## Things to Do at Pemaquid

- 1. Pemaquid Point Lighthouse Park: 3115 Bristol Rd. New Harbor, ME 04554. Entrance fee up to \$4.00. This iconic lighthouse, located at the tip of the peninsula, offers stunning views. Don't miss the opportunity to explore the keeper's house and the Fisherman's Museum inside. From: Pemaquid Point Lighthouse Park | Bristol ME
- 2. Explore Colonial Pemaquid's Fort William Henry: Discover the rich history of this site, which dates back over a thousand years. The stone fort, partially reconstructed, provides panoramic harbor views. Before Fort William Henry was built in 1692, the Pemaquid settlement and a previous fort, Fort Charles, had been captured by the French and their Indian allies, driving the English to abandon much of the nearby coastal area. By 1691, the English regained authority over the region and built Fort William Henry. - 6. Hendricks Hill Museum: The purpose of the Museum is to preserve items relating to life on Southport Island in the period from 1800 to 1950. Hendricks Hill Museum, 419 Hendricks Hill Rd, Southport, ME 04576 is open Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday throughout the months of July and August from 11 AM 3 PM. Built by John Cameron circa 1810,. They were a family of fishermen. One year their vessels flew the "high line", signifying that they had taken more fish than any other Southport family. There is no admission fee, but donations are gratefully accepted either at the Museum or through P.O. Box 3, Southport, ME 04576.
