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Weather Report

Hello Boaties,

for these articles are to hopefully add a little something My name is Robert Wood, and I am a Committee Member with the Whittley Boat Club. I work for the Defence

Services Branch of Bureau of Meteorology (BoM) at Amberley Airbase & have been a meteorologist for 30 years. The reason

more to everyone's weather knowledge, with the ultimate goal of keeping everyone safe. Always make sure to check the latest marine weather forecasts/warnings from BoM before setting off.

This edition of the weather corner will be to talk about what I & many of us do to choose which weekends we go boating. The problem with boating weather is, in general it doesn't always line up with our



weekends or normal days off. Weather forecasting has become more reliable and for planning purposes very good as far out as 3 weeks. But once it's within 10 days, the accuracy increases to greater than 70% and within a week as much as 90%. One of the jokes of meteorologists is that our forecasts are never really wrong it was just that the timing was off a bit!



The below charts are an indication of the overall forecast from Seabreeze, normally the first look for many of us. Seabreeze uses 1 of 3 global weather models & in this example is using the GFS model. See fig 2 for a rough estimated area for seabreezes forecast areas (approx. 50km squared). The winds indicated on fig 1 shows a high average of the entire area. See fig 4 for the actual forecasted winds at 7am on Saturday morning 19th for the Brisbane area. By looking at fig 4 there is almost always somewhere that is protected, especially in the bay, which is generally a safer area.











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Weather Report - cont.

Fig 4 is from a great free source site Brisbane Storm Chasers or BSCH at http://stormcast.com.au/stormcast.html




This site was featured in a previous newsletter but in brief this site is great to investigate what the winds will really may be doing. By going to the link in step 1 click capitals then Brisbane. Then step 2 make sure that you are using



the latest model run (refresh website and click down on latest on next visit). Step 3 and 4 are three hourly rainfall accumulation and 10m wind speeds respectively. Finally step 5 is choosing the time frame your interested in.



Fig 4 shows a comparison to the averaged wind speeds above in the seabreeze depiction at 7am on Saturday 19th. Wind speeds along the coast are much lower & can sometimes confuse those looking at seabreeze. If Seabreeze is all green it's a go! If its yellow take caution & red investigate more or go shopping instead of boating! So a little further investigation shows why there can be large differences in wind speeds.



As always please keep up to date with the latest forecasts and warnings from the BoM. I will continue to discuss other types of weather data and some useful sites most used in future newsletters.

Tech-Bits

"Alternate solution to expensive GPS plotter"

Hi Guys and hope the boating weather has been kind to you over the last few months.

In this article we're talking about GPS's & an alternate type that is available at a relatively low price.

Those of you that know me understand that spares and redundant bits of equipment are big on my priority list and one of our more important items is the GPS.

I have a dedicated GPS plotter (the type with the chart) and built in depth sounder mounted underneath the hard top which is very convenient and works well. Of course we need a spare (keep nodding!) and mine was mounted directly in front of the steering wheel, in a less than ideal position.



This unit recently died and not being comfortable without a spare I started looking for its replacement. I wanted something with an 8" screen

but the prices were very expensive, typically more than \$1500. Then I thought, why spend all that money on something that would be hard to see anyway?



I then realised that I already had an 8" Samsung Tablet and that many boaties and yachties are using this new technology in the form of Apps on their iOS (Apple

iPad etc) and Android devices.

I downloaded a free version of the Navionics App and was amazed at how simple and detailed both the charts and features were. Note that the unit doesn't need internet when on your boat.

Once the 2 week "free" period ended I bought the full version for \$85 which has a future renewal fee of only \$45. Keep in mind this includes all beacon updates and a host of really cool features.



I was sold! Now how to mount the damn thing on my dash!

"Ram mounts" was the answer. This is an American company specializing in mounting these types of gadgets to anything. Suction cups, rail mounts, you name it, they had it and very durable as well.



I chose the adjustable ball joint model which is sturdy and provides for fully adjustable positioning.

I then removed the old unit and got busy making a special in- fill to cover the hole. Using a router and some epoxy filler, primer and paint over the counter sunk bolts produced a great result that resembles fibreglass but at a fraction of the hassle and cost





The end result was a system that I could now easily read from the driving position that was also removable to allow for future planning and checking out new spots. I am in the process of adding a flush mount USB charger so battery lifetime shouldn't be a problem.



One of the best features of this App is the Auto route feature. You simply select Point A, then Point B and

the unit will automatically create a route between these points using your draft, tell you the distance and even estimate the fuel usage for the trip based on your pre-entered info. Follow the blue line and off you go!

