IMPORTANT TIPS

- Keep safe at all times

- Keep safe at all times.

 Enjoy your boating at all times.

 Be considerate of others and their level of expertise.

 If you find yourself on the water and have forgotten that most important item

 IE: loo-paper, sugar or even a partner just ask around as someone is sure
- Lit. Norpaper, sugar or even a partier just as a notificide someone is sur to have sufficient to help you out. It's a sad fact that "your pride and joy" will receive scratches with use. To minimise DAMAGE, perform every manoeuvre at idle, as its better to kiss an object than to SLAM/CRASH into it.

- Before launching, rafting or entering a marina/pontoon/wharf –

 1. before launching, set your fenders, also front and rear ropes onto both sides.
 - NB: before rafting or entering a wharf etc; be sure your fenders and front and rear ropes are set onto both sides.

 2. stop near your location and take note of the wind/current
 - direction as they can be of great assistance OR your greatest enemy.
 - plan your approach well before you start to move
 - forget using the throttle do everything at idle speed, there are no medals for high-speed approach or manoeuvres (only embarrassment when you come unstuck and you will!).
 - 5, when coming into a location choose one competent member to listen to and ignore all others as everyone will have different instructions and will confuse you.
 - 6. all our boats steer from the back and also have drive from the back SO in wind/current conditions it is easier and safer to reverse. If driving like a car the front of the boat will swing away out of control if there's a side or head wind.
 - 7. If you see a Whittley or several Whittley stationary or slowly manoeuvring around in a bunch, the chances are someone is in trouble. You should reduce speed to an idle and progress toward the others as you might be the member who has a
 - spare part or knowledge to help.

 8. always use cleats for ropes NOT FOR TYING FENDERS!

 9. if you feel a bit threatened, study your "how to's...." they may
 - help with that little extra confidence.

PRACTISE MAKES FOR PERFECT as with most things in life (most certainly boating) without regular practise this learned art will most always result in failure, so PRACTISE!

The importance of boat insurance...

Recently a few of our members have used their boat insurance for:

Water damage due to forgetting to place bung!

- A damaged prop identified during a regular service, explanation being that they may have unknowingly hit a submerged object. This resulted in very expensive repairs under insurance.
- Towing expenses to have boat and trailer moved off highway.

New Lifejacket Regulations in Queensland: **Ensuring Safety on the Water**

Starting December 1, 2024, new lifejacket regulations will take effect to increase maritime safety. You must understand and abide by these changes to stay safe and compliant on the

We will be focusing on education, with enforcement delayed until 1 July 2025, to ensure all boaties are aware of the change. Further communication and on-water education will be provided to support the roll out.

Mandatory Wearing of Lifejackets

whilst underway


To increase water safety, new regulations will make wearing a lifejacket mandatory when:

- boating alone or only with children under 12 years on an open boat less than 4.8m in length whilst underway
- · crossing designated coastal bars on an open ship and on an open area of a boat of any length and on certain craft
- children one year or more and under 12 years are on an open boat or an open area of a boat of any length whilst underway $\bullet\,$ night time boating, between sunset and sunrise on an open boat less than 4.8m in length
- These rules apply to a wide range of boats and crafts, including small sailboats, pedal boats,

rafts (including inflatables), rowboats (except Club Surfboats by Surf Life Saving Australia), and sea/surf kayaks.

Note: crafts like body boards and stand-up paddle boards do not count as 'craft' under these
