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## On the Issues: Healthcare

Healthcare issues, especially those related to cost of and access to care, are an important top-of-mind policy area for many American voters. Yet, a new poll from West Health and Gallup shows that a majority of Americans say healthcare is not receiving enough attention in the 2024 presidential campaign so far. So where do the candidates stand on healthcare? Operation Wildfire took a look.

In effect, it made participating Medicare Part D programs limit the price of just one of each type of insulin product to \$35. These price changes did not go into effect during Trump's presidency.  Replace the Affordable Care Act if a better plan is devised, but would "run it as good as it can be run" until then. To-date, Trump has not provided a detailed plan on what he would implement in its place.  Opposes premium subsidies that Harris wants to make permanent, telling the Washington Post that they "benefit big insurance companies and
