Then vs. Now: Kansas City's First Stoplight

 Installed in 1931 at Linwood Boulevard and The Paseo, Kansas City's first controlled intersection signaled the city's growing reliance on automobiles.

- Designed by architect Edward Buehler
 Delk best known for the timeless design
 of the Country Club Plaza the 17-foot tall traffic light became a local landmark
 due to its unique structure and placement.
- Remarkably, this historic traffic signal remains operational today.

The first Ford Motor assembly plant in St. Louis, pictured circa 1940s, along Forest Park Avenue at Sarah Street. View is westward. The plant opened in spring 1914, with production capacity of 1,000 cars per month. In 1920 the factory assembled Fordson tractors, 100 per day at peak, as the line temporarily suspended production of Model T cars. The 1920 Fordson Tractor's list price was \$850 with a sale to mark end of World War One, reducing the cost to \$790. 4 Missouri Drives Recognized Among The Nation's Best Winter Road **Trips**

Winter road trips offer a unique charm that's hard to match. 4 Missouri winter road trips emerged among the best in the country:

The Phoenix Project Update October 2024

The Franklin club Midwest chapter holds an annual spring and fall tour. The 2024 fall tour was held from October 2-5, 2024, in eastern Ohio in Amish country. My wife Jamie and I attended t he Franklin Midwest Amish Backroads & Byways meet and were offered a ride in

1926 12B Sport Touring car which is a two- seater with a rumble seat. Jamie and I had a lot of fun riding in the rumble seat during the daily tour destinations which included among other stops the Age of Steam Roundhouse Museum, Lehman's Hardware, Stutzman's Wheel, and Hochstetler's Wood Factory.

Although all the tour destination stops were unique and interesting, the highlight from my perspective was to witness one of my wood chassis frame rails (or sills) being milled out on the Hochstetler's

CNC machine. I reported in an earlier project update that my 1925 Franklin 11A coupe has a wood chassis

frame rather than steel. Franklin used wood for structural flexibility and to reduce weight. One of the drawbacks to the wood frame rails used in the 1925 Franklin is that the new Frank de Causse body design required a 'drop center' over the span of the wood frame rail to accommodate the styling profile of the body. The body would sag some and cause alignment problems with cowl and hood areas. Vehicles that were exposed to the elements for years would tend to suffer from dry rot in several areas, which was the problem with one of my original frame rails. Several Franklin Club members went in on this job to make about 9 sets of frame rails to support their restora tion projects.

The frame rails are laminated with three ¾" thick second growth ash which are over 11 feet long. Franklin Club Jeff Hasslen coordinated the procurement of the ash material and contract with Hochstetler's. The Hochstetler's Wood Factory rough cut the ash stock and laminated the boards together with modern glue in a large press. Then the boards were rough cut and pained to working size. Tim Hochstetler demonstrated the CNC machine finishing operation which milled out the final finished dimensions.

I have started to measure out and mark the hole locations for drilling all the mounting holes based on the original factory drawings. Stay tuned for the next article when by then I hope to have mustered up enough courage to drill the holes... measure twice, cut once.

Tim Hochstetler demonstrated the setup of the CNC machine used to mill the finished dimensions of a wood sill. The tooling jig is a vacuum chuck that holds the piece firmly during the machining operations. Note the tooling has two other set-ups for earlier 'straight' frame rails.



SPEED LIMIT WAS ONLY 25 miles per hour about 69ish years ago...crossing the narrow Bolivar Street Bridge over the Missouri River in Jefferson City, Mo. Also back then, US 54 to Holt's Summit was the pavement now called Summit Drive. The current corridor to Holt's Summit had once been the route for the C&A railroad from the Mo River to Chicago and Alton. (In some places you can still easily see the raised train bed running through the trees along the west side of the current Highway 54 to and from Holts Summit.

In this top photo, US 54 was still that little strip that shoots down from Hart's Hill (where they now park stuff during floods, and it comes down and crosses the KTY Trail near the trail head, and it is now blocked by a red metal gate.) Notice the Bolivar Street spin bridge sat at a different angle than the bridge added in mid-1950s that still crosses the Missouri River into Jefferson City along with it's twin 1990s bridge that takes traffic north/east out of Jefferson City. The old "Hoods" store in North Jefferson City (originally Great Central Lumber) sits on the old US 54. It









is very fun to see how things used to be when my grandparents were kids. NOTE: The support base of the spinning section of the old Bolivar Bridge sits in the water and reached west nearly to Clay Street. Notice the old train yard roundhouse in bottom right corner of photo... it is now a parking lot at north east corner of West Main and Harrison Streets just across from the entrance of the Secretary of State/State Archives building down in the flour mills "millbottom" area by the Mo River.

Two other photos show the bridge from the north bank. One shows a flood year (maybe 1952) and cars crossing into Jefferson City. The other shows the gas stations and Beck's Grocery that greeted people when you landed on the North side of the Mo River.


