Berlin Expands Efforts to Improve Accessibility for All Residents

Accessibility remains a top priority for the Town of Berlin as local officials continue working to remove barriers and comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). Since receiving an initial \$8,000 state grant in 2023, the town has successfully implemented critical updates to improve public facilities, including modifications to door hardware, coat hooks, hallways, and automatic door openers at municipal buildings.

Now, Berlin is requesting additional funding for new accessibility projects, ensuring that residents of all abilities can move freely through public spaces. Among the town's latest grant requests are ADA-compliant voting booths, which will provide an accessible way for wheelchair users to cast their ballots with ease.

Public spaces, such as the town library, are also undergoing improvements. Officials have requested funding to pave a path to the back patio and install an ADA-compliant picnic table, making outdoor seating more accessible to those using mobility aids. Additionally, the library's heavy front door has been identified as an obstacle for individuals using crutches or wheelchairs. A grant has been submitted to install an automatic door opener, making entry simpler for all visitors. The 1870 Town Hall is also set to receive critical upgrades. Officials plan to install stair railings for the small staircases leading to the stage, improving safety and stability for all residents.

Berlin submitted its grant requests earlier in June, but funding decisions won't be announced until this fall. Local leaders remain hopeful that these accessibility improvements will help Berlin fully comply with ADA Titles I and II, ensuring equal access to municipal programs and services.

Making towns ADA-compliant isn't just about following regulations—it's about ensuring that all residents can participate fully in their community. By investing in accessibility, Berlin is taking meaningful steps to create an inclusive, welcoming environment for everyone.

- Call volume continues to remain elevated for the Fire & EMS Department. We are currently 25% ahead in call volume for the same period of time as last year. With the increase in call volume, as would be expected, we are seeing an increase in the number of times we have multiple calls at the same time. Crews are handling these as we also combat staffing shortages.
- Training has been active for the last 2 months with crews completing training
 on water supply operations, ASHER training, mass casualty responses, and
 helicopter landing zone operations. Crews conducted a scenario-based
 training utilizing LifeFlight out of UMass Hospital and also completed our
 annual tanker drill operations. This tanker drill had us delivering 60,000 gallons
 of water in an hour period of time to demonstrate our water supply capabilities.
- Lt Paulino completed 40+ hours of confined space training operations in June and 40+ hours of rope rescue training in May. This completes his training for Rescue Technician that covers several disciplines of high-angle rescue, below grade rescue, confined space, and water technician. Also, Lt. Paulino and Lt. Colomey were appointed to the District 8 Fire Investigation Unit. This is a certified/educated group of fire service personnel that responds within our fire district community to investigate any fire incident that occurs. They are selected by a managing group of fire officers in District 8, and it is not an easy process to complete. We are fortunate to have 2 members active with the investigative unit.
- The Paper Store opened at Highland Commons on Saturday, June 28. Ramen Haven is the restaurant that is taking the space where Subway used to be. Fire Prevention has received the plans for the upfit of the sprinkler system for the space, along with other needed fire prevention systems. Work is ongoing in that space.
- May had 14 open shifts that were unfilled, and June had 10 unfilled shifts. We
 do have several interviews in process to increase the call department
 numbers.
- Our home safety check program is available to any resident in town, along with
 the child passenger seat program. Both of these programs are a no cost safety
 item that can pay dividends for home safety and for new children riding in car

- Work has come to a completion for the summer on the second-floor renovations. Assabet made great strides in placing walls, running electrical wiring, and plumbing for the project. They are ahead of schedule as they will return the last week of August to start work for School Year 2026.

- The Drone Unit was deployed twice in the month; both times were here in Berlin.
- Sgt. Goulding organized the annual 5th Grade field trip this year to Peddocks Island, which is part of Boston Harbor. We spent the day with the kids and chaperones taking a one-hour boat ride to and from the island, and once we were there broke off into several groups exploring the 300-acre island.
- June 20th, Officer Brendan Judge graduated from the Boylston Police Academy and started field training the following week.
- Accreditation Currently at 129 policies, started with 77 last fall. We will be joining MPAC (Massachusetts Police Accreditation Commission) in the near future, so we can start a 6-9 month path to being an accredited department.
- 7 officers have been submitted to POST-C for recertification, all have met the training requirements to be recertified.

HIGHWAY SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT - JUNE

This month presented a manageable workload overall for the Highway Department, with notable progress on road projects and continued commitment to general maintenance duties. Both Crosby and Lyman roads were successfully reclaimed and received their binder coat. Following that, the structures were raised in preparation for the final top coat application. Overlay work on Sawyer Hill was also completed, with subsequent edge filling performed.

A few equipment issues were encountered during operations, including the replacement of two brake cans on Truck 31 and a hydraulic hose failure on Truck 30 during roadside edge work. Nevertheless, routine responsibilities such as pothole repairs, roadside mowing, and hazard mitigation were actively pursued. The team continues to balance multiple seasonal and infrastructure-related tasks with efficiency.

Notably, the town was awarded \$500,000 in funding under Phase 2 of the Small Bridge Grant. This is a reimbursement-based grant that will significantly support upcoming bridge-related infrastructure efforts. Meanwhile, the Municipal Building's attic received spray insulation, adding to the building maintenance achievements this month.

There is no substantive update on the South Street Bridge at this time, though a MassWorks grant application is actively in progress. Public buildings underwent routine maintenance with no major incidents to report.
