Who isn't on edge these days? Pastor Weinkauff

Who isn't frustrated by the "other" side? Who isn't exhausted by the media's incessant desire to keep people traumatized, living in fear? Who doesn't get angry at the decay of culture and society all around us? We lament. We pray. We get mad at the various agendas being promoted in schools, social media, TV that when you 'look into it' you see how unchristian, anti-traditional family, anti American values and freedoms we desire as God's people. Recent study shows various vocations in this last 2 years have care-fatigue and stress "off-the-chart;" that brings about a tired, sinful anger and lashing out. Another study shows 7 out of 10 workers overly stressed-out in these days.

Godly anger comes when something we love, someone we care about, something we care about has been hurt, wronged, abused, or mocked. St. Paul tells us "Be angry and do not sin; do not let the sun go down on your anger" Eph. 4:26. How do you do this. We cannot hurt or harm our neighbor. That doesn't mean that we shouldn't speak God's truth even if people get mad or offended. We should not sin by doing anything out of revenge, or to be mean, or as in the 8th Comm. by putting the "worst construction" on someone's actions.

Pray. And as with evening devotions, that the sun not go down on our anger, we pray like Psalm 4, a great bed time prayer. Or Psalm 13. Okay, just pray all 150 Psalms. We ask God to listen, relieve our burdens, to fight for us, to address it in His wisdom, to guide us in our actions and have mercy on us all.

As we see all that goes on around us, repent of your sinful anger- that is anger out of jealous, spite, pride, just being negative, complaining, self-serving behavior. Then, as opportunity in your vocations -help, encourage, discipline and forgive those who anger you. Pray for your enemies as Scripture compels you, that their heart may turn to the Lord and you for reconciliation and God-pleasing resolve in accord with His Word.

Always in love, forgive your neighbor as you also have been forgiven. Your God spent His wrath on His Son that your sinful anger might be forgiven.

And if you be angry for a godly cause, angry for the evil around you, the evil you see, trust Your Lord will address it, He may even use you for His good and gracious will in the process. But you trust He will see to your good. It is not up to you to fix people, fix the politics, fix the world. Stand for truth. Be bold to confess God's Word. Contend for those things that are good and right and salutary. And also rejoice then, your God is with you and has your cause.

Trust the Preaching of the Sacrifice

Pastor Cockran

First: Thanks be to the Lord of heaven and earth who inspired every one of you to provide our family with such a warm and hospitable welcome. Your gifts and kind words have meant the world to us, and we are glad to be here and can't wait to get to know you all better!

Our family's journey from Tucson to Basehor hasn't been without its challenges. It's hard to believe that it's only been a month and a half since this journey began, because it's been quite the whirlwind! Speaking of "whirlwind," this word popped up in my devotional reading last week in the end of the book of Job, and got me thinking. The prophet Job had been through his many challenges, his many "whirlwinds." The once-prosperous ruler all in one day lost all his oxen, donkeys, sheep, and servants. Then, before the day ended, a "great wind" came and knocked down the house of his sons and daughters, killing them all. Soon thereafter, Job also lost his health, with his body covered with loathsome sores. Job had, indeed, been put through quite the whirlwind.

For the next 35 chapters, Job keeps his faith in the Lord, testifying that his suffering is not a direct punishment for his sins, but rather the Lord has still not yet forsaken him. Job believes not in the preaching of his suffering, but in the preaching of the sacrifice (Job 1:5, 19:25: "I know that my Redeemer lives"). Job testifies that the death of the one whom God provides takes the place of Job and his sin, so that Job is counted as righteous before God because of the sacrifice.

But after such whirlwind of temptations from the false preaching of Job's "friends," Job's faith wavers. Job's final words are that of pride, saying essentially, "no, I don't deserve all of this suffering. God is unjust." But the Lord is not done with Job, for He is the One who "will not let you be tempted beyond your ability, but with the temptation he will also provide the way of escape, that you may be able to endure it."

Job 38 begins, "Then the Lord answered Job out of the whirlwind." God proceeds to preach the Law to Job, humbling him for the next three chapters. It was exactly what Job needed, "therefore I despise myself, and repent in dust and ashes" (Job 42:6). Then the Lord brought in the Gospel, He "restored the fortunes of Job" and "blessed the latter days of Job more than his beginning."

The Lord with our family's move (and the sicknesses that have followed) has been putting us through our own whirlwind. He puts you through your whirlwinds. Nevertheless, we give thanks to God for the sacrifice of His Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, "who in every respect has been tempted as we are, yet [remained] without sin" (Heb 4:15), and by whose sacrifice enables God to pass over our sins and declare to us, "I will never leave you nor forsake you" (Heb 13:5).
