Eastertide Musings Pr. Weinkauf

<u>Pastor Burgdorf.</u> 6 months in. I have found it nothing but a blessing to serve with him. I believe you have all found him (and his wife and 4 young boys) to be very engaging, and a wonderful joy to be part of the Risen Savior family. We have spent several trips together, many amazing times together as "iron sharpens iron" Prov. 27. Our families get together, as with this Easter Sunday meal. I am enriched by him and thank God for him. As he's 21 years my younger, what a tremendous blessing now and for the future here.

Summer Vicar? Summer Vicars have completed their 1st year of seminary, They spend June, July, August working at a congregation. There are not many as they are single men seeking work in a parish for the summer. We have secured a Summer Vicar for us. Due to his commitment in the US Army Reserves, he can't start until July 1. He will live in my basement. Pastor Burgdorf and I plan to take care of all his needs. We will create an office space for him in the front office. This could be an ongoing opportunity of summer seminarians to be nurtured at our congregation, without the significant cost of the 'normal' vicarage. Perhaps once our mortgage debt of \$650,000 is paid and if the Lord continues to grow the congregation needs, we may consider a return as a regular Vicarage parish. I have been told from several at Concordia Theological Seminary that they would love to have us again. Our congregation has quite a reputation in the LCMS and at our Seminary in Fort Wayne, IN.

St. Luke's Altar. This will come up at the Voter's Assembly. St. Luke's Lutheran Church, Kansas City, KS recently closed and we have opportunity to receive and preserve the historical altar used by the first Lutherans in the KC area. We can pick it up in early June, as the Sacred Art Committee recommends for it to be stained to match our wood décor and placed as a side Altar in the north transept (where the Christmas tree is put up).

District Convention, June 5-6. Every 3 years our District, which comprises of the state of KS and 160 congregations, gathers for a 2-day convention. Each congregation sends 1 Pastor and 1 lay delegate (Darrell Hall is our delegate). Both Pastor Burgdorf and I will cherish the time with other pastors as a large group of like-minded men gather in the hotel courtyard until late into the nights. Interesting to note, Risen Savior is the only congregation to have resolutions as we pastors submitted 2 overtures: to encourage more weekly services; and to encourage use of the historic Church Lectionary of Sunday readings. It's highly unusual no other KS congregation submitted business for the Convention. This year appears very uneventful for any elections or resolutions. **Saturday 6 pm Divine Service.** It ends Memorial Day weekend, May 24, until September. We are looking at moving it. Instead of Saturday 6pm, it would be <u>Sunday 5 pm</u>. So we still have a weekend evening Divine Service, but it would help with pastor's time off and ease those Saturdays with weddings. Please give any feedback to myself, Pastor Burgdorf, or any Elders.

What's hard, what hurts. Both I and Pastor Burgdorf covet your ongoing prayers for strength and faithfulness in serving. I was recently asked "what is the most difficult part of your work, what hurts?" Certainly the difficulties people face that I help address or am aware of, of course the deaths, all weighs very heavy. But that is my vocation, why I am here. The reason the Lord sent me (and Pastor Burgdorf here) is to bear burdens for the people, eager to serve for any need, at any time. Having only a few days off in 2023 and 2024, rarely seeing Jodi was very hard; but those days have passed! But what hurts the most... people not here on Sunday. People I care deeply for, who I think of often, pray for each week, members and visitors --that do not come to receive our Lord's gifts in the Divine Service. It weighs heavy upon me those who are not regular in attendance. I note the Parable of the Sower, that only 1 in 4 takes root and continue in the Word and of course it is the work of the Holy Spirit alone to create and establish faith. I weekly mourn for those who I love, have served, sacrificed, to not be with us Sunday morning to receive what they need most in life, what our Lord commands them to do and desires to join Himself literally to Him, His life! It deeply hurts also as a few have left Lutheranism for the false teachings, errors of other denominations. Pray for those long-absent. Also to note: Thank you for showing friendly hospitality to our visitors! You do have an impact. I dearly thank you for reaching out to new faces -as it seems every week we have visitors!

Thank you for the privilege of serving you! The Lord Is Risen! Blessed Eastertide.

Not What's Acceptable But What's Best

We should not strive to do what is acceptable but what is best. This principle should drive the Christian's thinking for worship and daily life. We do not want to do the bare minimum or ask "What is the most I can get away with". But this is always our temptation. We are like a child who is told to stay in his room, but constantly creeps closer and closer to the door wondering just how much of their body can cross the threshold before Dad gets upset, because after all we are doing what he wants....at least technically.

So is the case with worship practice, our dress and decorum in the Lord's house. You do not see congregations cracking down across the country demanding ankle-length dresses for women, and full suits for men. No, the way of the world is a way of ease and a blurring of the sacred and the profane.

The world encourages you to dress how you want, live for self, do as you wish with your body, and give no thought to what message you are presenting as long as you are living your "authentic life". This thinking is contrary to Christianity. Our lives are not our own, but they have been purchased with a price, the very blood and body of God, and even our bodies are given to us by our Heavenly Father, we are not free to do with them whatever we like. How we use our bodies, and even how we dress them confesses what we believe that God has created man and woman for particular roles. The man is the head and the woman is his helper. Man is not given to authority to abuse his wife or not care for her, but is given headship so that he might love her as Christ cares for the Church giving himself to her.

To this end, St. Paul directs the Christians in the church of Corinth that the women should pray, that is participate in the

divine service, with their heads covered, as a sign of the headship. They are to cover their heads to make a confession about what it is they believe not just for themselves but for those around them, and even for the angels! Our lives and our bodies are not our own but serve our neighbor.



If you look on Sunday mornings you will see several women following this admonition of St. Paul in our services. If you desire to participate in what the Church has practiced almost universally until the 1960s, there will be a display set up in the narthex with various veils and head coverings. Like the books for sale, please feel free to purchase one for your use, simply place the money in the offering plate with the memo "CPH books". Whatever your choice may be, I encourage you to always consider the confession you are making to the world, be it in your dress, actions, or words. Seek not merely what is acceptable but what is best. If you have any further questions about this ancient practice please contact Pastor Weinkauf or Pastor Burgdorf.

Join us in service to the community to clean-up our adopted portions of the highway. Meet at the church at 8 am for instructions then we'll head do to the highway. Great exercise too.




