Veterans Easy Access Program (VEAP)



Over the past couple of months, Captain Parks and the VEAP Steering Committee have met several times and worked on a plan for what VEAP should be and what VEAP can be in 2021 and beyond. It was agreed that having a live Veterans Expo as we have in the past is a preferred course of action, however, it was also agreed that it was not practical to do so in 2021. After much debate, a four part plan for 2021 was developed:

Website: Develop a Salvation Army/
VEAP website that veterans in search of help can go to for assistance in finding service providers both from the military/veterans community (Riverside County VA, Loma Linda VA hospital, DAV, VFW, EDD, etc.) and the local non-profit community (Salvation Army, Sunline, Riverside County Office on Aging, CVRM, etc.). We are currently working on setting up and populating the website and will keep you posted on progress.

Flyer: From the website, develop a one page flyer that focuses on key needs for the veterans who are struggling the most ... the homeless and near homeless. It would list a handful of prime providers to go to first for key needs such as shelter, health, food, jobs, transportation and also include the aforementioned website. These flyers could be handed out where needy veterans congregate (food banks, shelters, etc.) and included in food boxes.

Televised Event: This would be a 30

minute or one hour television event being planned for sometime around Veterans Day. Tentatively and depending on the actual length of the program, the event would include an introduction to some three to six key service providers, an introduction to the Cathedral City Corps of the Salvation Army, its services and programs, some patriotic music and perhaps the honoring of two local veterans as we have at past Veterans Expos. It will take a lot of work, a number of sponsors and all of your support to make this happen but it would be a great tool to help spread the word.

The ReadBack: As always, the Read-Back will remain the main vehicle to help get the word out to our many supporters, both individuals and organizations. Help us add to the distribution by referring some readers who may not yet receive it or better still, further distributing it by sending it out regularly to all the members of your organization. Also help us by providing input in the form of future events and prospective articles.

Rest assured that VEAP will continue to do all it can to help veterans obtain the benefits they have earned in the easiest and least frustrating manner possible as well as cover short term needs while they await their benefits. NASA'S HELICOPTER INGENUITY WILL ATTEMPT THE FIRST FLIGHT ON MARS

It's been nearly 120 years since the Wright Brothers proved that controlled, powered flight was possible on Earth. Now, NASA is set to prove that it can happen on another planet.

Ingenuity, a four-pound helicopter, will attempt the first ever flight in another

planet's atmosphere when it reaches Mars. The pint-sized helicopter is currently strapped to the underside of NASA's Perseverance rover, which is rocketing towards the Red Planet with an expected arrival date of February 18.



The helicopter is what's known as a technology demonstration, which means that successfully showing its capabilities in a series of test flights is its only mission. If all goes well, Ingenuity will usher in a new era of exploration of Mars' rugged terrain—going where rovers can't and giving some of the planet's treacherous features, such as its huge <u>lava tubes</u>, a closer inspection.

If the Wright Brothers comparison seems overwrought, consider the following: no helicopter has ever flown higher than around 40,000 feet on our planet. But on Mars the air is just one percent the density of Earth's—so thin that flying there is the equivalent of trying to take off at 100,000

feet.

"You can't just scale a helicopter designed to fly on Earth and expect it to work on Mars," says MiMi Aung, the project's manager at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory (JPL).

To generate enough lift, Aung and a

team of engineers led by JPL's Bob Balaram had to redesign traditional rotorcraft down to the very shape and material of the rotor blades, while also dramatically cranking up how fast those blades spin. The final product sports two stacked rotors featuring blades roughly four feet in diameter that spin in op-

posite directions at 2,400 revolutions per minute.

Prominent Veteran Service Organizations Urge Congress and VA to Act

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (Feb. 2, 2021) -

Leading veterans service organizations the Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW), DAV (Disabled American Veterans), and the Paralyzed Veterans of America (PVA), today released two reports – The Independent Budget: Veterans' Agenda for the 117th Congress, Critical Issues and The Independent Budget: FY 2022-2023 for the Department of Veterans Affairs, Budget Recommendations. The Independent Budget (IB) reports list toxic substance exposures, Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) infrastructure, minority veterans, and employment among the many critical issues facing today's veterans. It also provides funding estimates the VA will require in order to provide health care, benefits and transition services to more than ten million veterans, their families and survivors.

Included in this year's IB are 54 key recommendations for legislators and VA spread across 11 critical veteran issues in three areas - access to benefits, health care, and employment and education.

"The IB's focus for the 117th Congress is confronting the growing challenges associated with the global health and economic crises caused by the pandemic," said Randy Reese, executive director of DAV's Washington headquarters. "The long-term effects of COVID remain unknown, but we do know vet- sure equitable access to care, as well as review erans are uniquely affected – from survivor benefits to mental health. We look forward to working with congressional leaders to address these issues before they become insurmountable."

For FY 2022, the IB recommends Congress appropriate approximately \$120.3 billion for all VA programs and services, a 10.2% increase over FY 2021 appropriations levels. The IB estimates the VA health care system will require \$81.5 billion in FY 2022, an 8.5% increase, to provide care to more than seven million unique users. This recommendation would allow VA to fill over 10,000 health care

vacancies, complete the caregiver program expansion, increase home-based long-term care services, and address inequities in health care delivery to women and minority veterans. These and other funding breakdowns and recommendations can be found throughout this year's IB's Budget Recommendations report.