I've now logged more than 5,500 km's on this boat and this setup would have made many of these miles much, much easier.

This will really open up options for future planning of trips and can't wait to use it on the Tin Can Bay trip at the end of September.

If anyone is interested I can provide more detail/costs and can demo some of the features on a future trip for those that are keen.




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Cooking on Boats

I have decided to give you a lovely recipe for cooking a fresh Flathead that we all seem to want to catch and eat.

This is one of my favourite fish's to catch and cook up in the frypan so have decided to share a simple but tasty recipe for you all to try the next time a Flathead throws itself upon your hook.

It's very simple and most of us have these simple ingredients on the boat somewhere

Chili Flathead Fillets

Ingredients:

- Skinless flathead fillets
- 2/3 cup plain flour
- 1 Tbls sea salt flakes
- 2 tsp chili flakes
- Grapeseed oil (or you can use coconut oil or olive)

Method:

Mix all dry ingredients together in a bowl or shallow plant and roll your flathead fillets in it.

Heat oil in frypan and cook till browned on both sides.

Serve with a nice aioli sauce (pre-made or store bought) and a tossed salad on the side

OR

Serve with fresh bread and butter and a nice glass of white

have not got around to meeting as yet.



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Event Report: "Supplies whilst on the Water" (Part 2)

In the southern bay there are a few options that have residential development.

Foodworks Macleay is at 121 High Central road with groceries, ice, cold drinks & ice creams and is about 500m walk from the terminal on the southern side. 100m closer is the Macleay Chemist for first aid supplies: Phone 34095187. The Blue Parrot Cafe also up the road from the southern terminal is a local legend with coffee, meals and it is licensed.

There is a convenience store also on **Lamb**, not far from the terminal. **Karragarra** has a nice beach and swimming enclosure on the north eastern corner but no stores at all.

Russell has an IGA Supermarket in High Street just a couple of hundred metres up the hill from the terminal at the northern end. On the way up the hill you'll pass Auntie Alices Cafe which is a short stroll from the jetty and has great meals, coffee and good old fashioned milkshakes.

Going further south? <u>Couran Cove</u> has casual and upmarket dining options and a marina to park your vessel half way down **South Stradbroke**. If you choose to stay there are discounted marina rates. Bookings are essential for casual marina use, see their website for details and reservations.

If you are looking for something more casual, a burger, chips, drinks, coffee or ice creams, bait or ice, you can access all of these a short distance north of **Couran Cove at Tipplers** Kiosk. It will be crowded here over Christmas.



There is also <u>a new cafe</u>, licensed, with great coffee, breakfast, lunch, dinner including the usual breakfast fare plus seafood and steaks, you can see details and menus online.

Club Favourite! Jacobs Well is often passed by vessels travelling to and from the Gold Coast via the western route, but it hides a range of easily



accessible services. There's a <u>tavern with bistro</u> and bottlo, bakery and tackle store all across the road. The pub has great meals.

Just North of Jacobs Well is **Calypso Bay Marina** and real estate development. Most go past this as well but it is the access point for <u>Harrigans Drift Inn Irish pub</u>, which has great meals and weekend live entertainment.



Only a mile or two north of Calypso Bay is **Horizon Shores Marina**, the <u>cafe</u> here has been recently renovated & now offers Espresso Coffee, cold drinks and a range of meals on the outdoor shaded terrace.

At **Cabbage Tree Point,** Steiglitz, there is a small park adjacent the boat ramp and public toilets and a <u>convenience store</u> across the road with a good range of supplies, food and takeaways.

On the mainland in **Weinam Creek, Redland Bay** within <u>Pelican Slipways</u> grounds on the southern side of the creek is a terrific cafe with a range of cakes and other treats and sensational views across the nearby bay. There is a mooring area immediately to the south of the entrance to the creek and the creek is accessible by tender. They also have a range of <u>nautical treasures</u> for sale.

On **Coochiemudlo**, just a short hop from wonders of Horseshoe Bay on Peel is the Red Rock Café

with coffee and modern Australian cuisine. It's across from the shore on the south eastern side. Nearby is the <u>Coochiemudlo Kiosk</u>, ideal for cakes, cold drinks, ice cream, general store type supplies, hotdogs, burgers and chips. It's also on the SE corner and easily accessible. The area is a great anchorage in a NW-NE breeze but does have a fair bit of current on the outgoing tide.
