ii Overview and Key Statistics

Older adults in our congregations face real challenges:

- 80% of seniors live with at least one chronic condition (CDC)
- 1 in 3 seniors experiences loneliness, impacting mental and physical health (NIH)
- Falls are the leading cause of injury among older adults (NCOA)
- Nearly 30% of seniors struggle with housing affordability (AARP)
- Financial scams targeting seniors cost billions annually (FBI)

Why It Matters: Seniors are the spiritual pillars of our churches. Honoring them means more than recognition—it means action rooted in love, justice, and legacy.

🚺 Black Senior Citizens in America

Population and Growth

- Black seniors (65+): 4.98 million in 2019 projected to reach 12.1 million by 2060
- Percentage of older population: 9% in 2019, projected to grow to 13% by 2060
- Black seniors (85+): Expected to grow from 511,540 to 2.2 million by 2060

Health Disparities

- Black seniors experience **higher rates of chronic illness** (diabetes, hypertension, heart disease) than white peers
- Alzheimer's and dementia: Black Americans are more than twice as likely to suffer from these conditions
- Mental health: Black older adults often rate their health less positively and face barriers to geriatric care

i Income and Economic Challenges

- Median income (men 65+): \$25,106
- Median income (women 65+): \$18,214
- Compared to \$36,921 for all older men and \$21,815 for all older women
- Many Black seniors live on **fixed incomes**, with limited savings and reduced Social Security benefits due to interrupted work histories

A Housing and Living Conditions

- Nearly 30% of Black seniors face housing affordability challenges
- Many live in **urban centers or underserved rural areas**, often without access to safe, accessible housing

Education and Marital Status

- High school graduates (65+): 81%
- Bachelor's degree or higher: 22%
- Marital status: 38% married, 26% widowed, 22% divorced, 14% never married

Supporting Senior Citizens in Our Churches and **Communities**

As part of the National Baptist Convention's Senior Recognition Sunday observance on September 14, the Fit for Service Ministry is spotlighting the real challenges and opportunities facing our senior members. From chronic health conditions and rising medical costs to social isolation and housing insecurity, older adults in our congregations and communities deserve compassionate support and practical solutions.

W Health and Healthcare.

Question: What are the most common health challenges seniors face?

Answer: Most seniors live with at least one chronic condition—such as heart disease, diabetes, or arthritis—which can affect mobility, independence, and daily life.

Question: Why is healthcare access difficult for many seniors?

Answer: Rising costs, complex insurance transitions (like Medicare), and long distances to providers—especially in rural areas—can delay or prevent needed care.

Question: How does aging affect physical ability?

Answer: Seniors may experience reduced mobility, vision, and reflexes, making everyday tasks and driving more difficult or unsafe.

Social and Emotional Well-being.

Question: Why is loneliness a serious issue for older adults?

Answer: As social circles shrink due to loss of loved ones or limited mobility, many seniors feel isolated leading to depression and worsening health.

Question: What causes seniors to feel disconnected from their communities?

Answer: Living alone, lack of transportation, and fewer opportunities for interaction can leave seniors feeling cut off and forgotten.

§ Financial and Housing Challenges

Question: What financial struggles do seniors face?

Answer: Many live on fixed incomes and must choose between essentials like rent, medication, and utilities as costs rise.

Question: Why is housing a concern for older adults?

Answer: Seniors need safe, affordable, and accessible housing, but such options are often limited or out of reach.

Safety and Security.

Question: What are the biggest safety risks for seniors?

Answer: Falls are the leading cause of injury, often due to unsafe home environments or physical decline.

Question: How are seniors targeted by financial scams?

Answer: Older adults may be vulnerable to fraud, exploitation, or abuse, especially if isolated or unfamiliar with digital threats.

Question: What Can Churches Do to Help when it comes to health and wellness?

Answer: Here are meaningful ways churches can support senior members to be Trinty Well – mind, body and spirit:

For Health and Wellness:

- Host regular health screenings and wellness workshops
- Provide transportation to medical appointments
- Offer Medicare navigation and benefits counseling

For Social Connection:

- Launch senior fellowship groups or buddy systems
- Organize intergenerational events to build relationships
- Make regular phone calls or home visits to check in

Question: What Can Churches Do to Help when it comes to housing and finances?

