## Cleansed from Distractions Pastor Cockran

Of all the images that come to mind of Decembers long past, one that tends to rise up in my mind with certain joy is lounging on the couch with a full stomach, surrounded by family and friends. However, if I am being honest, what also rises in my mind are the images of the hectic hours ahead of relatives arriving, where the family engages in breakneck speed-cleaning.

In a certain way, this routine of "clean first, rest second" mirrors the annual Advent fast unto the Christmas feast. Advent is a time of anticipation and especially preparation. Namely, we prepare for soon being filled with Christ incarnate and the kingdom of God by first being cleansed of our sins through repentance (1 Jn 1:8-9). One of the marks of Christian maturity is desiring to see even more of one's own sin, since it leads us to see even more of our Savior's mercy and love in forgiving us of our sin. Then, bearing fruits in keeping with repentance, this leads us to flourish even more in conforming ourselves to how God made us to live and have our being.

One particular category of sin that affects us deeper than we realize are what the ancients called acedia (pronounced 'uh-see-dee-uh'). The common English word "sloth" really does not do it justice. Rather, this is best thought of as spiritual lethargy, a sluggishness of soul, even being distracted and so indifferent against the Word of God and the true, good, and beautiful that flows from the Word. When we think of the story of Mary and Martha (Lk 10:38ff), we would not naturally think of Martha as "slothful." However, she does engage in acedia as she uses her cleaning and hosting as a distraction taking her away from the words of Jesus.

What is causing you to be indifferent to the word? What causes you to be distracted? Well, this Advent, let us take stock in that which causes us to lose out the most on the gifts God has to give, and how we can safeguard our time and focus for that which matters most. Consider especially how much you participate in the average American devotion of eleven hours of the day to consuming digital media (Nielsen, 2018). Take a step back and assess the enslaving grip that certain technologies may indeed have on your soul and also affect your relationships. Begin to cut away at your addictions. Many resources are available, as I am presently digging through a few of them and am happy to share what resources I have found most helpful. Just ask!

Fill your cleansed soul with what is true, good, and beautiful. Attend the Advent midweek services. Gaze at the beauty of the stained glass. Ponder the stories and seek the Scriptures that the images depict. Compare such images to the images of deception that often fill our screens that are bankrupt of beauty. This is only the beginning. God's got more to give than you can imagine. It's time to cleanse our hearts of distractions as we look forward to the coming of our King.

### Time Pastor Weinkauf

New Church Year now. New Year ahead. One of the faults and results of the Fall in Eden was to fully embrace time, particularly the present moment, and a sense of personal destiny. Adam and Eve were not simply making a choice about God but about themselves for the moment. They literally seized the day from the hands of God who created time itself. All of man since, desires to define time and to make each person the center of that definition. You see it everywhere, even among us: It is my time, my destiny, my future, my life.

In our distorted view of time, we have invented such things as: "personal fulfillment," "life worth living", "bucket lists", feelings to define truth, we have seen the mottos of YOLO (you only live once) and "you be you" for our days. We have wrested this thing called time from the hands of God and made it our own. But we have chosen an illusion of time in which we can make chart our destiny, right our wrongs, judge for ourselves, and make our peace with death. Nowhere is this more telling than the way people respect life and God given-time itself from the moment to concept to natural death.

Christians are not without being tempted by this false and misleading view of time in which WE are its center. The reality is that time without God is nothing but a curse. Without God as its center, it is the worst of all possible burdens, a fruitless endeavor destined for predictable end, God's wrath. It is not simply that God rescues us from the burdens of time gone wrong with the resurrection but that God takes back time from us and gives us His time back. For me to live is Christ as Paul states.

We fight daily with an urge to spend time for ourself, to consume instead of produce, to find ease instead of service, and not ever have difficult times. In doing so, we are urged along by St. Paul to walk worthy -not of this life- but of the God who rescued us from sin and delivered to us -a life beyond imagination with Him.

We pursue this life not on our own or for ourselves but as a people set apart for the good works that shine Christ's light into our darkness and find our purpose not in us but in the Lord who made us for Himself.

Stewardship is the living out of this sanctification – God's holy work in us, the acknowledgement that everything we have that is good has been given to us by God and is good only when we use it for His purposes. Stewardship is our use of time first of all -- gift, blessing, and vocation. Everything else in our stewardship pales in comparison to time and flows from the right ordering of our days. Indeed, Psalm 90 is especially devoted to our Lord work to us in our time, as we pray: So teach us to number our days that we may get a heart of wisdom. And Wisdom has come in the flesh for you.






