

The Smithsonian National Museum of African American History and Culture celebrated its first anniversary in September 2017. Located on the National Mall in Washington, D.C., the

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Updates for the Parker Sydnor Historic Site Full Steam Ahead with the Strategic Plan

Victor Vines, AIA, President + Principal and Jeff Schroeder, AIA, architects with Vines Architecture of Raleigh, North Carolina met with board members of Literacy InterActives, Inc. (LIA) at the 2016 annual board meeting that was held in Clarksville, Virginia. The Board's consultation with Mr. Vines is an outcome of two phases of the strategic plan for the rehabilitation and preservation of the Parker Sydnor historic site. Initially, the architectural design master plan for the historic site was conducted by the Virginia Tech Community Design Assistance Center (CDAC). CDAC completed the architectural master plan through civic engagement and ongoing

everything, good-natured talking and quiet celebration, I witnessed Mr. Bunch's suggestion of reconciliation and appreciation in this extraordinary place.



One of the featured artifacts, beside Harriet Tubman's shawl and Nat Turner's Bible, is a weatherboard clad cabin that

once housed enslaved African Americans. The slave cabin dates from the early 1800s and has many stories—some will remain hidden and some will be told, like the LIA sponsored Parker Sydnor historic log cabin project located in Mecklenburg County, Virginia.

The Patrick Robert "Parker" Sydnor log cabin is another representation of the history of African American families throughout the South. Parker Sydnor (1854-1950) was born in Halifax County and owned land and farmed in southern Virginia. The Sydnor log cabin was originally located within one of the outlying slave quarters of Prestwould, the Skipwith family antebellum plantation. After Reconstruction, Virginia had the highest percentage of freed or First Generation African Americans who bought land and established new home places.

The Sydnor log cabin site is listed on the National Register

of Historic Places and the Virginia Landmarks Register; and the site has a distinguished Virginia historical highway marker. Aside from being a farmer, Parker Sydnor was one of Virginia's few literate African American tombstone makers from that era. While Sydnor attended a local Freedmen's Bureau School after

Emancipation, later African American generations were enabled to attend Rosenwald schools. What was a Rosenwald School?

The famous educator Booker T. Washington (1856-1915) and Julius Rosenwald (1862-1932), philanthropist and president of Sears Roebuck, built state-of-the art schools for

African American children across the South from 1917 to 1932. The effort has been called the most important initiative to advance education for African Americans in the early 20th century.

More than 5,000 Rosenwald schools were built, with 31 in Mecklenburg and Halifax Counties, adding to a total of 367 in Virginia. The National Trust for Historic Preservation estimates that 10-12 percent of those built in the entire South remain standing today. When the 1954 Supreme Court ruling declared segregation in education unconstitutional, Rosenwald Schools became obsolete. Now, communities throughout the South are rehabilitating standing, but very old Rosenwald buildings as a tribute to education.

The National Museum of African American History and Culture, the Parker Sydnor initiative, and the Rosenwald Schools all have remarkable African American histories, a strong identity with the impact of literacy and education, and the integrity of inclusive commemoration.