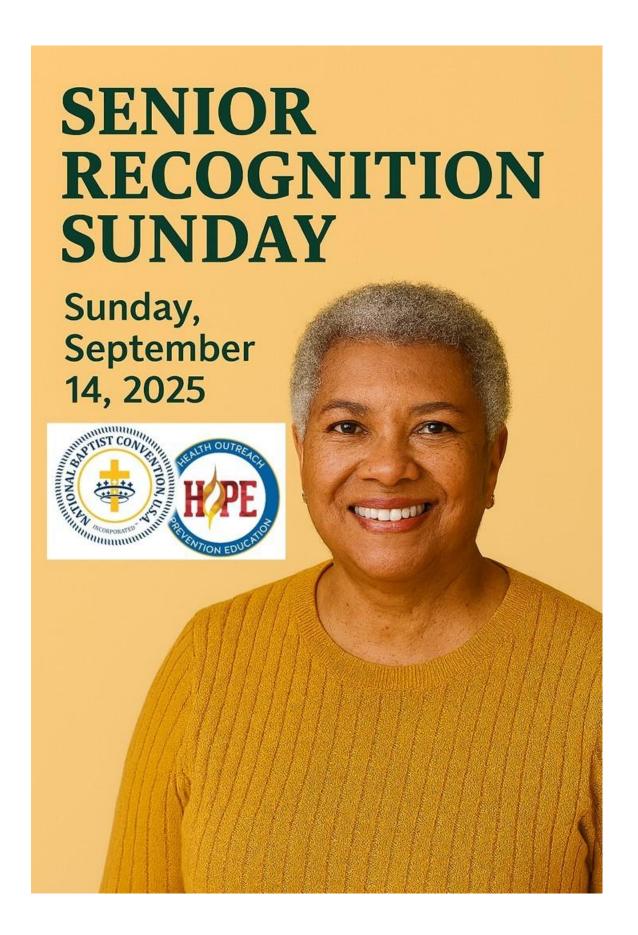
Answer: Churches can

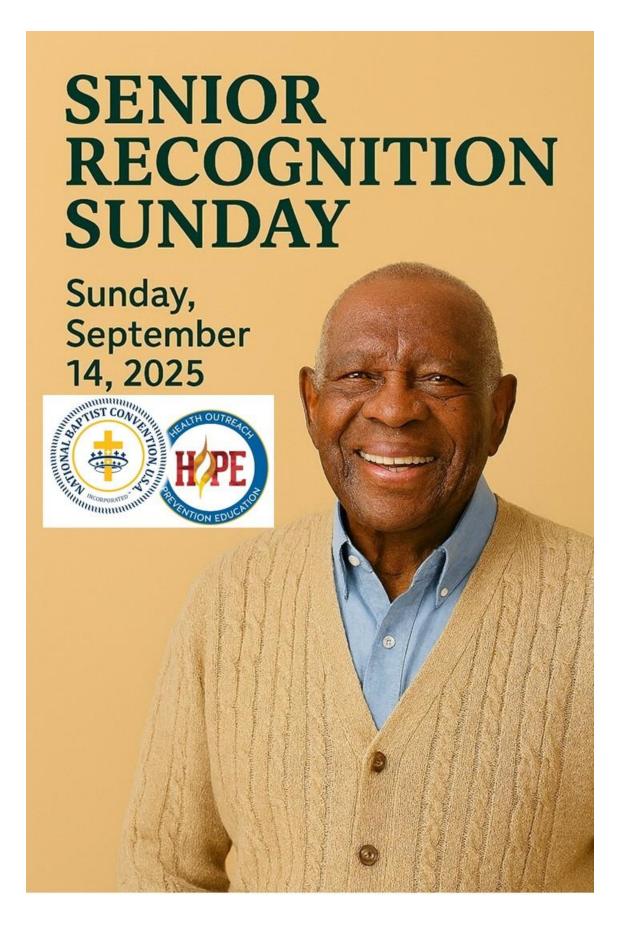
A For Housing and Safety:
