



One Shepherd's Thoughts.



For the next few weeks I will be preaching on Job. You've probably all heard the saying "the patience of Job." My seminary professor Dr. Davison would say a better translation would be the steadfastness of Job. Because—to be truthful—he really wasn't patient with what was happening to him.



The book of Job deals with the age old question "Why is there suffering?" Why does God allow bad things to happen? Job handles all the terrible things that befall him with confrontation and grace—all the while remaining true to God. The idea of suffering speaks to every generation

and every individual. There is a lot of wisdom in the book of Job.

It begins with this really rich and nice guy Job who faithfully worshipped God. God brags about him to ha satan (the accuser) in the heavenly hosts' meeting. Then—a sort of wager is made as to whether Job will remain steadfast if everything was taken away from him. God knows Job well and ultimately wins the wager. But in the meantime...Job suffers a lot of loss and pain and hardship.

The theory behind the writing of Job is that it began as a folk tale about a pious man named Job. Conversations and dialogue were added and expanded the

basic premise. And God's response to Job ends the tale.

The portrayal of God in Job is one of its best features. As I said before—God took the bet with ha Satan (pronounced ha sah-tahn)—fully expecting to win. God has faith in Job—and God has faith in us. God does not believe we are faithful just because we are going to get good things (prosperity gospel). Both Job and we live our lives and do what we think God wants us to do. If we stumble—we get back up again and move forward.

Faithfulness in our Christian lives will involve struggling with God—as Job did. We can argue with God—we can have issues with God—and we may ultimately realize we will never get what we ask God for or never get what we want. Job moved on from his anger when he knew God had listened to him—and so can we. God may never give us the answers we are looking for—but I promise you—God is

listening. God is taking note of what you say.

The fact remains there is evil in the world. Humans make bad choices and bad things happen. And human suffering comes from our free choice given to us by God to make bad decisions.

Another fact remains that God is with us.
