Prayer at the End of the Day for Advent

Week 1: Contemplative Prayer

The spirituality of contemplation includes patterns of silence, meditation, repetitive prayer, and other practices. Mary contemplated all things in her heart. We conform ourselves to her way of prayer.

OPENING

You speak to us in silence.

Open our hearts to your still, small voice.

Your word is inscribed on our hearts.

Remind us of the prayers we have learned by heart.

You are the Lord of time and space.

Give us patience to listen on your time, not ours.

LIGHTING THE ADVENT WREATH

We praise you, O God, for this evergreen crown that marks our days of preparation for Christ's advent. As we light the first candle on this wreath, rouse us from sleep, that we may be ready to greet our Lord when he comes with all the saints and angels. Enlighten us with your grace, and prepare our hearts to welcome him with joy. Grant this through Christ our Lord, whose coming is certain and whose day draws near. **Amen.**



READING

"But Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart." (Luke 2:19)


REFLECTION

The Greek word translated *treasured up* or *kept* can mean preserved (to keep from perishing), protected, treasured up, and kept within oneself. The Greek word translated *pondered* means to mull over, or to turn over in one's mind.

Have there been moments you've wanted to "treasure up"? What were they? What happened? What do you think can happen when we take time to ponder? What might happen if you ponder about something specific or something in general? How can God be a part of it?

Week 2: Embodied Prayer


Prayer is more than just a practice of the mind and spirit. It includes physical postures that pray with the whole body. Solomon prayed before the altar of the Lord with his whole body, and so we do likewise.

OPENING

We stand to honor you. (Stand as you are able.)
We kneel to adore you. (Kneel as you are able.)
We raise our hands to worship you. (Raise hands as you are able.)
We close our eyes to see you. (Close eyes.)
We sit to hear you. (Sit.)

LIGHTING THE ADVENT WREATH

We praise you, O God, for this circle of light that marks our days of preparation for Christ's advent. As we light the candles on this wreath, kindle within us the fire of your Spirit, that we may be light shining in the darkness. Enlighten us with your grace, that we may welcome others as you have welcomed us. Grant this through Christ our Lord, whose coming is certain and whose day draws near. **Amen.**



READING

"Now when Solomon finished offering all this prayer and this plea to the Lord, he arose from facing the altar of the Lord, where he had knelt with hands outstretched toward heaven." (1 Kings 8:54)

REFLECTION

In her book *Embodied Prayer: Toward a Wholeness of Body, Mind, and Soul*, Celeste Snowber writes, "Our bodies have too long been in exile. We listen or pray with our hearts and minds but ignore

much of our bodies; we become 'disembodied.'" Have you ever felt that way? What was happening in your life at that time?

Embodied prayer invites you towards wholeness of body, mind, and soul: walking meditation, prayer with hands raised in the air, and prayer where one kneels. The posture and the positions seem to speak for themselves as much as any words.

In what ways might your body be affecting your praying? Could trying a different position or posture reveal another kind of prayer experience with God?

Forgive us our failure to inquire.


We have done more for our neighbors than we realize.

READING

"Therefore confess your sins to one another, and pray for one another, so that you may be healed. The prayer of the righteous is powerful and effective." (James 5:16)

REFLECTION

James 5:16 is really about relationships, and inviting those relationships to be deeper. While this verse was originally referring to a Christian community, it can be brought to our neighbors. Shelley Stott wrote: "Prayer walking is exactly what the words imply: walking and praying. Prayer walking has been described as 'praying on site with insight.'" When you hear the sounds and see the sights of a particular place, you understand better how to pray for the people in that location.

Do you have anyone with whom you can "confess your sins" and/or "pray for one another"? How did that relationship evolve? What suggestions would you give for someone seeking that kind of relationship? Why do you think James links being healed with mutual confession and prayer? Do you think that could be applied to neighborhood walks? If yes, how?

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

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Week 4: Praying the Hours

One of the most ancient patterns for prayer is the daily prayer cycle. Paul encouraged his communities to pray in the Spirit at all times. Praying the daily hours is patterned after this encouragement.

Let our first thoughts and words be a prayer to you.

Lord, you are with us in the midday.

Keep us mindful of you as we work and play.

Lord, you are with us in the evening.

Prepare us for the night watches.

Lord, you are with us in the nighttime.

We commend our bodies and souls into your care.

LIGHTING THE ADVENT WREATH

We praise you, O God, for this wheel of time that marks our days of preparation for Christ's advent. As we light the candles on this wreath, open our eyes to see your presence in the lowly ones of this earth. Enlighten us with your grace, that we may sing of your advent among us in the Word made flesh. Grant this through Christ our Lord, whose coming is certain and whose day draws near. **Amen**.



READING

"Pray in the Spirit at all times in every prayer and supplication. To that end keep alert and always persevere in supplication for all the saints." (Ephesians 6:18)


REFLECTION

The Greek word translated *supplication* means a deeply felt need. Keep in mind that according to Scripture, *saint* refers to those following Jesus and includes those living among us. The deeper the relationship, the more opportunity for supplications.

How do you pray throughout the day? Do you set aside time for prayer? How can setting particular times for prayer in your day have a positive effect on you?
