What is the worst thing that can happen to you this week? Think about it. Our lives, everything must be rooted in the love of our God above all gods. We poor miserable rebels must have God look upon us in mercy through the works of Christ.

1st Commandment. Your God is what you fear, love, and trust in above all things. How have you trusted in God in these times above all things?

2nd Commandment. The Lord's Name upon us in Baptismal waters saves, gives us Jesus, gives us true life. Do we call upon Him in every trouble, pray, praise and give thanks? Because He has Named us, we do not live as the world lives their life.

We cannot save ourselves from death and the grave. We can only all repent and trust our Lord to hold our lot. In a world that promotes fear, let us boldly proclaim life. The life our Lord gives. And that certainly would mean one's concern over their health should not keep one away from God's House. Live in the life He gives us without fear but as those who are immortal who have died with Christ and have been raised with Him.

Beware of Cuddly Kittens

It is pretty clear how all of humanity is born with the instinct to run from things that cause us harm. Much of parenthood, really, is simply teaching our children what to avoid. Eventually, we also develop how to fight against those things that we cannot run away from as well. This "flight-or-fight" response is "the instinctive physiological response to a threatening situation, which readies one either to resist forcibly or to run away" (Oxford Languages). We tend to do fairly well. We put our most dangerous animals in cages. We take shelter for the occasional bad thunderstorm. We can hold our own commuting home during rush hour. However, we are not very good at avoiding or fighting the one thing that endangers our lives the most: false doctrine.

Remember the words of St. Peter: "Be sober-minded; Be watchful. Your adversary the devil prowls around like a roaring lion, seeking someone to devour. Resist him, firm in your faith" (1 Pet. 5:8-9).

The problem, however, is how subtle and cunning the devil can be with his false doctrine. That is, he can make his lionroaring prowling seem more like a meow from a cuddly kitten. We actually have this experience in common with our first parents. God taught Adam and Eve the one thing that would kill them. The fruit of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil was the most dangerous thing in the new world. Enter false doctrine: "You will not surely die," the ancient serpent said, and since then he's become all the craftier at deceiving souls away from God's Word. In fact, one of God's blessings after the fall into sin was making clear that the devil is not our friend, but God said instead to the serpent, "I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your offspring and her offspring" (Gen 3:15).

Jesus said: "Do not fear those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul. Rather fear him who can destroy both soul and body in hell." (Matt. 10:28) We are not to fear physical death because physical death has lost its sting in Jesus. What should we fear? Condemnation. Eternal death. How would this come? Through unchecked false belief, despair, and other great shame or vice that leads ultimately to casting off the faith entirely.

False doctrine is dangerous because it is hidden. The devil is always seeking to get you to place your trust in anything other than God's Word. The tempter comes when you least expect. He comes with the teaching that your flesh likes to hear, that you can be good all on your own instead of having the righteousness of Jesus gifted to you. It worked on Adam and Eve. It can work on you if you lower your guard. "Resist the devil, and he will flee from you. Draw near to God, and he will draw near to you" (James 4:7-8). Build yourself up by the Word of God, and pray that you will finally overcome the false doctrines of the world, devil, and flesh, and finally win the victory through Christ Jesus, our Lord.

Who is a Kantor? Timothy Schreiber, Kantor

As my time here at Risen Savior continues into its fourth month, some have become well accustomed to the title of "Kantor." As a matter of practicality, it makes introductions rather simple when everyone has something to call me regardless of if you know or remember my name. Additionally, the word rolls off the tongue in an almost identical way as does the title of "Pastor." Is that an intentional parallel? Perhaps not, but it was an important part of my discussions with the Pastors as we discussed the question "What should we call you?"

There is value in the similarity between the two titles of "Pastor" and "Kantor." Historically, the roll of Kantor was common in churches and schools (often the same institution in Post-Reformation Germany). The Kantor is tasked with providing music for services, including choral, instrumental, and solo music (including chant). Additionally, Bach, for example, directed the boys choir for the local school, and frequently completed more rudimentary tasks around the church. (Bach was also the accountant for his church). The Kantor's primary goal in directing all these forms of music simultaneously is a goal familiar to us church-goes: To Preach the Gospel.

This is where the importance behind the pronunciation comes in. There is a direct link between the goal of Pastor and Kantor during the Gottesdienst (Divine Service). The Kantor is not called to absolve sins publicly in the stead and by the Command of Jesus, nor is he called to consecrate the elements of the Holy Eucharist. He is called to create an unified front of both spoken and sung preaching of God's Word for the Liturgy. He is a sort of "Pastor-of-Music." (If we belonged to an Anglican tradition, my title would literally be "Minister of Music"). He works alongside the clergy to insure that everything fits into the overarching lituray of Christian life within the church: The appointed Pericopes of the Lectionary.

Although the title of "Music Director" is often used to describe a similar position, it is meet and right to observe the spiritual emphasis that goes along with a Kantor. I am not a contracted professional who comes in every Sunday to accomplish a job description just to gain a paycheck and sustain myself. I am a Lutheran, I am a member of this Congregation, I am following the vocation God has given me, and, in my vocation as Kantor, I do all things to the Glory of God.




