A Fundamental Problem with Al Pastor Burgdorf

Love it or hate it, AI is making its way into all facets of our daily lives. Whether you are trying to talk to a company on the phone, looking at artwork, or even listening to music, AI creations are everywhere, and many of them are quite convincing. What are we to make of all this as Christians? Is it the beginning of the end? Is it the start of a Terminator-esque apocalypse? Is it completely neutral and fine? How do we consider this and interact with it as the people of God?

First, as we always do, we begin with Christ. In the beginning, before time and space, God the Father spoke the word, and Christ brought into being all of creation. God creates; it is in His nature. He does not create because He is lacking, but because He delights in His creation. At the pinnacle of creation, He places man and invites him to do something radical. He invites Adam and Eve to create, to be fruitful and multiply, to participate in the creation of more men and women.

To man is the gift of creation given. And this gift transcends simple reproduction. Man, made in the image of God, creates beauty. We are given to task of tending and keeping, of shaping the garden God planted, to making it beautiful and caring for it. Even after the fall into sin, God tells man to be fruitful and multiply, to create, and we have been since creation! Music, hymns, sculptures, art, architecture, just to name a few places, we have expressed our dominion over creation and shaped it. And it, as it was in creation, is good.

That brings us to AI. What is the purpose of AI? It is supposed to create. It claims it can produce and create whatever you want But the simple fact is it cannot. All AI can do is rearrange that which already is. It has no soul, no true thought; it is a poor replacement for man. Sure, you can have it produce an image, change a photo, or even compose a song. But it lacks the essential characteristics of humanity. AI may use our images, but it is not the image of man, and certainly not the image of God. It produces only that which already is; it is purely recursive, able only to rearrange images and pictures and code that man has already created. It is the easy way out, it gives the illusion of creation without the work, and with few of the benefits. As we produce less and less, our ability to produce quality and beautiful things diminishes. As we hand over the AI the production of art and music, our own appreciation and joy in it is taken as well.

Lastly, AI is also anti-incarnational. We are created for communion with one another. We are not islands, nor are we robots. We exist with and through our relationships with each other. Not only does AI rob us of our ability to create, but consider how little we interact with one another. As technology advances, more and more barriers are put up between us. I do not submit that all technology is evil, but rather that we should ponder what is better. Should we allow AI to screen and take our calls? Should we allow AI to answer all of our questions? Or should we simply talk to one another, ask our parents and those around us questions, and converse instead of pulling out our phones for everything?

AI, is not the apocalypse, but it does raise some questions. Ones we as Christians should ponder and answer for ourselves and our children, lest the pagan, or worse AI answer them for us.

What is Worship? Pastor Weinkauf

Much can be stated about worship and why we do what we do at Risen Savior. Are all Christian worship forms the same God-pleasing? How do various forms confess the faith and the doctrine the people believe? Does God care about worship? Is the worship gathering a place of like-minded people to utilize their talents and enact a style they find fitting? Is the worship in that place itself God's own creation, called into being by God Himself? HOW you answer those questions has profound implications for determining how worship is conducted and how you confess what worship is!

If for example, sin is merely bad behavior, poor choices, wrong decisions, selfish ambitions, then the Chrisitan worship gathers to be devoted to moral improvements, emotional responses, self-help models and the pastor is seen as a motivational speaker, group therapist, leader of the vision to help people fix their behavior, choices, decisions, priorities to be more godly and so the screens, styles, music is all about improving, helping, fixing -You.

If on the other hand, sin actually means bondage and death, we are addressing things of eternal peril and salvation, if it is a place where God is physically present, then there is nothing informal or irreverent, worship takes on an entirely different character. It is an oasis in a desert of death, it is a hospital for the terminally ill, where people come to receive a medicine of immortality, a medicine of heaven for this dying world. It is where a Great Physician is address our disease.

When we step into Church for public worship each week, we step into the presence of God to give us life. To address our greatest need: forgiveness of sins in Word and Sacraments.

A simple experiment on music, google "most popular contemporary worship" songs in the last year(s). With 90%, who does the 'verbs', who is the focus -Me. Could a Mormon, Muslim, Jew sing it too? Yes! Our hymns would offend the non-Christian -and sometime even the Baptist, Non-denominational, even Roman Catholic. Our music teaches, confesses the faith, the focus on God's work, receiving His gifts, rightly teaching doctrine. And that is the most Christ-centered, scriptural, historical, the most proper worship.


