The Church is a mess! But it's the Lord's Church Pastor Weinkauf

One of the fruits of the Reformation is the acknowledgment the Church was a mess, is a mess, but should not be a mess. We all agree the Church is a mess. A cynic might suggest we're simply rearranging the deck chairs on the Titanic but inaction or often the greatest danger to Christians - apathy; to not care, disregard Jesus in the Sacrament, not go to Church, not immerse yourself into a Christian way of life only dishonors your Lord because it dishonors His Church.

Evangelicals seems to have turned religion into an amusing self-help exercise with a pop soundtrack. The evangelical brand is a moving target of man's ideals, which often implode or abandon the faith - from the Hillsong crowd to Saddleback. It has decided that the church needs to be continually remade in the image of ...man and the results are not pretty.

Protestantism seems to have turned Christianity into a piece of clay to be molded by every generation into their own golden calf of self-interest and self-awareness. Protestants have money but no people and certainly few kids, so they keep putting the rainbow on everything, love everything and presuming this is God's work and the cross was but a footnote in history.

Rome wants to hold tradition above all else, while the Pope warns repeatedly the greatest dangers to the world are capitalism and global warming, all the while winking at liberals who support everything as long as they're socialist and being one of the most authoritarian popes.

Anglicanism has put the best ceremonial and vestments as lipstick on a pig and don't believe what God says and calls it beautiful; and will work to remove anyone who quotes the Bible.

Lutheranism. The ELCA, Europeans, recently Australians and Japanese have left historical Christianity, as they disagree with Scripture over the culture and a church Luther wouldn't recognize.

While us in the LCMS have our own issues a plenty too, a lot made by 'evangelical types' and 'wannabes' that ignore our Confessions they've made a vow unto and live by what 'synod' means. Along with many in the LCMS aren't bothered by being "too modern American evangelical" but upset with what they think is "too Roman Catholic." They would be embarrassed that Luther's point was for the Church to be more catholic. I hear plenty of stories about our congregations, their happenings, their practices, their pastors. Often to 'fix' the church, LCMS pastors and people get rid of hymns, have women do pastoral things in the service, ditch the historical western Rite of liturgy, toss-out vestments. This along with other things going on for 1000's of years needs to be "fixed" in order for the church to "survive" and "grow" in our time.

I give thanks to God to have a place such as Risen Savior even as we too are a bunch of sinners in need of God's mercy. I hear many positive statements about our congregation in various LCMS gatherings and when I travel. I hear, mostly from our region, disparaging comments about the 'type' of Lutherans we are. Yes, the Church has always been a mess. Our Lord does not call on each member to fix it, but He does call you to be faithful in what's before you. The Lord has called on each of us to do our duty to His doctrinal truth and daily life. It ought to be the goal of every pastor and every person in the pew, not to 'fix' things but to "stand firm" upon the Scripture and all it brings to bear in the Divine Service. *(next page)*

Yes, as the church is filled with sinful people, but it is the Lord's Church, His very bride, you honor her.



✠ **ESTHER MARGUERITE KALEBAUGH** ✠ **JUNE 24, 1930 – OCTOBER 15, 2024**



Our Savior Jesus Christ has destroyed death and brought life and immortality to light through the Gospel. Let us remember with thanksgiving what God has done through His servant Esther.

Esther was given life by her Lord, born June 24, 1930, in Kansas City, KS to Isaac and Margaret Goldberg. She became a child of God and baptized as an infant at Central Methodist Church, Kansas City, KS. As a teenage she would play piano for services.

She attended Junior College where she met, Howard Kalebaugh. They were united in Holy Matrimony on May 25, 1955 at Central Methodist Church. Esther was Confirmed in 1957 at Immanuel Lutheran Church, Kansas City, KS and received the life-giving Body and Blood of her Lord throughout her life.

Their marriage was blessed with gift of children, David and Susan. Esther was greatly involved with her children's, then grandchildren's activities and schools.

She served devoutly in the LWML, Quilting Circle, Altar Guild, Katie's Sisters, Bible study, and numerous activities of the church, always looking to help.

Esther was preceded in death by her husband of 64 years, Howard Kalebaugh on September 10, 2019, and her son-in-law Gary Stauch. She leaves behind

son, David (Tammy) Kalebaugh, daughter Susan Stauch, and many grandchildren, great grandchildren and great great grandchildren.

She was a member of Immanuel Lutheran Church, later a member of Grace Lutheran, Kansas City, KS, then Risen Savior Lutheran Church, Basehor.

On October 15, 2024, God blessed Esther with a holy death and took her to heaven to receive a crown of life. Her body will rest at Chapel Hill Cemetery, Kansas City, KS awaiting resurrection of Christ's return.

Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of His saints. The Lord gives and the Lord takes away; blessed be the name of the Lord. We give thanks to God; Father, ✠ Son, and Holy Spirit for our loved one Esther and we look forward to a blessed reunion with all those in Christ.

Fifty years ago....

It was 50 years ago when great matters of doctrine were upon the LCMS nationally and impacted our congregation (St. Martin Lutheran Church) as it had a pastoral vacancy. We were one of several locations where matters were tense and one of a few congregation throughout the LCMS where even division takes place.

Part III from the History of St. Martin's Lutheran Church by Steve Mariano.