"Our Independent Budget book is a powerful tool that helps members of Congress and VA take the necessary steps to ensure that all veterans receive proper care and get the benefits they rightfully earned," said David Zurfluh, PVA national president. "Our report is so much more than just words and numbers on paper. Each page, each issue and each recommendation represent a person who sacrificed for this country, and whose quality of life is determined by the actions of legislators and VA."

IB Recommendation: Congress should ensure DOD and VA develop a consistent and timely method for expanding known exposures and study the adverse longterm health effects of other toxic exposures

IB Recommendation: Congress should extend the Asset and Infrastructure Review timeline by at least one year to ensure delays and lessons learned from COVID-19 can be incorporated into VA's infrastructure plan.

IB Recommendation: VA should enand update existing policies and directives in place to deliver improved services to minority, under-represented, and under-served veteran populations.

IB Recommendation: Congress should enact legislation to create new and innovative employment programs aimed at getting veterans quickly back to gainful employment.

The IB agenda and budget reports provide a comprehensive roadmap to helping ensure VA is fully funded and capable of carrying out its mission of serving veterans and their families, both now and in the future.

COVID Vaccine Referral Waived

The Defense Department has waived a requirement that Tricare Prime patients have a referral from their primary care doctors to get the COVID-19 vaccine outside the military health system.

The waiver, to be published in the Federal Register on Tuesday, allows Prime enrollees to receive contractors. Among the military-affiliated cases, 288 the vaccine at any non-military facility, including nonnetwork pharmacies or providers, without incurring any fees.

While the vaccine is free to all Americans, some providers charge patients an administrative fee, much like a charge for a doctor's visit. The charges are reimbursable for those with medical insurance, but patients must file a claim with their insurers to recoup the payments.

The waiver will insure that Tricare Prime beneficiaries don't incur any charges if they get their vaccine from a location other than their military health provider. Ordinarily Tricare beneficiaries must get a referral for outside care through their primary care physician or pay point-of-service charges.

Officials have encouraged Tricare beneficiaries to seek the vaccine through their local or state public health departments or at hospitals or pharmacies offering it, including Walgreens, which is in Tricare's retail pharmacy network, and the non-network CVS pharmacies.

The waiver will remain in effect throughout the and 16 from the Moderna vaccine. national emergency declared for the coronavirus pandemic.

The waiver does not apply to any other vaccines at non-network pharmacies.

As of Monday, More than 75 million COVID-19 vaccines have been delivered to states, localities and federal entities nationwide, and 63 million doses have been administered, including nearly 19 million second doses.

Across the Defense Department, 854,728 doses of the 1.18 million received by the department have been administered. Roughly 233,600 militaryconnected people have received their second dose -namely active-duty personnel and civilian employees who work in health care, emergency services or billets of national security importance, and Tricare beneficiaries ages 75 and older.

Some locations across DoD have started ad-

ministering vaccines to those 65 and older, and those under 65 with underlying health conditions.


Roughly 250,000 of the nation's 28 million COVID-19 cases have been among active-duty service members, civilian DoD employees, family members or have resulted in death.

A Centers for Disease Control and Prevention report released last week found that the COVID-19 vaccines manufactured by Pfizer-BioNTech and Moderna had relatively low rates of adverse events. Among the 13.7 million vaccines administered between Dec. 14 and Jan. 13, there were 6,994 adverse event reports filed with the agency, nearly 91% of which were categorized as "non-serious."

The most common non-serious adverse events included headache, fatigue and dizziness, reported most frequently after the second dose.

The report also noted that, of the adverse events among those not living in nursing homes or other long-term care facilities, nearly 81% were reported from the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine, while 19.2% were reported from the Moderna vaccine.

The rate of anaphylaxis -- a severe allergic reaction that remains a concern related to the new vaccines -- was 4.5 cases per million doses administered, or 62 patients. That includes 46 with the Pfizer vaccine

<u>DEPENDENTS OF SOME DISABLED VETER-</u> ANS CAN NOW FLY SPACE-A

Editor's Note: Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, Space-A travel is strictly limited to official travel and to certain personnel in specific locations until further notice. A recent regulations change allows dependent family members of permanently and totally disabled veterans to fly on spaceavailable, or Space-A, flights.

On Oct. 23, 2020, a change to <u>DoDI</u>
<u>4515.13</u> updated the eligibility requirements for Space-A travel, adding dependents of permanently and totally disabled veterans. In 2019, those veterans <u>became eligible</u> to fly Space-A on regularly scheduled military passenger aircraft, joining retirees and their <u>spouses</u>; <u>National Guard</u> and Reserve members on the Active Status List; and surviving spouses of those who died on active duty. However, the dependents of those disabled veterans were not allowed to accompany them on Space-A flights.

The regulation change states that dependents of permanently and totally disabled veterans may accompany the veteran on flights within the continental United States (CONUS) or on flights between CONUS and Alaska, Hawaii or U.S. territories. Dependents cannot travel without the veteran.

VACCINATION UPDATES

Notice has gone out that the Moderna COVID-19 vaccine is now available for eligible beneficiaries aged 65 and older and those aged 18 and older with increased risk for severe illness from COVID-19. Vaccinations are available on a walk-in basis Monday through Friday from 8am until 4pm excluding federal holidays in the West Gym building 1518 located on MCAGCC Twentynine Palms across from the Marine Corps Exchange on

6th Street. Appointments are available for those with mobility concerns or who are not able to stand for long periods of time. Those individuals can schedule appointments with the Immunizations Clinic at the Naval Hospital by calling (760)830-2698. Because supplies of the vaccine fluctuate, it is best to call before you go, Monday through Friday 9am until 4pm at (760) 668-1512.


