You Are a Chosen Race Pastor Weinkauf

St. Peter famously calls the people that gather, that rightly call on the Lord as a household built together, a chosen race, echoing Exodus 19, a kingdom of priests and a holy nation. He describes us rejected by men but in the sight of God chosen and precious. A band of brothers and sisters who call God Father, Jesus Savior and brother, and the Spirit Holy. We are nothing of importance to the world. St. Peter does not stop there, he goes on, calls us: royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for his own possession, that you may proclaim the excellencies of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light. Both Old and New Testament has priests, and because of the gift of God they are a priestly people. By God's design with many references, He sends and places a Priest, a spiritual Father, a Pastor before them to serve them in His stead. We must gather as God's people for this is what He establishes. St. Peter calls us a holy nation, but it is a nation of sinners whose only claim to holiness is the righteousness of our Savior, who clothes us in Himself and work of the Holy Spirit in baptism. He says we are a people for God's own possession, to live in obedience to Him who made us and saved us. Our purpose is not to fulfill our own wills and desires to proclaim the excellencies of Him who called us from the darkness of sin and death into His own light and life.

We are a **chosen race**. This transcends our skin color, our place of birth to a place in His kingdom. St. Paul writes ethnicity has been transcended by a new and different identity -a catholic and universal one. And we see in Revelation of St. John we have different skin colors and ethnos but are united in a greater family now and always as brothers and sisters. Gentiles do not become Jews but both Jew and Gentile become the chosen race/people of God. Jews embrace the fulfillment of all Scripture and Covenants in the Christ, to confess Jesus, the one true God, and no longer live like Jews in the Old Covenant; Gentiles no longer live like pagan Gentiles, but all embrace the one true God, one family, one faith.

The Gospel is still an ethnic Gospel, but it transcends the ethnic divisions of this world. We are adopted into Christ and into the family of Abraham and David, with rights of identity and inheritance.

The chosen nature of Israel's identity was always about Christ, and in Christ and the chosen nature of the Gentile's ethnicity is about Christ, and in Christ as well. We see Israel's history and its lessons as our own just as we are bound together in the new blood of Christ that cleanses us from all our sin and marks us as belonging to Him. This is the mystery long hidden through the ages to Gentiles-- the mystery that has been kept hidden for ages and generations but is now disclosed to the Lord's people. To them God has chosen to make known among the Gentiles the glorious riches of this mystery, which is Christ in you, the hope of glory. Col. 1. And, Now to him who is able to establish you in accordance with my gospel, the message I proclaim about Jesus Christ, in keeping with the revelation of the mystery

hidden for long ages past, but now revealed and made known through the prophetic writings by the command of the eternal God, so that all the Gentiles might come to the obedience that comes from faith—Romans 1:25-26.

By His blood and His passion, He has called you to live according in the season of Easter. To live in His ways and in His truth. To rejoice for He is indeed risen and is coming again.

Let us take note of the changing seasons and let it be a reminder to us of all that is coming. Fall, winter, yes, but more importantly, our Lord who has promised to return and to raise up all the faithful whom He has called into His glorious light.




Oktoberfest will have our usual spread German foods, bounce houses, games for all ages, live German music performed by the Alpen Spieler.


