Summer softball is just around the corner for the Huntington Township YMCA and all its women and girl players. The Y will again sponsor a women's team in the I.L. Womans' Softball League and will run a girls league, "The Battling Babes" for girls fourth through 10th grades.

The women will begin working out indoors at the Cold Spring Harbor High School on Thursday, March 13. Any women, or girls from HS and college over the age of 14, who are interested in trying out for the team, should plan to be on hand on that date, or call the Y, HA 1-4242, for further information.

The Battling Babes will signup at Cold Spring Harbor on Thursday, March 13, at 7 p.m. The league is divided into two groups, grades 4-6 and 7-10. It is open to all girls from the Township. Tryouts will be held at CSH each Thursday in March. The girls will then be placed on teams and practices will take place in May. League play starts the first week in June and continues through the second week in August.

The Women's team will be returning with a number of veterans. Heading the list will be pitcher Kay Hressing, coming back for her 13th season. She is the only member of the club who played the first season under the Y's banner in 1957. Kay won 13 of the team's 20 last summer and 14 in '66.

Other top vets are outfielder-first baseman Arline Norton, a .402 hitter and top batter; Jane Farphy, a catcher-shortstop who batted at a .457 clip. Arline has played since 1950 and Jane 1961 with the club. They will again lead the offense and the defense, wherever they play.

Two girls from Deer Park who played quite a bit with the club last season should solidify the lineup, Pat Talarico, a pitcher and third baseman, and Laura Agius at first. Pat hit .397 in 16 games and Laura .350 in 15 for the Y last summer.
