SYNOPSIS

Temporarily waives certain basic life support services crewmember requirements.

1 AN ACT concerning basic life support services. 2 3 BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State 4 of New Jersey: 5 6 1. a. As used in this section: ¹"ACLS certification" means valid certification in Advanced 7 8 Cardiac Life Support as issued by the American Heart Association. 9 "Advanced life support" means an advanced level of pre-hospital, 10 inter-hospital, and emergency service care which includes basic life support functions, cardiac monitoring, cardiac defibrillation, 11 12 telemetered electrocardiography, administration of anti-arrhythmic 13 agents, intravenous therapy, administration of specific medications, 14 drugs and solutions, use of adjunctive ventilation devices, trauma care 15 and other techniques and procedures authorized in writing by the Commissioner of Health.¹ 16 17 "Basic life support" means a basic level of pre-hospital care which 18 includes patient stabilization, airway clearance, cardiopulmonary 19 resuscitation, hemorrhage control, initial wound care and fracture 20 stabilization, and other techniques and procedures authorized by the 21 Commissioner of Health. 22 ¹"Emergency medical technician-paramedic" means a person 23 trained in advanced life support services and certified by the 24 Commissioner of Health to render advanced life support services as part of a mobile intensive care unit.¹ 25 26 "First responder" means a police officer, firefighter, or other 27 person who has been trained to provide emergency medical first 28 response services in a program recognized by the Commissioner of 29 Health. 30 ¹"ITLS certification" means valid certification in International Trauma Life Support as issued by the American College of Emergency 31 32 Physicians. 33 "Mobile intensive care nurse" means a registered nurse who: has 34 completed at least one year of full-time nursing care performing 35 advanced clinical skills in the critical care unit or emergency 36 department of an acute care hospital; possesses Emergency Medical 37 Technician-Basic, cardiopulmonary resuscitation, and ACLS 38 certifications; possesses PALS or Pediatric Education for Prehospital 39 Professionals-Advanced certification or has successfully completed the 40 Emergency Nurse Pediatric Course to the standards of the Emergency Nurses Association; possesses either PHTLS or ITLS certification; has 41 42 successfully completed at least a mobile intensive care unit field 43 internship consisting of at least 100 hours, has successfully intubated 44 at least five patients and has demonstrated proficiency in pre-hospital

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1 advanced life support treatment to the satisfaction of the nurse's 2 mobile intensive care program's medical director; is physically capable 3 of performing the duties of a mobile intensive care nurse; and is 4 endorsed by the medical director of a mobile intensive care program. "Mobile intensive care unit" means a specialized emergency 5 6 medical service vehicle operated for the provision of advanced life 7 support services under the direction of an authorized hospital. 8 "PALS certification" means valid certification in Pediatric 9 Advanced Life Support as issued by the American Heart Association. "PHTLS certification" means valid certification in Pre-Hospital 10 Trauma Life Support as issued by the National Association of EMTs. 11 12 "Specialty care transport nurse" means a registered nurse who has: completed at least one year of full time nursing care performing 13 14 advanced clinical skills in an acute care hospital's critical care unit or 15 emergency department and possesses valid certification as either a 16 critical care registered nurse or a certified emergency nurse; holds 17 certifications in CPR and ACLS; holds certification in PALS or has 18 successfully completed the Emergency Nurse Pediatric Course to the 19 standards of the Emergency Nurses Association; has additional 20 training in endotrachael intubation and has been deemed competent by 21 the medical director; and has documented completion of competencies 22 for advanced life support equipment, including, but not limited to, 23 cardiac monitor/defibrillator, external pacemaker, IV pump, ventilator, 24 intra-aortic balloon pump, specialized respirators, and incubators. 25 "Specialty care transport unit" means a specialized transport 26 medical service vehicle that is validly licensed by the department and 27 operated in accordance with rules and regulations promulgated by the department.1 28 b. $\frac{1}{(1)}$ ¹ Until January 1, 2023, ¹[each] <u>a</u>¹ basic life support 29 30 services vehicle ¹other than a basic life support services vehicle described in subsection d. of this section¹, when in service, shall be 31 staffed by a minimum of two emergency medical technicians or by a 32 33 minimum of one emergency medical technician and one first 34 responder. Any individual staffing a basic life support vehicle ¹as provided in this paragraph¹ shall be authorized to render care within 35 that individual's scope of practice. In the case of a vehicle staffed by 36 37 ¹[a]¹ one emergency medical technician and one first responder, the 38 emergency medical technician shall be present in the patient 39 compartment of the vehicle at all times when a patient is present in the 40 vehicle. 41 ¹(2) Until January 1, 2023, a mobile intensive care unit, when in 42 service, shall be staffed by a minimum of two persons, which two 43 persons may be two emergency medical technician-paramedics, two 44 mobile intensive care nurses, one emergency medical technician-45 paramedic and one mobile intensive care nurse, or one emergency 46 medical technician and one emergency medical technician-paramedic 47 or mobile intensive care nurse. Any individual staffing a mobile

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1 intensive care unit as provided in this paragraph shall be authorized to 2 render care within that individual's scope of practice. In the case of a 3 mobile intensive care unit staffed by one emergency medical 4 technician and one emergency medical technician-paramedic or 5 mobile intensive care nurse, the emergency medical technician-6 paramedic or mobile intensive care nurse shall provide primary patient 7 care. 8 (3) Until January 1, 2023, a specialty care transport unit, when in 9 service, shall be staffed by a minimum of one specialty care transport 10 nurse and one emergency medical technician. Any individual staffing 11 a specialty care transport unit as provided in this paragraph shall be 12 authorized to render care within that individual's scope of practice. The specialty care transport nurse shall provide primary patient care.¹ 13 c. Each individual staffing a basic life support vehicle ¹, a mobile 14 intensive care unit, or a specialty care transport unit¹ pursuant to 15 ¹<u>subsection b. of</u>¹ this section shall be at least 18 years of age. In 16 addition, a first responder staffing a basic life support vehicle 17 ¹pursuant to paragraph (1) of subsection b. of this section¹ shall: 18 (1) be certified to administer cardio-pulmonary resuscitation; 19 20 (2) be able to operate a basic life support vehicle; and 21 (3) ¹[possess a certification from the National Safety Council, 22 National Registry of Emergency Medical Technicians, American Red 23 Cross, Emergency Care and Safety Institute, the American Health and 24 Safety Institute, or an equivalent certification] have completed a 25 training program that has been approved by the basic life support 26 agency medical director and that includes, at a minimum: safe vehicle 27 operations; patient lifting and moving; safe use of patient restraints; 28 basic first aid; and documentation¹. 29 ¹d. The provisions of subsection b. of this section shall not apply to a basic life support vehicle dispatched in response to a 9-1-1 30 emergency call, which vehicles, when in service, shall be staffed by a 31 32 minimum of two emergency medical technicians. 33 e. Nothing in this section shall be construed to: 34 (1) revise the requirements for certification, or to practice, as an 35 emergency medical technician, an emergency medical technician-36 paramedic, a mobile intensive care nurse, or a specialty care transport 37 nurse in New Jersey; 38 (2) revise the scope of practice authorized for emergency medical 39 technicians, emergency medical technician-paramedics, mobile 40 intensive care nurses, or specialty care transport nurses in New Jersey; 41 or 42 (3) revise the standards or requirements for equipment for basic 43 life support vehicles, mobile intensive care units, or specialty care 44 transport units.¹ 45 2. This act shall take effect immediately. 46
