Incense.....Is It Lutheran?

Before we delve into the question of whether use of incense is Lutheran, let us first explore what incense is, what history it has, how it is represented both in the Old Testament and New Testament and what meaning it can have in our worship today.

Incense is a wood or resin, which when burned gives off a sweet fragrance or aroma. It has both a sacramental and sacrificial symbolism in its use in religious rites and as an external in Christian Worship

Sacramentally, it symbolizes the mystery of God's coming to us, as in a cloud of glory like that which led the Israelites in the wilderness (Exodus 12:21) and filled the tabernacle with sacrifices of praise and thanksgiving (Exodus 40:34) and ultimately in the glory of our Lord's becoming flesh (John 1:4)

Sacrificially, incense is a symbol of prayer. “Let my prayer be accepted as sweet-smelling incense in your presence. Let the lifting up of my hands in prayer be accepted as an evening sacrifice” (Psalm 141:2) in (Rev. 8:3,4) “Another angel came with a gold incense burner and stood at the altar. He was given much incense to offer on the gold altar in front of the throne. He offered it with the prayers of all God’s people. The smoke from the incense went up from the angel’s hand to God along with the prayers of Gods’ people.”

One service in which incense may be used is the Festival of Epiphany. Next to Easter, Epiphany is the oldest in the Church. Its name that comes from the Greek word for “manifestation and its theme is light.

The service form for Epiphany is Evening Prayer. The congregation has lighted candles that illuminate the church. The hymn “Joyous Light of Glory” is sung while the Sanctuary lights are lit.

The Scripture readings for this festival.....

- Recall God’s promises that people sitting in darkness would see a great light. (Isaiah 9:22, 60:(1-9)
- Jesus is the light of the world. (John 1:5, 8:12, 9:5)
- Frankincense, a uniquely sensuous substance, was a gift brought by the Magi to the Christ Child (Matthew 2:11)

The congregation sings the antiphon portion of the Psalmody – “Let my prayer rise before You as incense, the lifting up of my hands as the evening sacrifice”- then the altar may be censured. The censuring of the altar concludes as the minister offers a prayer that recalls the meaning of incense as a biblical symbol for Christian prayer.

The Gospel is read, a commentary on an Epiphany text is given prior to the singing of the canticle which is the Magnificat. The Litany follows emphasizing the Word for the world.

The Altar Guild will need to have the vessels ready for this service:

- Thurible: A vessel with a perforated cover for burning incense. A piece of charcoal is ignited and placed in the thurible and over it grains of incense are sprinkled. The thurible is then swung to disperse the smoke.
- Thurifer: The server who carries the thurible.
- Incense Boat: A small bowl or dish, usually footed, which holds the incense ready to be put in the thurible.
- Incense Spoon: A spoon which is used to transfer the incense from the incense boat to the thurible.

One of the fears in the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod retains is the fear of being too “Catholic”, We may fear that we are not correct, even when we know we are. We did not leave the Catholic church, we reformed it. The use of incense to help us attain a reverent and awe-filled attitude in the presence of the Living God is a blessing. The use of incense in worship services is in the category of those things that God neither commands or forbids.

The roots of incense are Biblical.....therefore.....Lutheran!
