

Would like to share a few thoughts with you about this past summer and whats ahead for the Norton AC. We tried to fulfill our promise and teach our campers something about sports and sportsmanship. We feel that we accomplished lots in some cases — in others not to much as yet. What ever we did accomplished it certainly isn't the maximum — this can only be achieved through hard work on all parts concerned.

One of the hardest things to teach is sportsmanship. This is not just a word, but a practise - one which is so hard to control at all times - one that sometimes bows to temper and emotion. To be a good loser is not enough - to be a good winner is double hard.

The common failing to such a project as this is example. How many of us have bowed to temper and emotion at various events? This is something that is only human. It can not be thrown out the mindow never to come back. It is rather something that has to be controlled.

Ones emotions have to be let loose at times. It is only natural. But to be able to regret this is a sign of control in the future. To justify it is a sign of regression from sportsmanship. To show by example, each of us has to learn this control. If we don't and let it run wild at the drop of a ref's red banner, or the blowing of a whistle — is to set an example that knocks out any type of sportsmanship training.

Once again - if control can be gained, and steam let off in private, the example can be upped to bigger and more positive heights. Still along the same line - but departing from the ire towards officials - how about this one:

"After going 7 for 9 in the first two games of the 1951 Worlds Series, Nonte Irvin of the Giants "Tailed off" to a .583 average. This moved one Giant fan to say, "I knew that bum wasn't a .600 hitter"."

How true this is. Many people can't visualize their hero, whether it be relative or idol, as a human who is no superman. Instead of finding ways to praise accomplishments, they are striving and driving towards a super-human effort. Let be what is to be - with proper encouragement, with help when needed, and with genuine interest, anyone, boy or girl or hero, can reach his own height, provided his effort is also there.

Whatever this height might be, it certainly is worth praise, since we know it could not have been reached without trying. A sign in an Alaskan dance hall read as follows: Don't shoot the plane player, he's doing the best he can". That more can we ask?

Finally, along this Line of thought - a quote from Hume:

"He is happy whose circumstances suit his temper; but he is more excellent who can suit his temper to any circumstances"