On July 20, 1976, the Board of Adjudication notified Reverend Berner and the LCMS congregation they had met on July 18, to review the appeal, however they had information that St. Martin (SEMINEX) became an independent congregation on July 12, and "It would therefore appear, that the Commission could take no further action"

The LCMS congregation again appealed to the board for a hearing stating that the Board had delayed the hearing and that when the appeal was presented the SEMINEX group was part of the Synod. The board agreed to look again at the situation at St. Martin's

By this time the LCMS Congregation began holding worship services in the Lansing 4H building on Sunday evenings. A letter was sent to every member asking for their attendance on Sunday, August 8, to sign the new petition for the Board; 31 communicant members signed the petition. The congregation prepared the documents and on September 3, 1976, held a Voters Assembly and met with Reverend Pullman for further guidance and instruction on how to proceed. He recommended that the congregation continue pursuing the matter through the Commission on Adjudication. He was very forthright concerning the church property and informed them that the property division would probably be a civil matter and any decision by the court would probably be in favor of the SEMINEX church. Even though the congregation knew their chances of winning in court were slim they decided to continue to pursue the matter through the Commission on Adjudication and hired a civil law attorney from Topeka, Floyd E. Gehrt, to prepare for a possible civil court case. That month all the documents were again sent to the Commission of Adjudication. It would take more than a year for the Kansas Commission of Adjudication to take action.

On March 11, 1977, the Commission of Adjudication sent the documentation to the SEMINEX church and notified them of the upcoming hearing. They responded to the commission that they had no reason to participate in the hearing because they were not part of the Missouri Synod since they were now an independent congregation as acknowledged by President Bruns on January 4, 1977.

The Commission of Adjudication finally met on October 10, 1977. Eleanor Lenahan, Theresa Eberth, and Delbert Merwin appeared before the commission and presented the congregations case. The Commission ruled in favor of the LCMS congregation. On October 13, Floyd Gehrt informed the SEMINEX church of the commission's decision and asked them to transfer the assets; on November 10, the Commission officially notified the SEMINEX church. They refused to comply with the Boards decision and the LCMS congregation decided to take the SEMINEX church to civil court.

As a final blow to St. Martin (LCMS), President Bruns notified them on February 1, 1978, he would not record a lay delegate from the church at the District Convention because "Our records show that we currently have no St. Martin's Lutheran Church since the congregation advised us they were withdrawing from the Synod (and the District) and would become an independent Lutheran Church." After almost four years of controversy, including his personal involvement with the two separate congregations, and ignoring the fact that St Martin (LCMS) had continued to financially support the District and Synod since 1975 he refused to acknowledge the existence of St. Martin as part of the LCMS. The congregation had to appeal to Synod's Commission on Constitutional Matters to solve this latest situation. The Commission ruled that "the minority (LCMS congregation) has complied with and adhered to the congregations Constitution and entitled to the property, and therefore is presumably to be regarded as the continuing congregation in membership with the Synod, this group is entitled to have a lay delegate seated at the convention". On April 1, 1978, Wes Neu was seated as the Lay Delegate from St. Martin (LCMS) at the Kansas District Convention.

President Bruns still did not request that St. Martin be reinstated to the Synod. It would take two more years until the Missouri Synod finally directed the Kansas District President (Rev. George Bruening who replaced Rev. Bruns) to compete the necessary documentation to have the congregation reinstated.

Many of the original LCMS group became dismayed with the lack of support from the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod and especially the District. Some left and became members of other LCMS congregations, a few were so disappointed with the Synod they left completely to join other faiths. Even with all the turmoil and disappointment many of the faithful

continued to drive forward and would not see the congregation collapse. They began discussing building a new church building and started a building fund for that purpose if the court case was lost.

On November 26, 1978, the congregation celebrated its 70th Anniversary at the Farmland Industries research facility in Bonner Springs, Kansas. Two worship services were conducted with a noon buffet served in between. Reverend Berner was the speaker at the morning service and Reverend Wilson Maurer returned from Mt. Calvary Lutheran Church in Marysville, Kansas, to conduct the afternoon service. The Congregation used Walter Marxen's organ for the music and honored 82 year old Miss Alma Eberth, one of the few living members from the original congregation formed in 1908.

It would take two more years for the civil court case to wind its way through the legal system. Meanwhile the congregation continued to worship at various locations in the community and support various mission work.

The case was finally heard in October 1979. Both congregations were present and St. Martin (LCMS) was represented by Floyd Gehrt. Eleanor Lenahan took the stand for St. Martin (LCMS). She had been a member of the congregation since the late 1940's, had been with the LCMS group during the division, and served as congregation Secretary since 1978. She was not only extremely knowledgeable of the events, but also the doctrine and practice in the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod.

On December 5, 1980, the court announced its decision in favor of the SEMINEX church; primarily because the ruling by the Kansas Commission of Adjudication could not be enforced since its decision occurred eight months after the SEMINEX church left the Synod.

Although forewarned this would probably be the courts decision, the members of St. Martin were devastated, but they did not lose their faith. Within days the members met and decided to build a new church to house the St. Martin Evangelical Lutheran Church, Missouri Synod, completed in 1981 and the building continued to serve the congregation until the new church was built in 2011.




