't an obscure blind faith. It is a faith in God. Faith in God is not the same as understanding God. St. Paul says in Romans 11:34, "For who has known the mind of the Lord, or who has been his counselor?" No one knows precisely why God does all that He does. Christians believe that God does what He does intentionally, and what He does is always good for us, because He is truly our Father who cares. God does everything out of kindly love for His beloved children. Yes, even our waiting is part of God's will. And in this waiting, believers can rest assured that the Father is working.

While you wait, trust that you are waiting because God wants you to wait. While you wait, look to God who knows that the time just isn't right yet, and that's okay. With faith in Christ, all outcomes are His outcomes. Waiting is the hardest part on this side of glory. None will know all of God's will until we see Him face to face in Heaven. And yes, Christians even have to wait on heaven. But God is not absent in the waiting. 2 Corinthians 1:3 declares that God is a "God of comfort" in all affliction and waiting. Christ is with us in our waiting, never leaving us or forsaking us.

Whatever it is we wait for, may we do it together with all patience and hope. Let it be a hope in our merciful Father who sent us His Son to save us all.

construction; owned his own company and worked for several commercial large construction companies as a superintendent.






