Throughout the course, particular focus will be placed on the various segments of the legal system; beginning with the slave trade and slave experience; covering the contradictions between emancipation and Jim Crow; African American protests such as the Civil Rights movement and Black Lives Matter, the success and failure of policing, the court system, and incarceration; finally, solutions to improve equity within the American legal system.

Spring 2003 saw the teaching of Western Civilization III, which covered the period immediately prior to the French Revolution to the present. This teaching assignment required the leading of discussion in three sections (approximately 66 students) in a course requiring a professor-lead lecture.

Use of this electronic monitoring equipment required technical expertise in setup, maintenance and troubleshooting of equipment.

In addition, all other duties of traditional probation supervision were included, such as case management and all of its attendant responsibilities.

One of three designated Intelligence Officers/Gang Monitors of the Department's Intelligence Resource Unit. The purpose of this unit is to facilitate the gathering and dissemination of relevant information to agents within the Department as well as work with designated law enforcement agencies to further enhance our information gathering capabilities and intra-departmental cooperation.
