Apostolic Times

Pastor Weinkauff

From Apostolic times to Christendom to Apostolic times. We all see times have changed. Not just in this year or last but what has been going on for the last few decades. The pace of the change may see more apparent now. Look around you and recognize that ours are Apostolic times, not Christendom times. Christendom is over before 1985. "Christendom" means our culture and manner of life help transmit "the faith once delivered to the saints" (Jude 1:3). That's long gone. Throughout the Western world today, the Church has endured things we never thought possible just a few years ago. The cultural air we breathe neither transmits the faith nor is neutral about the faith; but overtly hostile to the faith. You see it in all forms of media and politics, commerce, marketing strategy, and every major corporation's business plan -aggressively seeks to marginalize the faith. You see it with treatment of marriage, how historical Christians are portrayed, human sexuality, in woke culture norms that penalize those who, for reasons of sincerely held religious convictions, will not compromise to harmful notions that stand contrary to the Bible; you are criminalized, pushed to the fringes of society with labels "extremist" and "phobic." Those who imagine "it can't happen here" should read the Executive Order on "gender identity" signed by President Biden a few hours after his inauguration. His administration and Congress continue to work on steps of the "Do No Harm Act" and "Equality Act" which have a dramatic impact on all true Christians and institution of the Church. Look how hostile businesses and governments have acted toward Christians who refuse mandates, or don't use the right pronouns or don't embrace ideals the company or entity puts forth.

"Apostolic times" call us to join the experience of the early Church, vividly described in the Acts of the Apostles. There we find the people of our Risen Savior with a trust to forsake all for the Gospel and a way of life that is contrary to the culture around them.

So a ragtag bunch of nobodies lived their lives as God's people in this civilized world immersed in sexual immorality, false gods, and a 'woke' intolerance of Christians. They faced ridicule, discriminated against, suffer persecution, even to lose family, possessions and martyred for the faith. Like as foolish, uneducated babblers, as St. Paul discovered on the Areopagus of Athens (Acts 17:18). Others thought them crazy, out-of-touch with the culture, as the Roman governor Festus exclaimed to Paul (Acts 26:24). But they persevered; manifested a nobler, more compassionate way of life rooted in Scripture.

In Christendom times, a "missionary" is someone who leaves a cultural comfort zone and goes to proclaim the Gospel where it's not been heard before. In Apostolic times, "mission territory" is everywhere -the kitchen table, next door neighbor, the workplace; the mission extends into our lives as consumers and citizens.

The true, authentic Lutheran Church of the 21st century -is nothing other than the Apostolic Church in practice and belief. We need to confess the truth (teaching and speaking), to invite, to bear witness (reflected in our lives) to the great gifts of His Kingdom and the bride of Christ, the Church, where God calls to gather. And Christians are compelled to gather even under threats to personal safety.

We're Each Given 24 Hours

"Time is money," the saying goes. We can understand this without much explanation. If my time at work is worth \$20 for every hour worked, then the time that I am otherwise not working is worth, well... \$20 per hour! Right? Well, yes and no.

On the one hand, time isn't merely money, but time is valuable. As the Psalmist writes, "teach us to number our days that we may get a heart of wisdom" (Ps 90:12). While one of us may be "worth" to our employer \$15 per hour, another \$30, or another \$150, to our Lord we are all equally valuable in His sight, for He Himself declares us valuable in Jesus. While also one of may live to 55, another 70, and yet another 95, we the baptized are all presently living in eternal life, even now.

Thus, as we all experience the passage of time in this world and life, Paul counsels us to "make the best use of the time" (Eph 5:16). God gives to each of us (according to the 7th commandment, "you shall not steal") our own allotment of possessions by which we are freed in the Gospel to share with our neighbors in need. So also, God gives us our abilities to be in service to our neighbor according to the time He gives us. Be purposeful with how you budget your time, just as we ought to be purposeful with budgeting our money.

Consider what it means to "waste time" according to the Ten Commandments. Which one would "wasting time" fall under? Again, the 7th commandment! Wasting time is akin to wasting money that could otherwise be put in service to God and neighbor! As Luther writes in the Small Catechism, "What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not take our neighbor's money or possessions, or get them in any dishonest way, but help him to improve and protect his possessions and income." So, when we drain away for hours on end "binge watching" television, what are we not doing? We're not using the time to help our neighbor improve and protect their possessions and income. To be sure, the human body needs leisure and rest, but always in order to prepare the self for more time of service in His kingdom, serving God and neighbor as God gives us the strength and power to do so.

Ultimately, using our time in service to God and neighbor is a privilege, knowing that every single day you have is given worth by your Savior, Jesus Christ. Yes, most days we're tired from all of the toil. But each day gives us new reason to rise anew in our Baptismal identity. Christ has claimed you as His own, and now He works through you to bring blessings to those around you. This makes every day a blessing, as your days are blessed both now on earth and forever in the endless days to come. God gives you time, God gives you value, for God has given you Jesus.





- **Cemetery Board** (1 of 3 positions)




Monthly Feature Highlight


This room to the south of the Altar is called the Sacristy.




