COMUNIDAD DE PAZ REFUGEE CENTER

Narrative

There are currently over six million Venezuelan refugees displaced from their homes due to economic hardship and political dissension. Today, of these six million, over 1.8 million are seeking asylum in neighboring Columbia. Many Venezuelans journey to Columbia due to accessibility while seeking opportunities. On February 8, 2021, Columbian President Iván Duque granted Venezuelan migrants temporary legal status for 10 years, at which point they can apply for residency. Because many migrants lack resources, there are people of all ages, including children and the elderly, who are forced into the grueling journey of crossing the Columbian border on foot.

A family composed of two adults, three young children, and one elderly woman is attempting to travel from Caracas, Venezuela to Bogota, Columbia. Along their tiring on-foot journey, it is essential they find a **safe space** to rest and recuperate before returning to their demanding travel. Fleeing political hardship and seeking economic opportunity, this family has struggled with poverty, homesickness, fatigue, and much more. By resting for as long as needed at a shelter between the two locations, this family will have a much safer and more comfortable passage ahead.

Location

Placed south of the Columbian border and north of Bogota, Communidad De Paz will be a sanctuary for refugees traveling from Venezuela to Columbia.





Design Concept Statement

This refugee center provides a **secure environment** for a large family during their on-foot travel across the Venezuelan-Columbian border. Placed south of the Columbian border and north of Bogota, Columbia's safe haven, this destination offers a comfortable resting stop for families to recover from the harsh demands of travel. With an inclusive, friendly, and welcoming design, this space accommodates people of all ages and abilities. By incorporating dynamic construction and a **flexible interior**, this interior design offers options for families to build a unique home to best fit their comfortability and needs.





The refugees will be provided with community restrooms, showers, kitchens, and water stations. There are public gardens located around the refugee center along with solar panels to source sustainable electricity.


