Great granddaughter of George and Elodie Letourneau, Marguerite "Peg" Paschke, dies at age 100

Peg was the daughter of Eugenie (Marcotte) Messier (1894-1971) and Viateur Messier. Peg's mother was the fifth-born child of Eugenie (Letourneau) Marcotte (1858-94)—who was Elodie and George Letourneau's fourth-born child—and Dr. Frederic Marcotte (1856-1903). They lived in Concordia, Kansas. Shortly after giving birth to baby Eugenie, mother Eugenie (Letourneau) Marcotte died. Soon afterwards, Agnes (Letourneau) St. Louis—Eugenie (Letourneau) Marcotte's older sister—and her husband Joseph, took in and raised baby Eugenie Marcotte. I recommend that you open the map on your computer or tablet before clicking the links. Trying to open the links on your smart phone will be challenging. If you want to use your smart phone to open the links, I recommend that you first send the map to your phone's Dropbox. Then you will have more success.

Fencing chosen for west boundary



Notice the white picket fence in the front of the Letourneau Home in this 1883 sketch. Now imagine the white vinyl fence at center forming a right angle at the west border boundary of the Adrien M. Richard Heritage Preserve, to hide the apartment's carbage cans and driveway.

A donor has given \$1000 to the BGHS for garden projects in 2021. There is still \$730 left in that 2021 donation. The donor wants that remaining money to go toward a NW corner boundary fence. Consider this: after the log schoolhouse is rebuilt, a property survey for the NW boundary is completed, and village ordinances are reviewed, the fencing pictured above could nicely define our historic landmark campus. It would extend 32' along the East Stratford Drive sidewalk from the NW corner of our campus and 72' south (to shield the trash cans and driveway of the west apartments). What is needed: nine 8' fence lengths (along apartment driveway and trash cans) and four 8' fence lengths along the sidewalk plus 13 posts and labor to install. The cost would be about the same amount as the remaining donation mentioned above. This matter will be discussed further next spring.

Bourbonnais Grove's first log schoolhouse featured in Center for French Colonial Studies *Le Journal*

He is the Michigan Ambassador to the corridor. He is also the editor of the Center for French Colonial Studies *Le Journal*. Over the past few months, we worked

together on the article "History of Bourbonnais Grove's First Log Schoolhouse: The French Connection". Maternity of the Blessed Virgin Mary Parish 175th anniversary celebration includes interviews and tours

Before conducting the interviews, you should go the parish's website www.mbvmchurch.org, find the 175th Anniversary pages, and contact Maria Pallassard at mpallissard@mbvm.org who will assist you with the interviews, photographs, videos, etc. Once the interviews are digitally complete, the BGHS could retain a copy. The BGHS will also help organize tours of the church grounds and St. Viator/ONU campus buildings on Sunday August 21, 2022.
