## Learning the Catechism Pastor Weinkauf

Second only to the Bible, what is the 2<sup>nd</sup> oldest book in continuous publication in the history of the world?... Martin Luther's Small Catechism of 1529. Confirmation classes will soon be underway. Teaching the Catechism should be taking place long before children show up in class. Learning the Catechism doesn't begin and end with Confirmation classes; any more than teaching Bible lessons for young and old is reserved for Sunday School and Bible class.

Jesus said, "Let the little children come to me and do not hinder them, for to such belongs the kingdom of heaven." (Matt. 19, Luke 18, Mark 10) It is primarily in the Divine Service this takes place; also, in the critical need of Sunday School enrichment, and as you teach them God's Word in the home with daily devotions. Use the Congregation Prayer cards, the Catechism, and the hymnal in your home. I would encourage all parents and grandparents to heed our Lord's instruction in this. Teach them. Bring them to learn. Our children are facing an ever-hostile world, schools and media against God's truth. I know you face a daunting task, but you are not alone in this as the Lord is with you and provides all that is needed, into this and by His design and desire for you and your family -provides you Pastors and the Church.

Martin Luther desired the Catechism to be used by the head of the household to teach the family the Christian faith and life; as with the Small Catechism are: Daily Prayers, a Table of Duties for Christians in their various callings in life, and a guide for Christians to use as they prepare to receive Holy Communion. Luther's Small Catechism also comes with an explanation of the Catechism, which is a longer collection of questions and answers with extensive quotations from the Bible.

Luther writes in the Preface to the Small Catechism: "The deplorable, miserable conditions which I recently observed when visiting the parishes have constrained and pressed me to put this Catechism of Christian doctrine into this brief, plain, and simple form. How pitiable, so help me God, were the things I saw: the common man, especially in the villages, knows practically nothing of Christian doctrine, and many of the pastors are almost entirely incompetent and unable to teach. Yet all the people are supposed to be Christians, have been baptized, and receive the Holy Sacrament even though they do not know the Our Father, the Creed, or the Ten Commandments and live like poor animals of the barnyard and pigpen. What these people have mastered, however, is the fine art of tearing all Christian liberty to shreds." Is it much different today?!

The Small Catechism is an excellent summary of what the Bible, God's Word, teaches us. The shape of the Catechism is the shape of the Christian life. God uses the precious truths of His Word to keep us strong and growing in our faith in Jesus Christ. It is genuinely unfortunate when people think they no longer need the Small Catechism and say to themselves, "That's enough of that; now I can move on to more important things."

The Small Catechism is intended to be a prayer book for individuals and families. It is in this way that daily use of the Catechism is a powerful tool for the Christian life. The Small Catechism was designed to be the family's Christian handbook. Families should use the Catechism in their daily devotions. Gradually, over the months and years, the entire family will be able to recite the Catechism from memory and discuss together its meaning. Luther said it well when he quipped, "I will never learn it well enough." Blessings on your family devotions!

#### Much Ado About Everything Pastor Burgdorf

There is so much complaining and fretting among men nowadays over evil conditions prevailing in the world and in their lives, and yet there is but one misfortune that they ought to complain about, and that is – their sin. Sin separates us from God, the Giver of every good gift, and brings down upon us His just punishments. It is sin that makes the night of affliction so dark and our burden so heavy. We often complain that we are so poor in this world's goods, when we ought to complain against our covetous heart that will not be content with the food and raiment God provides. We murmur because we have no brilliant intellectual gifts, when we ought to murmur against the sinful pride living in our hearts. We fret over enemies we may have, over so many hardships and misfortunes that come upon us, when we ought to fret about our stubborn and perverse heart, which will not believe that all these things are sent upon us by the wise, merciful, and omnipotent God.

In short, it is sin, our sin, that we ought to complain about more than the misfortunes and afflictions. Therefore, let us search and try our ways, and turn again to the Lord when assailed by doubt and fear. Let us ever remember that it is the Lord who thus afflicts us because He would purge us from sin, which so easily besets us and would prove our destruction if He did not free us from its evil power. He knows our inmost hearts and sees what sinful desires still lurk in their secret folds, often unknown to ourselves. He therefore casts us into the fiery furnace of affliction that our faith be cleansed from all attaching dross and be found unto praise and honor and glory at the appearing of Jesus Christ.

Why should a living man complain, a man, about the punishment of his sins? Let us test and examine our ways, and return to the Lord! - Lamentations 3:39-40






