Winter Averages Start in December

You may have noticed an item on your Cottonwood Water & Sanitation bill that says "winter average." Your winter average is determined from an average of water consumption records from December-March. The purpose of this calculation is to identify indoor use averages that can be applied year round.

Irrigation Season Allocations

Friendly reminder: irrigation season allocations ended in October. Outdoor use outside of the period is billed at the abusive rate. Your indoor allocation has room to water trees and still be within your conservation tier. Your water conservation efforts are greatly appreciated and have a long-lasting, positive impact on our water sources and the sustainability of our community. Thank you!

Understanding Discolored Water

Discolored water, which can look red or tea-colored, is usually caused by iron and manganese that is naturally found in our in well water and shows up in our treated water for a very short period of time upon well start up. You might also notice discolored water during hydrant flushing, water line maintenance, or other times during operational emergencies that require us to make full use of our deep water supplies. This doesn't happen often, and when it does, operations staff make tremendous efforts to flush the portions of the system that are experiencing discolored water. We acknowledge how unpleasant it is for you whenever our water is not aesthetically pleasing, but rest assured we take all corrective and preventative steps available to us to minimize such events.

Whenever a discolored water event occurs, we encourage you to avoid doing laundry as the discolored water can cause staining. Should you find your wash stained, avoid drying it as this can set stains. Re-wash again when the water is clear using a product such as Iron Out or Red B Gone.

If you're worried about the water quality, feel free to ask us to take a water sample during a discolored water event and we will send it to a lab for a Bac-T test, which checks for bacteria. These tests are done by an independent lab, and the results are shared with you once the District gets them. Feel free to contact us if you have any questions about your drinking water!
