The financial health of our church continued to be healthy at midyear with a positive balance of \$11, 670, this while forwarding just shy of half or our required appointments to the conference. We have maintained this positive balance while maintaining our facilities and forwarding 47% of our Connectional Apportionment obligation monies to the WPAUM Conference.

The financial health of our church is stable but will be challenged as we go into the second half of the year. The addition of staff to bolster our commitment to our youth and young families will stretch us, but we believe that this is the right time to bolster this ministry as our church grows.



IFF: Men's Book Club "Early Risers"

We have completed discussion of the challenging Karen Armstrong book entitled <u>A History of God</u>. This book proved to educate many of us as to the similarities, social and cultural impacts, and religious perspectives of the world's three major monotheistic religions: Christianity, Judaism, and Islam. I know I am a more reflective reader of scripture a result of this encounter with Armstrong's writing.

We started a new book on August 9, <u>Preparing for War</u>, by Bradley Onishi, a religious scholar who teaches at the University of San Francisco. This book is considered a "riveting history of White Christian Nationalism that led to the January 6 insurrection". The author begins by tracing his own journey into conservative evangelical Christianity, and his eventual move away from those beliefs, asking, had he remained, "would I have been there?" Exploring Christian Nationalist issues connected to civil rights, the women's' movement, and LGBTQ+, among other political topics, Onishi introduces ideas worthy of great discussion (which is what this group thrives on).




Intentional Faith Formation Team (IFF)

The Intentional Faith and Formation Team has been busy over the summer! Watch for various articles throughout this newsletter for other articles that are under the IFF team's umbrella. (Pizza and Wings with the Pastor, Director of Family and Youth Ministries hired, Rev. Scott, all Sunday Schools, etc.)

Adult Sunday School: We just finished Josh Scott's new book entitled Bible Stories for Grownups: Reading Scripture With New Eyes which looks at key figures and familiar biblical stories from an adult perspective. Reverend Scott joined us on zoom on Sunday August 27 for an interesting discussion on his study.

Our next book is by Adam Hamilton entitled *Luke: Jesus and the Outsiders, Outcasts, and Outlaws* which we will begin in early September. "Jesus came to lift up the lowly. Throughout his ministry to his final days on the road to the cross, we find stories of his relationships with ordinary, flawed, and unexpected people. He met, dined, and traveled with people who were not perfect. Many of them were struggling, some were outsiders or even outlaws. Whoever they were, from those he healed to the outlaws with him at his crucifixion, Jesus brought the good news of God's kingdom to those who most needed to hear it.



In *Luke: Jesus and the Outsiders, Outcasts, and Outlaws*, pastor and bestselling author Adam Hamilton explores the life, teachings, death, and resurrection of

Jesus as told in the Gospel of Luke. Through Luke's stories we find Jesus' care and compassion for all as he welcomes sinners and outcasts. As we study Luke and see Jesus' concern for those who were considered unimportant, we hear a hopeful and inspiring word for our lives today. Jesus came to lift up the low-ly. Throughout his ministry to his final days on the road to the cross, we find stories of his relationships with ordinary, flawed, and unexpected people. He met, dined, and traveled with people who were not perfect. Many of them were struggling, some were outsiders or even outlaws. Disciple III Bible Study: Wednesday night Disciple III took a brief hiatus during summer but will resume in September to complete the last six chapters of Disciple IIII which focuses on the letters of Paul We will pick up where we left off (Chapter 26 of the workbook) on Wednesday, September 27 (so you get to enjoy summer for an extra month!). Disciple Advanced Bible Study: The Monday Night Disciple Group just finished the engrossing and challenging book, <u>The Short Stories by Jesus: The Enigmatic Parables of a Controversial Rabbi</u>, by Amy-Jill Levine. She brought the Jewish perspective and insight about the parables and how they were stories that provoked discussion and thought by the Jews of Jesus's day. We will be on hiatus until September when we will pick up a new book, "John" by Adam Hamilton.






Missions—Diaper Fund



Old Testament Survey Through Different Lenses

Taught by Dr. Jerra Jenrette

Dr. Jenrette will offer an introductory study of the Old Testament (Hebrew Bible/TANAKH), a six-week course which will look at key stories in the religious life of the ancient Hebrews up through the Second Temple Period (which Christians refer to as the Intertestamental Period).

Using not only "Invitation to the Old Testament" as the primary text, by Celia Brewer Marshall and James Tabor, the study will also rely on analysis and interpretation from Rabbi Evan Moffic, "Reading the Old Testament Through Jewish Eyes", Dr. Amy-Jill Levine's "Short Course on the Old Testament" (Great Courses), and the Jewish Study Bible, amongst other resources.

The intent is to not only read as 21st century Christians but to become familiar with Jewish perspectives from a range of sources.


IFF—Women's Book Club



Archbishop Desmond Tutu, Nobel Peace Prize winner, Chair of The Elders, and Chair of South Africa's Truth and Reconciliation Commission, along with his daughter, the Reverend Mpho Tutu, offer a manual on the art of forgiveness-helping us to realize that we are all capable of healing and transformation.
Tutu's role as the Chair of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission taught him much about forgiveness. If you asked anyone what they thought was going to happen to South Africa after apartheid, almost universally it was predicted that the country would be devastated by a comprehensive bloodbath. Yet, instead of revenge and retribution, this new nation chose to tread the difficult path of confession, forgiveness, and reconciliation.

Each of us has a deep need to forgive and to be forgiven. After much reflection on the process of forgiveness, Tutu has seen that there are four important steps to healing: Admitting the wrong and acknowledging the harm; Telling one's story and witnessing the anguish; Asking for forgiveness and granting forgiveness; and renewing or releasing the relationship. Forgiveness is hard work. Sometimes it even feels like an impossible task. But it is only through walking this fourfold path that Tutu says we can free ourselves of the endless and unyielding cycle of pain and retribution. The Book of Forgiving is both a touchstone and a tool, offering Tutu's wise advice and showing the way to experience forgiveness. Ultimately, forgiving is the only means we have to heal ourselves and our aching world.
