

German Leaving Certificate Exam: Listening comprehension

Overview

The listening comprehension section is worth **20% of your total grade** and takes place immediately after the written portion of the exam. It's often considered one of the more manageable sections because it's straightforward and most questions require answers in English.

- Sections 1, 3, and 4 are answered in English.
- Section 2 must be answered in German (higher level).

Why Practice Is Key

To excel in the listening comprehension:

- Practice regularly by completing **one listening comprehension per week** in the lead-up to the exam.
- Pay attention to accents and speeds. German listening exams sometimes feature regional accents or fast-paced speech, so becoming familiar with different speakers is crucial.

Building Vocabulary for Success

A strong vocabulary will significantly boost your confidence and performance:

- Keep a **vocabulary notebook** for words or phrases you don't understand during practice sessions. Look up their meanings and learn them.
- Focus on common topics like:
 - Professions (e.g., Lehrer/in teacher, Arzt/Ärztin doctor).
 - Place names (e.g., Bahnhof train station, Krankenhaus hospital).
 - **Problems and emergencies** (e.g., Unfall accident, Krankheit illness).
 - Weather vocabulary (e.g., sonnig sunny, Regen rain), as the weather question in Section 4 is almost guaranteed.

Understanding the Format

1. Section 1: Conversations or Dialogues

- These are typically short exchanges between two people.
- o Listen for specific details, such as times, locations, or preferences.
- Answers are in **English**.

2. Section 2: Longer Monologues (Answered in German)

- The only section where answers must be written in German (higher level).
- Practice rephrasing information from the audio rather than copying directly to avoid losing marks.
- Pay attention to question terms like Wer? (Who?), Was? (What?), Wo?
 (Where?), and Wann? (When?).

3. Section 3: Advertisements or Announcements

- These are typically practical, like event details, sales, or travel announcements.
- Answers are in **English**.

4. Section 4: News Reports

- This is the most heavily weighted section, and includes weather updates, which are almost guaranteed.
- The other topics can vary but often involve major events, accidents, or global issues.
- Answers are in **English**, but the content requires attention to detail.

Strategies for Each Section

- **Read the questions first**: Quickly skim the questions before the audio begins. This primes you to listen for specific details.
- Pay attention to numbers and dates: These often appear in dialogues and announcements.

How to Approach Section 2 (German Answers)

- **Focus on grammar and spelling**: Answers must be written correctly in German. Double-check verb conjugations and noun genders.
- **Be specific**: Include as much detail as possible. If a question is worth multiple marks, ensure your answer has enough information to match the marks available.
- **Practice paraphrasing**: Instead of copying directly from the audio, learn to summarize in your own words.

Expanding on Your Points

Many questions ask you to "give details" or provide multiple pieces of information.

- Pay attention to the marking scheme:
 - If a question is worth **3x2 marks**, you'll need **three specific points**.
 - o If it's 4x1 marks, provide four brief but accurate details.

 Avoid writing vague answers, as they can lose marks. Practice answering questions with precise and detailed responses during your preparation.

What to Do If You're Stuck

- **Don't leave blanks**: If you don't understand a word or section, make an educated guess based on the context of the question.
- **Use context clues**: Sometimes other parts of the exam (e.g., the reading comprehension or earlier listening questions) can give you hints about an answer.

The News Section (Section 4)

This is a critical part of the exam where many marks are available.

- Weather updates: Revise common weather terms and phrases as this question is almost guaranteed.
- News topics: Stay up to date with current events in Germany, Austria, and Switzerland by watching German news clips or reading short articles. Websites like Tagesschau are great for practice.
- **Names and places**: Be ready to identify proper nouns in the audio. They often provide clues to the answers.

General Exam Tips

- **Stay calm**: Nerves can make you lose focus. Take a deep breath before each section and remind yourself that you've prepared.
- **Don't panic if you miss something**: You'll hear the audio **three times**, and there are breaks in between to write your answers. Use this time wisely.
- **Keep moving forward**: If you go blank, move on to the next question and return to the tricky one later. Sometimes hearing other sections can jog your memory.

Final Preparation Steps

- Practice with real exam audio to get used to the pacing and structure.
- Build your vocabulary, especially around common themes like professions, travel, weather, and numbers.
- Use past papers to identify patterns in the types of questions asked.
- Familiarize yourself with the marking schemes to understand how to structure your answers.
