For as long as he can remember, Leighton Mackey wanted to be a firefighter. That dream took root early, as he grew up around the local volunteer fire department where both his parents served. By age 12, he was already attending training nights with them, staying behind afterward to help refill the trucks—small tasks that stoked a big ambition. His first real call came at 14, when a series of major fires swept through the county. With crews spread thin, Leighton was asked to assist in landing a medical helicopter, an experience that deepened his resolve to pursue the fire service.

At 15, he formally joined the department as a junior member, committing to weekly Wednesday morning training sessions and gradually taking on more responsibility. Over the next two years, he gained hands-on experience and a deep respect for the work of first responders. When he turned 18, Leighton transitioned to full firefighter status, responding to calls alongside seasoned team members. At 20, his dedication was recognized with a full-ride scholarship from the department to attend the prestigious TEEX A&M Fire Academy.

Today, Leighton continues to chase the dream he's had since childhood. With the fire academy

now behind him, he is working toward earning his EMT certification—a key milestone on the path to becoming a professional firefighter. What began as a childhood aspiration has become a lifelong calling, fueled by training, experience, and a steadfast commitment to serving his community.

FIRE INCIDENTS

A CLOSE CALL by J. "Griff" Griffin

On the afternoon of Monday April 21st, 2025, two (2) Ladies were travelling westbound on State Highway 164 when another motorist flagged them down to stop. The Ladies were driving in a Class C motorhome with a towed vehicle behind it. The engine compartment of the towed vehicle had thick, dark smoke and flames coming from under the hood. Once pulled over one of the ladies got the fire extinguisher from the RV, thinking to control or limit any spread of fire. The heat and flames proved to be too much to get



close to, and once the vehicles were stopped on the side of the roadway, the winds pushed the flames, heat and smoke towards the rear of the RV, transitioning from the towed vehicle to the RV catching on fire.

Passerby's had stopped to try to help and ensure the safety of the driver and passenger, calling 911 to report the situation. Multiple fire departments were dispatched as Limestone County Sheriff's and Texas Highway Patrol shut down traffic in both directions. Fire apparatus came from Groesbeck VFD, East Lake Limestone VFD, and West Lake Limestone VFD. Additional responders travelling in the personal vehicles arrived on the scene to assist with resource management, communications, establish traffic control and medical personnel to evaluate the Ladies and Fire Fighters involved in extinguishing the vehicles.

The RV and towed vehicle were both completely destroyed by the fire, which also scorched and damaged the roadway, and partially spread into the ditch and nearby pasture area. All fires were



extinguished and overhauled, preparing the burned carcasses for clearing from the roadway. Traffic was able to start moving in the South side highway lane, coordinated by responders with hand signs, safety vests and radio communications. Texas Towing provided 3 recovery units to help clear the scene, consisting of 2 rollback towing platforms and a trailer with a skid-steer and additional recovery gear.

While no one was injured, either the occupants or responders, the potential for further incident was high - environmental temperatures and humidity was into the 90's, visibility was

obscured by smoke, fire spread to the nearby pasture, and the vehicles had fuel tanks of both gasoline and propane. Once the overhaul and site cleanup was conducted the Texas Highway Department was called in by the Texas Department of Safety to assess the road damage for future repairs.

The entirety of the event lasted approximately 3.5 hours, involving 4 different Fire Departments and 6 Fire trucks, 3 Law Enforcement units, 3 Towing units and a total of 21 Responders.
