
Ann Weems writes in her book Kneeling in Jerusalem,

IFF: Men's Book Club "Early Risers"





We are currently reading Megan Watterson's Mary Magdalene Revealed: The First Apostle, Her Feminist Gospel & the Christianity We Haven't Tried Yet. Since our group is composed of doubters, dreamers and disciples, we have had some interesting discussions under the direction of Marian Beckman. Currently, we are reading the third power, ignorance. We anticipate being finished by the end of May.



Our next choice will be <u>Wait, What? And Life's Other Essential Questions</u> based on the commencement address, the art of asking and answering good questions by James E. Ryan, dean of Harvard's Graduate School of Education. Here is the description from the Amazon summary. Whether we're in the boardroom or the classroom, we spend far too much time and energy looking for the right answer. But the truth is that questions are just as important as answers, often more so. If you ask the wrong question, for instance, you're guaranteed to get the wrong answer. A good question, on the other hand, inspires a good answer and, in the process, invites deeper understanding and more meaningful connections between people. Asking a good question requires us to move beyond what we think we



know about an issue or a person to explore the difficult and the unknown, the awkward, and even the unpleasant. In Wait, What?, Jim Ryan celebrates the art of asking—and answering—good questions. Five questions in particular: Wait, what?; I wonder...? Couldn't we at least...?; How can I help?; and What truly matters? Using examples from politics, history, popular culture, and social movements, as well as his own personal life, Ryan demonstrates how these essential inquiries generate understanding, spark curiosity, initiate progress, fortify relationships, and draw our attention to the important things in life—from the Supreme Court to Fenway Park. By regularly asking these

five essential questions, Ryan promises, we will be better able to answer life's most important question: "And did you get what you wanted out of life, even so?" At once hilarious and illuminating, poignant and surprising, Wait, What? is an inspiring book of wisdom that will forever change the way you think about questions. This book has been on our "to read" list for several years, and we are excited to finally read it. We have such varied interests in the group that we are always adding to our list of books we would like to read be able to discuss with this group. We enjoy each other's company and insights and with certainly welcome anyone would like to join us. 
By embracing grace, we will engage our heads, hearts, and hands in the way of Christ to ignite a profound love of God in all.

Council members were asked to consider the following questions pertaining to our current vision statement:

Given our mission, what are we ultimately supposed to be doing? Why do we do what we do?

How do we do what we do?

In response to the first question, members felt that we should offer to love anyone who comes through our front door, and follow-up with those who are or have been missing from our community. The remaining discussion focused on the third question — How we do what we do? As the ministry and administrative teams generally report their activities to Church Council, our current actions demonstrate that we love those who are here and welcome all. Many believe this is "the how" of fulfilling our purpose.



During our May meeting, we will continue focusing on the *vision statement*, ensuring that it is still relevant and reflects our purpose and aspirations.

TRUSTEES REPORT

Your EUMC trustees for 2024 include the following members: Erinn Lake-Brozewicz, Pat Crist, Diana Corner, Tim Elder, Rob Green, John Snow, Greg Thomas, Joe Tuminello and Dean Woods. We are very fortunate to have this group of people as trustees. They have varied backgrounds and areas of expertise and are always trying to do what is best for the church and responsibly use congregational monies. As we have said before, we have a major investment in our church building and parsonage, and we take seriously the maintenance of those properties.

In March, we were notified by the Edinboro Borough that they were offering competitive matching fund grants to property owners are certain streets. There was a maximum grant of \$5000 and had to be used on the outside of the building and viewed from High Street. Of course, we considered the sidewalk parallel to High Street, but were informed that was being handled by the borough under separate funding. After analyzing our needs, and looking at the view from High Street, the trustees decided that we would replace the facia board that goes along the front of the building which is starting to disintegrate. We would also like to install lighting at the end of the parking lot so that the driveway entrance is more visible at night, and that we would repair as much sidewalk as we could. We also considered putting in some plantings along the south side of the driveway, where the large trees were removed several years ago. All of this is certainly more than the total of \$10,000 (\$5000 grant and \$5000 match). We ultimately submitted two slightly different grants and are currently waiting to hear the outcome of our proposals.

April on the trustees calendar was the time for indoor cleanup. John Snow with the help of Patti has agreed to be our Closet Trustee. He is checking all the closets and storage areas and is getting things ready for disposal or recycling.

May will be our outdoor clean up time, although with the nice weather we had in February, Aaron Glass, our landscaper, did get a head start on that. You may have noticed some of the tiles have water stains on them. We have been in contact with our roofing contractor, Ryan McCreary of McCreary Roofing, and we are currently addressing those problem areas. Flat roofs in northwestern Pennsylvania are always an ongoing issue. Thank you for your continued support.

Update on the Edinboro Borough Grant

On April 29, we were notified by the Edinboro Borough that we would be receiving a grant for \$4,290.76 to enhance our EUMC property facing High Street. The Grant will provide plantings on the south side of the driveway where the large trees were taken down several years ago. Julie Marchese of Scotland Yard will be providing the plantings and our own Aaron Glass will be actually planting and working that bed. We will also have lighting at the end of the driveway and along the soffit to the right of the front entry doors. Dean Woods will be the contractor for that part of the project. And the final portion to be done will be the replacement of the facia board along the front of the church. Ryan McCreary of McCreary Roofing will be completing that for us. These are all people who have helped us in previous times with previous projects and we are delighted to be working with them again.
