Success Stories: Technology in Action

Example 1: "Know the Risks" App

A nonprofit organization developed the "Know the Risks" app, which provides users with educational content about opioids, interactive quizzes to test their knowledge, and a resource locator to find nearby support services. The app's multilingual feature has been particularly effective in reaching minority youth from non-English-speaking families.

Example 2: Social Media Campaign in New York City

In New York City, a public health campaign used TikTok to create short, impactful videos addressing the dangers of opioid misuse. Featuring influencers and youth from diverse backgrounds, the campaign reached thousands of young viewers and sparked conversations around prevention and seeking help.
